

KIOWA COUNTY

Kiowa County lies on the High Plains of Eastern Colorado. It is north of the Arkansas River Valley. The drainage, by several ephemeral streams, principally by Big Sandy Creek and Rush Creek, is southward to the Arkansas River. The county is basically a narrow, east-west rectangle 80 x 24 miles with an 18 x 6 mile notch in the northwestern corner. The topography is rolling, rising gradually from about 3,800 feet in the southeast corner to nearly 4,800 feet in the northwest corner. It is bounded on the east by Kansas; on the south by Prowers, Bent and Otero Counties, on the west by Crowley County and on the north by Lincoln and Cheyenne Counties.

The county is bisected east-to-west by Colorado Highway 96 and north-to-south by U.S. Highway 287. The Missouri Pacific Railroad parallels Highway 96 across the county. When built, the railroad was known as The Pueblo and State Line Railroad.

The original county seat was at Sheridan Lake but in 1902 it was moved to the present location at Eads. The first post office in the county was at Sheridan Lake but first with the name of Bee. This original name lasted for only a few weeks before being changed to Sheridan Lake. However, Sheridan Lake reverted to Bee for a very brief period before settling on its present name. Including Sheridan Lake/Bee, there have post offices at 18 locations. One of these existed with two spellings of its name: Stewart and Stuart. Of the eighteen sites, thirteen are along the Highway 96 – Missouri Pacific Railroad corridor and it was the coming of the railroad that gave impetus to their establishment and naming. Most interesting is the alphabetic sequence of names that was applied to the settlements west of Sheridan Lake. Beginning with Arden and continuing with Brandon, Chivington, Diston, Eads, Fergus, Galatea, Haswell, Inman, Joliet, Kilburn and continuing into Crowley County with Lolita, Meredith, Numa, Olney and Pultney. There never was a post office at Inman and when Joliet acquired a post office it did so with the name of Arlington. Four post offices were established in the area south of Eads and one was to the northwest of Sheridan Lake. At this time, there are active post offices at Sheridan Lake, Eads, Haswell and Arlington. Until recently Brandon and Chivington had Community Post Offices but both have closed and the Brandon Post Office building is now in Sheridan Lake.

Kiowa County is an agricultural county dominated by grazing land but with a significant production of grain and hay. An increasingly important product of the high plains is sunflower seed. The changing face of American agriculture, particularly on the High Plains, is obvious in Kiowa County. I spent nearly three hours driving through the area south of Highway 96. During that time I did not pass a single ranch that I thought to be permanently occupied. Most of the remaining buildings are used only for storage of equipment or as temporary residences during planting and harvesting seasons. The people now live in the larger towns such as Eads, Sheridan Lake or even beyond the county boundaries. I believe that the reasons are obvious. In today's economy the small farm or ranch can not support an average family in a modern lifestyle. Today families want to be close at hand to shopping, health care, schools, friends and social activities. The result is bigger and bigger farms with a concentration of people into a few towns that have or can provide the desired convenience. I feel reasonable in predicting that within perhaps 25 years, certainly within 50 years, the only towns on the Eastern Colorado plains will be the county seats or those towns fortunate enough to be at a major highway intersection. This does not bode well for the towns of Kiowa County with the exception of Eads and perhaps Sheridan Lake. These changes will not please those who desire a return to the life of simpler times but the change seems inevitable.

ARDEN

Arden was a railroad siding approximately two and a half miles west of Sheridan Lake. The application for a post office proposed Mrs. Evan S. Bleeker to be the postmaster but it was apparently her husband who got the job. The post office lasted only four months, losing out to the larger settlement of Sheridan Lake. The railroad siding is gone but there is a well-kept ranch with several grain storage bins at or very near the site.

This was the first of the "alphabetical" towns named by the railroad, several of which were named for officials of the railroad.

ARLINGTON

The community was first located a mile to the north and west of today's highway and railroad and was called Joliet. With the arrival of the railroad, the center of activity moved closer to the railroad. When the post office opened in 1887 it did so under the new name of Arlington.

Joliet was the "J" entry in Jessie Thayer's alphabetical naming of sites along the Pueblo and State Line Railroad. Apparently the parent Missouri Pacific preferred Arlington to honor a company official.

From the beginning, Arlington was a supply and shipping center for a large cattle and dry land farming area. One report describes Arlington as having, "the largest cattle shipping facilities between Pueblo and Kansas City with the exception of Osawatomie, Kansas." The twelve-room schoolhouse still stands but is no longer in use as a school. Nearly all business activity has departed but there are still (1997) a few scattered residences in what was once a significant community.

Arlington is in the southwestern corner of Kiowa County, on Colorado Highway 96. It is marked, so is easily found. The post office is still active and is located at a ranch a short distance south of the highway and the railroad. The post office occupies one corner of a large metal building at the ranch. Like many small rural post offices it is open for only a short period each day.



BEE

The name Bee was applied to present-day Sheridan Lake for two brief periods in 1887. To date I have found no reference to this name in the historical literature. However, in 1987 when Sheridan Lake celebrated its centennial, the commemorative postmark was Bee Station, thus recognizing the early name. It is also interesting that in spite of its short life, Bee did have a handstamp postmark, the only example of which is from February 1888, more than three months after the post office finally became Sheridan Lake. Perhaps the citizenry was not all that happy with the new name.

The Post Office Department Geographic Site Location Reports place the site of Bee at the west edge of Sheridan Lake. This may indicate that the community moved a short distance east and changed its name to match with newly established railroad facilities. The site of Bee was probably on the north side of the railroad where there are still some buildings.



BRANDON

Brandon was the second in the alphabetical sequence of site names created by The Missouri Pacific Railroad. It is about seven miles west of Sheridan Lake and still has a few residences. In 1963 the post office was converted to a Rural Branch of Eads and finally closed sometime prior to 1997. The small building that last housed the post office at Brandon has been moved to Sheridan Lake and is now part of a private historical collection/museum on the south side of Highway 96.

There is a nearby reservoir, Lake Brandon. Some have speculated that the community was named for the lake but the reverse seems more likely and in all probability the name honors another official of the railroad. Although established in late 1887 the townsite was not platted until I. S. Ritchey filed a plat on March 25, 1910.

Brandon was an agricultural supply center with a store and grain elevators.






CHIVINGTON

The "C" in the railroads alphabetical sequence, six miles west of Brandon. The name honors Colonel John M. Chivington, a minister and the commander of the volunteer troops that were engaged in the 1864 bloody battle with Indians at Sand Creek, not far from the community's location.

The Chivington Post Office is reported to have closed November 23, 1990 but there is no confirmation of that date or whether it was the date the doors shut or the official closing date.

The railroad established a Division Point at Chivington which had a roundhouse and shops. The town had a three story stone hotel and thirteen saloons at one time and one source claims a population of 2,500 to 3,000 (that seems unreasonable). In 1899 the railroad deleted Chivington as a Division Point and the community began a steady decline. I first visited Chivington in 1972; the post office was in a residence on the north side of the railroad. When I returned in 1997 the residence appeared to be unoccupied, the school building (or the hotel?) was only a shell; very few buildings remained and even fewer appeared to be occupied. Chivington seems to be destined to join the ranks of Colorado ghost towns.







DAYTON

Dayton was a short-lived town approximately 2-1/2 miles south-southeast of Eads. It was established with prospects of being on the advancing Pueblo and State Line Railroad. However, the railroad chose an alignment some two miles to the north and Eads became the area's railroad access. Dayton died and although it has been called a "town" and a townsite was laid out, it is doubtful that it was more than a handful of buildings, most of which were soon moved to Eads.

To reach the site, Colorado 96 (US 287) drive three miles east from Eads to where US 287 turns south. Continue south a little more than two miles to County Road N, then turn west one mile. This will bring you into a small valley; on the west side of which there is a collection of ranch buildings now used for equipment storage. The site of Dayton was in this area.

DISTON

Very little is known about Diston. It was the fourth of the alphabetic towns west of Sheridan Lake and did remain a railroad siding for many years. It is reported that at one time Diston had its own bank, a school and a small business center with a number of residential buildings.

Today nothing remains of Diston. To visit the site from Eads drive east seven and one-half miles on Colorado 96. At this point the road turns slightly more to the southeast, separates somewhat from the railroad and descends a gentle grade. The post office location for Diston was in this area.

EADS

Eads was established in 1887 and incorporated in 1916. Eads is the principal town and the county seat of Kiowa County. It is a platted town but the plat on file with the county has neither a date nor the name of the person filing the plat.

Eads was another creation of the Pueblo and State Line Railroad (Missouri-Pacific). The initial Geographic Site Location Report seems to indicate that the name Eads was first applied to the settlement at Dayton and that the office was then moved from Dayton to Eads. But the end date for Dayton overlaps the start date for Eads, leaving an impression that for almost a month both post offices were in operation. However, the documents may not accurately reflect what was really happening in Kiowa County.

EADS – Continued

The location of Eads, on the railroad, nearly in the geographic center of the countyF and at the intersection of the major east-west and north-south highways that traverse the county has made Eads the principal center of business activity in the county. By 1902 a rapid growth, in size and importance, resulted in the removal of the county seat from Sheridan Lake to Eads.

The name was another bestowed by the Missouri Pacific Railroad, it honors James Buchanan Eades who designed the railroad bridge across the Mississippi River at St. Louis. With the completion of the Eades Bridge in 1874, trains no longer had to be ferried across the Mississippi and the transcontinental railroad was at last complete. For some reason, the second "e" of Eades name has vanished in Kiowa County.





FERGUS

Fergus was the "F" in the alphabetic naming scheme for Kiowa County. There was a post office here for slightly more than two years. For many years it was a railroad spur and siding for the shipment of livestock. In later years the site was known as Hawkins Spur, however, it was still shown as Fergus on a 1923 map. The origin of either name is unknown but most likely were the names of railroad officials or local landowners.

The site is along Colorado Highway 96, eight miles west of Eads and five miles east of Galatea. Nothing, not even the railroad spur, remains of Fergus.

GALATEA

Galatea was number seven in the westward progression of location names assigned by Jessie Thayer for the Pueblo and State Line Railroad. Local belief is that Galatea was named for the heroine of Cervantes novel Saevedra. Galatea is also a heroine of Greek legend.

Galatea is 13 miles west of Eads at the intersection of Colorado Highway 96 with County Road 27. Only a few buildings and a grain elevator remain but most are abandoned. At one time Galatea was a respectable farm community, large enough to have its own newspaper, The Galatea Courier and a post office as late as 1948.



HASWELL

The name Haswell dates from the coming of the railroad in 1887. However, the post office dates only from early 1903, the community from 1905 and it was incorporated in 1920. The "H" for Haswell fits the alphabetic scheme but why it was chosen, is unknown; perhaps for another railroad official. Local whimsy attributes the name to thirsty residents, who having finally struck water, declared their community "Has a well!"

As late as 1966 the population of Haswell was 150 and it still provided some supplies and services to the surrounding ranches and farms. In 1997 the post office was still in the same white-painted brick building that it occupied on my first visit in 1972. There is still a small community at Haswell, however, since 1972, the closing of several small businesses and the departure of a number of residents may add Haswell to the group of Plains towns with an uncertain future.

Haswell is located on Colorado Highway 96, between County Roads 19 and 20, seven miles west of Galatea.



KILBURN

Kilburn was another short-lived post office at a siding on the Missouri Pacific Railroad. As with most of these locations, named by Jessie Thayer, the derivation and reason for the choice of the name has been lost to history.

It is unlikely that Kilburn was more than a shipping point for livestock. The site is on Colorado Highway 96, six miles west of Arlington. Only a pair of cottonwoods stands at the likely site. Nearby is a goat ranch.

QUEEN BEACH

Queen Beach was fifteen miles north of Lamar and a mile north of the Prowers County line. It was conceived as a planned recreational community and was the first community in Kiowa County to incorporate: September 22, 1910. The plat for Queen Beach was prepared by the Ball Land and Engineering Company and filed August 26, 1908 on behalf of the Queen Beach Resort and Amusement Company.

The site is at the southeast corner of Neeskah Reservoir. Apparently this was first known as Kings Reservoir, which led to the name choice of Queens Beach. The resort enjoyed considerable local popularity until World War I which dampened activity. The Dust Bowl years brought an end to the resort and for years only the foundation of the saloon remained. Even that has now disappeared.

The location is on the east side of County Road 49, one mile north of the county line. The reservoir is to the west of the road and in 1997 it seemed to be no longer in use.





SEGREGANSET

Segreganset was a rural post office about twelve miles north of Hasty in Bent County and approximately 16 miles southwest of Eads, two miles north of the county line.

In 1997 the site is open fields with no sign of former habitation. From that, I suspect that it was never more than a ranch that provided postal services for other ranches in the area. There is no direct road to the site. The easiest, fewest turns, is to go three miles west of Eads to County Road 37, turn south eight miles to County Road H, then west six miles to County Road 31 and finally south 5 miles, just south of County Road D, to the site of Segreganset. This location can be reached from the east, turning west from County Road 49, going around the south end of the reservoirs and then west to County Road 31 and eventually to the location south of Road D. Be sure you have a full gas tank, this is lonely country.

SHERIDAN LAKE

Even before the railroad entered Colorado, land speculators were acquiring lands along the right-of-way. They incorporated the Sheridan Lake Town Company, created an elaborate town plat and began selling town lots. The actual plat is no longer in existence, probably having been lost when the Bent County Court House burned. The village itself came into existence in 1887. On April 11, 1889, when Kiowa County was carved from Bent County, Sheridan Lake was designated as the county seat. In 1902 it would lose that honor to Eads.

The town promoters are responsible for the name. The townsite was near some large buffalo wallows, which in real estate terms became a beautiful lake. The same promoters also claimed that this "lake" was the most favorite camping spot in all of eastern Colorado for General Phil Sheridan. Historians doubt that General Sheridan ever visited the location and the beautiful lake; well, the buffalo are gone but it is still a big stretch of one's imagination to call it a lake.

Throughout its existence, Sheridan Lake has been an important supply center for the ranches and farms in eastern Kiowa County and the surrounding area. With grain elevators and stockyards it was a shipping point for produce from much of Kiowa County. Those activities continue today, however, to a lesser extent than in the past.

The full relation of Sheridan Lake and Bee is not completely clear. Both the Bee and the Sheridan Lake post offices were located in Section 25, T18S R44W, along the railroad and what is now Colorado Highway 96. Bee was in the northwest quarter of the section and Sheridan Lake was in the northeast quarter, thus the sites were within a mile of each other. The dates of operational overlap and the change in name, more likely a physical move, from Bee to Sheridan Lake was temporarily reversed before settling into place as Sheridan Lake A Bee postmark was still in use three months after the change.



STEWART

Stewart was another of the small communities that arose along the route of the Pueblo and State Line Railroad as the railroad traversed Kiowa County. Located halfway between Sheridan Lake and Towner, and 8 plus miles east of the state line, Stewart had a siding, a few dwellings and a grain elevator. In 1997 the only thing at the site was a large ranch complex on the south side of Highway 96.

STEWART – Continued

The origin of the name is unknown. Apparently it was not for a local resident as there was confusion as to how the name should be spelled: Stewart or Stuart? Both versions appear on maps. The Post Office Department knew it as Stewart from 1888 to 1899 when the office closed. However, in 1910 when the post office reopened for a two year run, the accepted spelling was Stuart. Also, from the descriptions on the Post Office Department Geographic Site Location Reports, the original Stewart would have been on the north side of the present-day highway and later Stuart on the south side of the highway.



SWEETWATER

Sweetwater, like Segreganset, was a rural post office in south-central Kiowa County. A visit to the site leads to the conclusion that Sweetwater was a ranch that for some ten years provided postal service to the area west of the large irrigation storage reservoirs.

To reach the site, drive eight and one half miles south from Eads on County Road 40, turn west on Road G for one half mile then continue south on Road 40 (It should be Road 39.5) four miles to Road C. Turn east to the drainage from one of the reservoirs. In 1997 there was still some debris near the road intersection, a farm road north along the creek goes through what appears to have been a ranch yard with a corral and buildings.



TOWNER

Towner was founded by the Missouri Pacific Railroad and was named for an official of the railroad. Several of the original settlers were from Tennessee and they had chosen Memphis as the name for their community. The railroad had other desires and prevailed over the residents.

The community was never a large one but it did provide supplies and services for an area that extended into western Kansas. Although the post office has closed, the community has a church and a community hall to meet the social needs of the residents and a grain elevator, some small stores and several homes. In 1962 a new school was built to serve the residents of Towner, Sheridan Lake and Brandon.

In March of 1931 Towner made national headlines when a school bus with twenty-two children was trapped by a heavy spring snowstorm. The bus driver started on foot for help and died only a few miles from the bus. Before help arrived, five children in the stranded bus had frozen to death. Bryan Untiedt was the hero as he kept the children moving, playing games and doing exercises until they were rescued.

Towner is at the extreme eastern end of the county, a little more than two miles west of the state line and at the intersection of Colorado Highway 96 with County Road 78

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

WATER VALLEY

Water Valley was the only Kiowa County post office north of the railroad. It was established as an agricultural development and community along Big Sandy Creek. A shortage of reliable water doomed successful farming and today the countryside relies on deep well irrigation or is primarily grazing land.

To reach the site from Brandon drive west one mile to County Road 59. Turn north three and one half miles to County Road S, turn west one mile to County Road 58, then north. Water Valley was on the west side of Road 58. There are a few farms in the area but most of it is open fields.


