

LOGAN COUNTY

Logan County is in the northeastern corner of Colorado. When Colorado Territory was created the area that became Logan County was included in Weld County. On February 25, 1887 Logan County was authorized by the Colorado Legislature, with Sterling as the county seat. At that time the county extended to the eastern border of the state. In 1889, the eastern portion of the county was severed to create Phillips County (March 27) and Sedgwick County (April 9). The county boundaries have remained unchanged since then.

The area of Logan County played an important part in the early history of Colorado. The South Platte River Valley, which bisects the county from southwest to northeast, was one of the major routes to the mountains during the gold rush of 1859. The river provided an easy to follow route as well as a source of water for the Fifty-niners. The completion of the Transcontinental Railroad and a rail connection from Cheyenne south to Denver reduced the importance of the South Platte River Route but in the early 1880's the construction by the Union Pacific of the Ogden, Denver, and Salt Lake Railroad from Julesburg to Denver restored the importance of the valley route. In the twentieth century the development of major highways along the river culminating with the construction of Interstate 76 continued the importance of the route.

In addition to the Union Pacific's line, The Burlington Railroad entered Colorado from the east. It came through Phillips County to Sterling in Logan County. From Sterling the Burlington continued west to Cheyenne, Wyoming. A few years later with the construction of a branch line from Alliance, Nebraska, through Sidney, Nebraska to Sterling, the Burlington added another railroad to Logan County.

All of these railroads and highways have been critical to the movement of livestock and farm produce from Logan County to markets.

The earliest route through Logan County was the Overland Trail that was on the southern side of the South Platte River. This was the route for the early stages and emigrants coming to Colorado. Several stage stations were within the boundaries of Logan County. From the east they were: Spring Hill, Riverside Ranche, Lillian Springs, Dennisons Station, Washington Ranche (Fort Moore), Valley Station, Wisconsin Ranche, American Ranche and Holon Godfrey's station. Only Fort Moore, Lillian Springs and American Ranche had post offices.

During the Indian troubles of the early 1860's Lillian Springs and American Ranche were raided and burned. Holon Godfrey's station was attacked but it survived and earned the name "Fort Wicked" for its spirited defense.

The construction of the railroad on the northern side of the South Platte River put an end to the Overland Trail and the stations along the trail.

Logan County has an extensive network of county roads. Most remain unpaved but they are well-graded and easy to drive. During my visits in 1996 the county roads were numbered, not named. The numbering begins at the west county line with Road 1 and increments by 2 for each mile to the east (1, 3, 5, etc.). At the south county line the first is Road 2 and the number increments by 2 to the north (2, 4, 6, etc.). This is a simple system to follow once it is learned and it is one that several other Colorado counties have adopted. Usually there is a change in the directions of the numbering schemes when a county line is crossed.

There are several state highways. Colorado 14 goes west from Sterling. Colorado 63 goes south from Atwood to Akron, Colorado 61 goes south from Sterling to US 36, Colorado 55 runs north-south in the eastern portion of the county and Colorado 113 runs north from US Highway 138 through Peetz to Sidney, Nebraska.

The Federal Highways are US 6 which enters from Phillips County, parallels the Burlington Railroad to Sterling then follows the Union Pacific and the South Platte River west to Denver. US 138 parallels the Union Pacific and the South Platte from Sterling east to Julesburg. In the twenty-first century, the dominant highway is Interstate 76. This highway connects Interstate 80 at Julesburg to Interstate 70 and Interstate 25 at Denver. It parallels the South Platte River on the southern side and fortunately has easy connections to Crook, Proctor, Iliff, Sterling and Merino.

The South Platte River dominates the topography of Logan County. From the north a number of intermittent small streams drain south to the river. Pawnee Creek in the western portion of the county is the largest of these streams. The series of bluffs to the south of the river restrict to a narrow band the drainage northward to the South Platte. Southeastern Logan County drains to the eastward.

Logan County is a part of the high plains. The land is a rolling countryside broken by the numerous streams. To the north the Pawnee Buttes and escarpment rise above the average land surface.

With an end to the Indian troubles the agricultural possibilities of the South Platte Valley and the surrounding plains became obvious. At first cattle dominated the area with several very large ranches running thousands of head of cattle. The LF Ranch of John Wesley Iliff was the most famous. The Homestead Act brought in settlers who because of a few years of above normal rainfall were tricked into believing that the countryside could easily support farming. A return to normal, and below normal, rainfall brought reality and many homesteaders abandoned the country. The development of irrigation from cooperative ditches and from deep wells coupled with the development of dry land farming techniques gave a new burst of life to agriculture.

Once again nature struck and the Dust Bowl years brought another downturn in agricultural activity. As the twentieth century drew to a close, new factors intruded on agriculture in Logan County. The insatiable demand for water by Denver and other Front Range urban communities saw the sale of water rights to the thirsty cities. Deeper and deeper wells are required to tap the falling water level in the Ogallala Aquifer.


Logan County is still largely agricultural but ranching has once again increased while grain and sugar beet production has declined. To the north some abandoned ranches have reverted to the public domain and become part of the Pawnee National Grassland.

During the history of the county there were numerous attempts to establish towns beyond the limits of the South Platte Valley or along the railroads. Of those, only Willard has barely survived.

Sterling has become a small city and an attractive community. The presence of the Burlington and Union Pacific Railroads and its status as the county seat support its economy. With the demise of the other towns, Sterling has become the prime shopping and supply center for a large portion of northeastern Colorado.

AMERICAN RANCH

There exists considerable confusion about who established and who ran the early stage station known as American Ranche.

Several sources mention that Jim and Charlie Moore came from Ohio to Colorado in 1859 and that the started the American Ranche. There is other evidence that they started Valley Station. Perhaps they were involved with both stations. Another name associated with the American Ranche is Morrison for an early family who settled there. Local legend says that Uncle Jimmy Chambers was the first to settle at the site.

Another name for the site that appears on some maps is Kelleys. This actually has some logic, as the first postmaster was William A. Kelley, however he was not appointed until 1863 and the stage station was in operation before then.

One final name appears in the history, that of Holon Godfrey. It is claimed that in September of 1867 the original site was abandoned and the American Ranch Post Office was moved to Godfrey's Fort Wicked Station. Godfrey is recorded as the American Ranch Postmaster from September 2, 1867 to November 25, 1867. At that time Godfrey packed up and moved to the mouth of the Big Thompson River and the American Ranch Post Office was gone for good.

The history of the American Ranch Post Office was tied to the Overland Trail route along the south bank of the South Platte River. It was first a station for the Jones and Russell's Pikes Peak Express, later the Central Overland California and Pikes Peak Express Company. It continued as a stage station and a rest stop for freighters on the Overland Trail until the completion of the transcontinental railroad in 1869 when most freight went to Cheyenne, Wyoming then south to Denver.

The American Ranche had its share of trouble. In August 1864 there was a fire of unknown origin but the store was saved and the station was rebuilt. On January 14, 1865 Indians struck, massacred seven inhabitants and burned the buildings. Neither the Moores nor Kelley were resident at that time.

The precise location of the American Ranche has also been one of speculation. One nebulous report placed it south of Atwood. The most reliable location is that shown on the map that is part of the informational brochure produced by the Overland Trail Museum in Sterling. That map shows it to be southeast of Merino and on the south side of the South Platte River.

From US Highway 6 in Merino, take the road south that crosses the South Platte River. After crossing the river, the road curves east and encounters a T intersection. Turn south and in about a half mile you will find a marker on the west side of the road honoring Jimmy Chambers. This monument can also be reached by continuing west from Merino on US 6 across the South Platte River. Take the first road east for one mile and turn north for one mile. The monument is all there is to see. It reads: "JIMMY CHAMBERS First Permanent settler in South Platte, Second in Logan County, March 1872. He claimed this land east of Old American Ranch Stage Station, helped dig the first ditch called "Fort Wicked" later South Platte. Gave one acre for a school and for a school district in what was to be Logan County. Dedication by Centennial Committee." Some of the claims in this inscription do not match with other historical information.

ARMSTRONG


Armstrong was a rural post office in the extreme northern portion of Logan County, only a half-mile south of the Colorado-Nebraska State line. It is likely there was a ranch there that provided postal service for other ranches in a large portion of northwestern Logan County.

The community was named for the first postmaster, William S. Armstrong.

To reach the site of Armstrong begin where Logan County Road 78 intersects Colorado Highway 113 and the tracks of the Burlington Northern Railroad from Sterling to Alliance, Nebraska. This is about two miles northeast of Peetz and it was also the location of Laura, Colorado. Drive eighteen miles west on County Road 78. In 1996 there was a well, a couple of cisterns and some watering tanks on the north side of the road. There was no evidence of buildings but the presence of the well argues for some form of habitation in the past.

If you continue west for three miles to County Road 9, then turn south you will be on the road that goes to Westplains.



ARNOLD

The Arnold Post Office served farmers and ranchers in the southwestern portion of Logan County from 1892 to 1900. In 1888 the Burlington Northern Railroad's Lincoln Land Company subsidiary platted a townsite a short distance south of the Arnold Post Office and named it Willard. That community was slow in developing. However, in 1900 the Arnold Post Office moved to a location closer to the railroad and became the Willard Post Office.

From US Highway 6 in Merino drive north five miles and then turn west. Seven miles west will bring you to the road intersection in Willard. The Arnold Post Office was 800 feet north of the railroad, which would place it on the edge of the small community of Willard.

ATWOOD

Atwood was established in 1885 when Victor Wilson brought a group of farmers from Abilene, Kansas to the site and formed an agricultural colony. The town of Atwood was platted on July 29, 1885.

The site was an advantageous one as it was located on the Union Pacific Railroad and much of the town's early growth came from its being a shipping point for the area farmers and ranchers. In the midtwentieth century Atwood provided services to travelers on US Highway 6, however that trade was largely lost when Interstate 76 was built on the south side of the South Platte River.

Victor Wilson was a Unitarian by faith and he chose to name the community for The Rev. John S. Atwood, a Unitarian minister in Boston, Massachusetts.


Atwood is on US Highway 6, six miles southeast of Sterling at the intersection with Colorado Highway 63. It is still an active community with a modest number of homes and a few small businesses.

BEREA (Never Established)

In 1911 a post office, to be named Berea, was requested. However there is no evidence that a post office for Berea was ever approved.

The proposed location is two miles east of the Logan-Weld County line. To reach this site follow the directions to Graylin (at the intersection of Logan County Roads 15 and 44). Drive west five miles. The stated location was a mile north of Road 44 but the area is a wide-open field with no sign of any habitation or structure.

At the time the request for the Berea Post Office was submitted the Graylin Post Office was in operation only five miles to the east. That proximity, combined with a developing Rural Free Delivery system may have been the reasons Berea was not authorized.

BUFFALO

Buffalo began as another agricultural colony on the north side of the South Platte River. When the members of the colony arrived there were already two families living in the area: The Rasmus Nelson and the Johnny Doughty families. Rasmus Nelson was twice appointed postmaster for Buffalo. In December 1873 a newspaper reported: "A new town called Buffalo is to be started on the Julesburg Road, opposite the old American Ranche, 78 miles below Greeley. Being in the center of a fine country, it will become a prosperous town providing the Denver people do not drain the Platte." [How little things change.]

The colony and the community struggled for several years but by 1881 it was obvious that the Omaha, Denver and Salt Lake branch of the Union Pacific would soon reach the town. The railroad arrived in August and soon a town plat of 640 acres and 160 blocks had been filed.

Originally named for the "Buffalo Colony," the railroad decided a different name was needed, ostensibly because there was another Buffalo somewhere else along the railroad. The name change took place in February 1883. Merino is a breed of sheep that was being raised along the railroad.

The location given in the 1874 Geographic Site Location Report is approximately a mile west of the present community of Merino. Since this was seven years before the arrival of the railroad it is possible that it was at that location, which now is open rangeland. A different, more reasonable site is on the north side of US Highway 6 on the western edge of Merino.




CALVERT

Initially the siding on the Burlington Northern Railroad was called 29 Mile Siding. When a post office was obtained it took the name Calvert for a railroad superintendent, Elwood Calvert.

The Lincoln Land Company, a Burlington subsidiary, laid out a townsite a half-mile west of the siding and Calvert. This new townsite was named Fleming, for H. B. Fleming, a representative of the Lincoln Land Company. In less than a year the post office was moved from Calvert to Fleming.

Calvert was one of several sidings along the Burlington Northern Railroad that served as shipping points for local farms and ranches. Some of these sidings developed into supply towns for the ranches and farms.

The actual site of Calvert is on US Highway 6 about twenty miles east of Sterling and a half-mile east of Fleming. The Fleming Post Office is in a well-maintained and attractive brick building that was previously the First National Bank.

Chenoa was a small agricultural community developed by a group of families that came to Colorado from Chenoa, Illinois. It was located on a wagon road from Haxtun to Fleming. The realities of farming in the dry lands of Eastern Colorado soon became apparent and the community faded as settlers moved on to more suitable lands.

The name was in memory of the hometown of the original settlers. The original spelling was Chenowa, a Cherokee word that has been interpreted as either, "white dove" or "dark and bloody ground"; a real contrast in meanings.

From US Highway 6 in Dailey drive south 7 miles on Logan County Road 91 to the intersection with County Road 18. There is a group of old ranch buildings on the west side of the road that correspond with the location of Chenoa as given in the Geographic Site Location Report. One mile south is another old ranch complex and two miles south is where Glenn Scott locates Chenoa on his *Historic Trail Maps: Sterling Quadrangle*.

CROOK

Crook was established in 1881 with the arrival of the Omaha and Denver Railroad, a branch of the Union Pacific. The town was named for Brevet Major General George Crook, commander of the Military Department of the Platte from 1875 to 1882. At first Crook was little more than a siding where livestock from surrounding ranches could be shipped to market.

In 1893 the Holland Company attempted to establish an agricultural colony at Crook but this endeavor soon failed. In the early 1900's Crook began to grow and the Cedar Valley Land and Irrigation Company filed a town plat on February 20, 1909. The town of Crook was incorporated in 1918.

Crook continues to survive as a small community of homes with a few small businesses and is still a shipping point for agricultural products from northeastern Logan County.

Crook is located on the north side of the South Platte River, on US Highway 138, eight miles west of the Logan-Sedgwick County line. The Crook Post Office is in a small white building on the north side of the highway. The building has the appearance of once having been a gasoline station and garage serving travelers on US 138. The construction of Interstate 76 has diverted that kind of business to other more convenient locations.





DAILEY

In June 1914 the Burlington Railroad constructed a siding three miles east of the Logan-Phillips County line. They named the siding Dailey after James Dailey, a trainmaster for the railroad. Although initiated by the railroad, the town of Dailey was not a product of the Burlington's subsidiary, the Lincoln Land Company. Six months later, December 21, 1914, the town of Dailey was incorporated. W. B. Ford is considered the town father and founder.

Mrs. Mabel Markham opened the Dailey Cash Store and for fifty plus years the building was used as a grocery store, dry goods store, post office, restaurant and boarding house. In October of 1923 the store/post office was robbed with a loss of goods from the store and stamps and currency from the post office.

Dailey grew into a small community with the store, grain storage and shipping facilities and a number of homes. There are still several residences at Dailey and the grain storage facility may be in use. However the Dailey Cash Store has been moved from Dailey to the Overland Trail Museum in Sterling. The building is on the museum grounds and has been restored, including the post office section.

Dailey is on US Highway 6, three miles west of the Logan-Phillips County line and 6 miles east of Fleming. It is a good place to begin a tour of the several rural post offices in the southeastern portion of Logan County.



FLEMING

This town was established by the Burlington Railroad in 1889 and was first named Twenty-nine Mile Siding. The Twenty-nine Mile name was a reference to the distance from the siding to Haxtun in Phillips County. In December 1887, anticipating the arrival of the railroad, a post office was opened a short distance east of the eventual siding and operated briefly as Calvert. With the arrival of the railroad in 1881, the post office moved west to the siding and took the name of Fleming for H. B. Fleming, a representative of the Lincoln Land Company, a Burlington Railroad subsidiary.

Fleming was platted as a town in 1889 but was not incorporated until 1917.

Fleming is still an active community with a number of residences but like so many towns in Eastern Colorado the business section is in slow decline. There are still a few small businesses to serve day to day needs of residents. The Fleming Post Office now occupies the former First National Bank building. The brick bank building has been restored and is well maintained. It is a visual treat in distinct contrast to the catalog architecture of so many modern post offices.

Fleming is located on US Highway 6, about twenty miles east of Sterling.





FORT MOORE

The Fort Moore Post Office was at another of the stage stations on the early main stage route along the south side of the South Platte River. Very little is known about it or its precise location.

It is reported that Jim and Charley Moore built a toll road between Valley Station and the Washington Ranche and renamed the Ranche as Fort Moore. James A. Moore was the one and only postmaster for Fort Moore. Valley Station was also on the south side of the South Platte River about three miles down river from Sterling.

From Iliff drive southwest on US Highway 138 to a crossroads community known as Ford where there is a small grain elevator and some storage tanks. Turn east onto a dirt road and cross the railroad and the South Platte River. This should be Logan County Road 40. Continue east to the intersection with County Road 49. Turn south for one mile to where the road makes a short turn west before again turning south. The best information I have placed Fort Moore about a half mile west of this short jog. The site is mostly screened from the road by trees but appears to be open pasture with no remnant structures.

There is an error in the Records of Postmaster Appointments. Fort Moore was first listed under Gilpin County. It is further reported as "moved" to Weld County.

GRAYLIN

Graylin was a rural post office in the central portion of western Logan County. It served ranchers in a large section of the county. The original application for the Graylin Post Office suggested the name Martinsburg. That choice was a reflection of the proposed postmaster - Mrs. Sadie A. Martin. I have found no explanation for the name Graylin.

The early twentieth century was a time when, employing dry land farming techniques and irrigation from deep wells, agriculture in eastern Colorado was expanding. However, it was also a time of expansion for the Rural Free Delivery System. As that system grew in coverage many of the rural farm and ranch post offices were no longer needed. The ranchers could now have mail delivered to their front gate and not have to travel several miles to collect their mail and newspapers.

To reach the site of Graylin begin in Sterling, drive eight miles west on Colorado Highway 14 to Logan County Road 25. Turn north five miles to Road 38 and then west four and one half miles to Road 15. From the intersection of Roads 38 and 15 drive north to the intersection of Roads 44 and 15. The stated location for Graylin is the southwest quarter of that intersection.

The area surrounding the intersection consists of open fields with only trace signs that there was once something there. Approximately a half-mile to the south, on the east side of Road 15 there is an active ranch that would have been served by the Graylin Post Office.


From Graylin you can continue west to the proposed location for Berea and then north to Westplains and Armstrong. A long, scenic loop across the north part of Logan County would take you to Laura, Peetz, Logan and back to US Highway 138 near Red Lion.

ILIFF

John Wesley Iliff came to Colorado with the gold rush of 1859. In 1861 he turned from prospecting to cattle and began acquisition of land along the South Platte River. Eventually his cattle empire included nine ranches from Greeley to Julesburgh. He held title to 20,000 acres and by control of water rights controlled an additional 650,000 acres of grazing land.

His home ranch was the LF which included the old Riverside Stage Station. The arrival of the railroad in 1881 led to the formation of a townsite, which included the ranch headquarters and was named Iliff. The site was platted in 1887 and Iliff was incorporated in 1926. Upon the death of John W. Iliff, a large portion of his estate went to found the Iliff School of Theology at the University of Denver.

From its inception, Iliff was a cattle town providing services and supplies to the LF and other ranches as well as being the principal shipping point for livestock from the surrounding area. Iliff is still an active but small community on US Highway 138 near the center of Logan County and ten miles northeast of Sterling.


In May 1996 I spent a few days in the Logan County area visiting the post office sites. On May 13, while on my way back to Sterling I encountered traffic congestion. It turned out to be the Olympic Torch Relay on its way out of Denver. Naturally I stopped to watch the process. I discovered that they don't necessarily "run" the torch all the way. In this case there was a State Police Motorcade and two or three people on bicycles - no runners. Apparently they only do the running through towns and places where they can attract attention. Fortunately I was westbound, because there was a long backup behind the eastbound relay.


W. C. Kelly was one of the group of homesteaders who settled in this area in the mid-1880's. The drought of the 1880's nearly eliminated the community but somehow it struggled on into the twentieth century. By 1909 improvements in dry land agriculture brought a resurgence of farm activity in the area. A one-room frame store was opened and for a few years a post office, named for W. C. Kelly, operated in

the store. As the roads and transportation improved it seems likely that the Kelly Post Office fell victim to the expanding Rural Free Delivery system.

From the site of Le Roy at the intersection of Logan County Roads 71 and 16, drive south three miles to County Road 10. Turn west and drive west five miles to Colorado Highway 61 (County Road 61). Turn south for two miles and then west on County Road 6 for two miles to the site of Kelly in the northeast corner of the intersection of County Roads 6 and 57.

North of the intersection there is an abandoned church or school and a cemetery. There is a recent, occupied residence at the intersection and another, older residence in a clump of trees a short distance to the east.



LAURA

The post office at Laura preceded the one at Peetz by a few months. The town was founded by H. C. McKibben [SRM: Harry C. McKibben is listed as Postmaster in Beulah, Colorado in 1918, but Harry B. McKibben is listed in *Appts of Postmasters* for Laura in 1908] and was located on the proposed route of the Burlington Railroad from Alliance, Nebraska to Sterling, Colorado. However, when the railroad chose a site for a station, two miles to the southwest at what became Peetz the development of Laura ceased and everything eventually moved to Peetz.

The location of Laura was one-half mile south of the Nebraska-Colorado State line at the junction of Logan County Road 78 with Colorado Highway 113. The railroad is on the west side of Highway 113. No structures remain in the vicinity of the site. Jim Ozment did find a photograph of the Laura Post Office. In the photograph, the small, rather crude frame building stands isolated from any other building.

To reach the site simply drive north on Colorado 113 from US Highway 138 to County Road 78, just south of the state line.





LE ROY/LEROY

A town plat for Le Roy was filed on February 14, 1889 by Michael Thinigan. A small community developed and survived the drought of the 1890's. It was an agricultural community with minimal services for residents of the area.

I have found no information as to the source of the name. In 1895, in its fervor to shorten post office names, the Post Office Department changed the spelling from Le Roy to Leroy.

From the site of Chenoa at the intersection of Logan County Roads 91 and 18 drive west on Road 18. Five miles west of Chenoa you will come to St. Petersburg. This is a tiny community centered on a large, brick Catholic Church. As far as I can determine there was not a post office at St. Petersburg, certainly not by that name. Inquiries to a couple residents provided no information. Continue west another five miles (ten miles from the Chenoa site) to County Road 71 and turn south.

The Leroy Cemetery is in the southeast corner of this intersection and is properly marked. The location for Le Roy, provided by the Geographic Site Location Report is one mile south of the cemetery and in the northwest corner of the intersection of County Roads 16 and 71. There is a single building, perhaps a former school, on the west side of Road 17. At the intersection there is a well-constructed, stone historical marker. The marker reads: "This marker commemorates our pioneer forefathers who erected the first Evangelical Church of Leroy from native limestone on this site October 20, 1889. Their valiant courage, vision, and faith to God is an inspiration and guiding light to the present and future generations." Another plaque reads: "Dedicated October 24, 1976." The marker sits on the edge of an open field and there is no remaining evidence of the church building.





LILLIAN SPRINGS

Lillian Springs was one of the very early stage stations on the stage route that ran along the south side of the South Platte River. Of the several stations in Logan County three had post offices: Lillian Springs, Fort Moore (Washington Ranche) and American Ranche. Since these post offices were placed in operation several years before the Federal Land Survey was applied to the area it is difficult to pin down their locations other than approximately. Published descriptions are often conflicting. The source in which I place the most confidence is the USGS map, *Historic Trail Maps of the Sterling 1°x2° Quadrangle, Northeastern Colorado* prepared by Glenn R. Scott.

Scott locates Lillian Springs three miles east of the road that connects Interstate 76 to US Highway 6 at Proctor. Just south of the bridge over the South Platte River, Logan County Road 38.5 runs east a mile and a half to a ranch complex. I drove a short distance beyond the ranch before the road disappeared. I was not three miles in, so likely I did not get to the site of Lillian Springs. However, near the point where I turned around, there was a swampy area perhaps indicative of one or more springs. Could this have been Lillian Springs?

The ranch I drove through included several old buildings. It was at a point that corresponds to a location on Glenn Scott's map that he identifies as "W. S. Coburn Ranch near here."

Interstate 76 is elevated above the South Platte River flood plain. I drove west on the Interstate to Mile Post 145. From there I had a good overview of the valley and the supposed location of Lillian Springs. Other than farm and ranch land there was nothing to observe.

It should be noted that the map included in the Overland Trail Museum brochure places Lillian Springs west of the road from Proctor to I-76.

Logan is another place in Logan County for which an application for a post office and a Geographical Site Location Report were filed but the office was never authorized. Like Armstrong and Laura the location is on Logan County Road 78 a half-mile south of the Colorado-Nebraska border.

Drive two miles northeast from Peetz on Colorado Highway 113 to County Road 78 and then turn east. The proposed location for Logan was eleven miles from Colorado 113. A short distance east of the intersection of County Roads 78 and 73 there is a ranch complex to the south of Road 78. This is in the right spot for Logan. The ranch includes a nice old house and does not appear to be abandoned.

MERINO

This town was first established in 1874 and was known as Buffalo until the Omaha, Denver, and Salt Lake branch of the Union Pacific reached the site in the very early 1880's. In 1883 the railroad arbitrarily dictated a change in name, supposedly to avoid confusion with another Buffalo on the railroad. The town plat for Merino was filed by the Corona Cattle Company on August 10, 1906.

The story is that a man named N. Workman looked out a window and saw some sheep. Merino was a popular breed at the time and whether or not the railroad man could separate a Merino sheep from a prairie dog, Merino became the new name. It seems ironic that a town in cattle country that had once been the great buffalo range should eventually be named for a breed of sheep. Please refer to the discussion of Buffalo for the early history of this town.

Merino is located in the southwestern corner of Logan County, on US Highway 6 some three miles east of the county line and on the north side of the South Platte River. The town is still a modest size community with residences and a few small businesses catering to local farmers and ranchers.

NEW HAVEN

It is claimed that New Haven was founded by a group of easterners that came to Colorado for their health and was named for their hometown. Although an intriguing story, surely they could have found a less isolated site than one that was out on the high, dry plains, twenty miles from the more settled towns along the South Platte River.

The residents did successfully engage in dry land farming and were even able to survive the Dust Bowl years of the 1930's. New Haven is still an active but small community with a few residences and a modest size grain storage facility. The New Haven Cemetery is marked.

You have two choices to visit the site of New Haven. From the intersection of County Roads 16 and 71 at Leroy, drive south three miles to County Road 10 and turn east. At three miles you will pass the claimed 1914 location for the New Haven Post Office - open fields. Continue east to County Road 79 and turn south one mile to the present day and 1910 location of New Haven at the intersection with County Road 8.

The second route to New Haven begins after your visit to the site of Rockland. From the intersection of County Roads 4 and 93 drive north on Road 93 one mile to Road 6 and turn west. Drive seven miles west to County Road 79 and then north one mile to New Haven.

PADRONI

When the Burlington Railroad built through the area about 1899 the railroad established a section house at what would eventually become the community of Padroni. There was no real development of the town until 1909 when the Sterling Reservoir was built about five miles west of Padroni. Padroni became the supply depot for the construction project. With the development of sugar beet farming in the area it also became a sugar beet collection depot and shipping point for the Great Western Sugar Company.

The town was named for the brothers George and Tom Padroni who were farmers in the area. On January 22, 1910 George E. Clayton and A. V. Hunt filed a town plat for Padroni.

PADRONI - Continued

To reach Padroni, drive northeast from Sterling on US Highway 138 to Logan County Road 43.5 (Three miles to the north this becomes Road 43). Padroni is on Road 43 seven miles north of US 138.

The present community consists of a number of small homes many of which seem abandoned. I did not see any businesses or a recognizable business district. In 1996 the post office was in a home on the west side of the road and the railroad about 400 feet north of the junction of Roads 43 and 48.



PEETZ

Peetz is a farming center in the far north central portion of Logan County. It was originally established in 1889 and was known as Mercer until 1908.

In 1899 Mercer became a stop on the Burlington Railroad from Alliance (Nebraska) to Sterling. It had a depot and a section house and not much else.

In 1908 the town was platted and renamed for a pioneer homesteader, Peter Peetz. The name change was likely instigated when the application was made for a post office. At the time there was a Mercier Post Office in Pueblo County and the similarity of names may have brought about the change. The town of Peetz was incorporated in 1917.

Peetz is located on the west side of Colorado Highway 113 about three miles south of the Colorado-Nebraska State line. The post office is at the western end of the main street that begins at the highway. There are a few small businesses and in general the business district is in better condition than is

found in many similar towns of eastern Colorado. The distance, some twenty-five or more miles to larger towns helps support the local businesses. There are a good number of small homes in Peetz.

Local pride is evident in the annual "For Peetz Sake Days" festival.



PROCTOR

Until 1906 Proctor was little more than a siding on the Union Pacific branch line to Denver. That year, a group of investors from Iowa under the name The Logan County Development Company, purchased 5,000 acres of the Powell and Blair ranch. Under the direction of J. D. Blue forty acres of the ranch were set aside for development as a town. The town plat for Proctor was filed in 1908.

Some local sources claim that the town was named for a General Proctor who participated with General Crook in the Indian campaigns of the 1860's. It seems more likely that the name commemorates Redfield Proctor, a former governor of Vermont who served as Secretary of War under President Benjamin Harrison. Proctor was elected to three terms in the United States Senate and died in 1908 the same year the Proctor Post Office was established.

Proctor has not survived the changes of the twentieth century as well as the other towns along US 138 and US 6 on the north side of the South Platte River. The post office closed in 1963 and only a few buildings and no businesses remain at Proctor. It does have a connection to Interstate 76 on the south side of the river.

Proctor is located on US Highway 138 seven miles east of Iliff and seven miles west of Crook. Latitude = 40:48:25 North Longitude = 102:57:04 West

RED LION

Two men from York, Nebraska, F. O. Bell and E. O. Wright had a hand in the origins of Red Lion. F. O. Bell was a rancher and lumberman. He purchased land in Logan County a short distance west of the Sedgwick County line. On November 5, 1886 E. O. Wright platted the site. Mr. Wright owned the Red Lion Flour Mill in York and the new town was given the name of his flour mill.

Red Lion was on the Union Pacific branch line from Julesburg to Denver and had a siding from which livestock could be shipped to market. In spite of the filing of a town plat, there is no evidence that an organized community developed. After an erratic early existence and a twenty-year hiatus, the Red Lion Post Office did enjoy a twenty-five year run serving local residents from 1910 to 1935.

Red Lion is on US Highway 138, one mile west of the Logan-Sedgwick County line. On the south side of the highway and the railroad is a single, active ranch with a gateway that proclaims it to be the Red Lion Ranch. There are no other nearby buildings.

From the Geographic Site Location Report it appears the requested name was Viola. The origin of that choice is unknown but perhaps the Post Office Department deemed it to be too similar to Vilas in Baca County and rejected it in favor of Red Lion.

ROCKLAND

Rockland was one of the group of agricultural communities founded in southwestern Logan County during the 1880's. On November 27, 1888, in anticipation that the Burlington Railroad would build through the area, a town plat was filed for Rockland. Ultimately the railroad selected a different route and without a railroad the town was stillborn. The name could still be found on Colorado maps for a few years. The name Rockland was chosen as representative of the rocky terrain of southeastern Logan County.

From US Highway 6 at Dailey drive south on Logan County Road 91 thirteen miles to County Road 6. Seven miles south from Dailey you pass the site of Chenoa. Turn east on Road 6 for one mile and then south one mile on Road 93. The location was in the northeast corner of the intersection with Road 4. Nothing remains at the location. From Rockland it would be convenient to go west to the locations of New Haven, Leroy and Kelly before going into Sterling.

The site of Rockland is two miles west of the Logan-Phillips County line and one mile north of the Logan-Yuma County line.

SARINDA

Sarinda was one of the earliest settlements in Logan County on the north side of the South Platte River. Nearly all of the earlier settlements were on the south side of the river along the Overland Trail from Julesburg to Denver.

In April 1871 William Shaw Hadfield (Uncle Billy) took up a claim at the confluence of Pawnee Creek and the South Platte River. The location soon became known as Hadfield's Island. By 1875 the settlement had grown to a dozen or more families with a post office named Sarinda. The area was excellent grazing land.

The site of Sarinda was about two miles southwest of Sterling. When the Burlington and the Union Pacific Railroads chose Sterling as a site for their rail yards Sterling became the dominant community and Sarinda faded into history. There is a large cemetery on the north side of US Highway 6. Sarinda was in the vicinity, but between the highway and the river. There are some modern buildings in the area but no older structures. There is an historical marker that notes The Hadfield's Island settlement of William Shaw Hadfield.

SOUTH PLATTE

South Platte was the earliest settled community in what is now Logan County. The settlement began in 1872 although there had been earlier farming and ranching in the area. The South Platte settlement was on the south side of the South Platte River in the area of the American Ranche and Godfrey's (Fort Wicked) stations on the Overland Trail. Construction on the north side of the river, of the Union Pacific Railroad from Julesburg to Denver eventually led to the demise of all of the original settlements along the Overland Trail in Logan County. Merino, originally Buffalo, was on the railroad opposite South Platte and displaced South Platte as a supply town.

From Merino drive west on US Highway 6 and cross the South Platte River. Less than a half-mile from the bridge, turn left on to County Road 4. South Platte was in this area to the east of US 6. There are active ranches and farms in the vicinity.

STERLING

Settlement on the northern side of the South Platte River, in the vicinity of Sterling began in the early 1870's. In 1871 William Shaw Hadfield located his ranch about two miles west of modern Sterling. Known as Hadfield's Island the settlement acquired a post office named Sarinda.

In 1873 a group of agricultural colonists settled at a site east of modern Sterling. In 1874 a post office was acquired and was named for Sterling, Illinois, the hometown of David Leavitt on whose ranch it was located. A few years later the colonists became aware of the plans of the Union Pacific to construct a branch railroad: the Omaha, Denver, and Salt Lake Railroad, from Julesburg to Denver. Minos C. King

went to Omaha and met with officials of the Union Pacific. King offered to donate eighty acres of land if the railroad would select the site for its shops. The railroad accepted the offer. In 1881 King platted the new town of Sterling about three miles southwest of Old Sterling. Soon the residents of Old Sterling had moved to New Sterling.


In 1887 the Burlington Railroad reached Sterling from the east and the same year Logan County was created with Sterling selected as the county seat. The Burlington Railroad would build on to Cheyenne and later would construct a branch line from Alliance, Nebraska to Sterling.

Thus, Sterling became a railroad hub for northeastern Colorado. In 1905 the Great Western Sugar Company built a refinery at Sterling and in 1941 the Northeastern Junior College was established in the city.

During the twentieth century, as roads improved and automobile travel increased, Sterling became an important service center for travel on US Highways 6 and 138. In the late twentieth century it would fill the same purpose for travelers on Interstate 76.

Throughout its history, Sterling has not lost contact with its origins as an agricultural center. It is the major supply and shopping center for northeastern Colorado and its economy continues to reflect the importance of agriculture in the area.

Sterling is a small city offering all of the modern conveniences to its residents and visitors.

I confess to some ambivalence as to the location of Old Sterling. According to the Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Reports (see below) the location was about one mile northeast of the center of modern Sterling. On the other hand, Glenn Scott, on his *Historic Trail Map of the Sterling Quadrangle* locates the site between US Highway 138 and the South Platte River, on the north side of Logan County Road 34. In any event, both of those locations are open farmland with no remaining older structures.







WESTPLAINS

Westplains was a rural post office in the northwestern corner of Logan County. The name is indicative of its location on the "western plains." Examination of the Geographic Site Location Reports for Westplains shows that the office moved frequently, usually with a change in postmaster. That supports the belief that the post office was at the ranch or farm home of whoever was the postmaster and that there was not an organized Westplains community.

From the site of Graylin continue west four miles to Logan County Road 7. Turn north for six miles. The road will turn east for one mile before it again turns north as Road 9. One-mile north, at Road 58, turn east. The 1910 and 1917 locations of the Westplains post office were a mile to the east. The 1910



site is north of Road 58 and the 1917 site is to the south of Road 58. There are no remaining structures at either of these locations. Return to the intersection of Roads 9 and 58 and turn north. A mile from the intersection there is a large, active ranch complex on the west side of Road 9. This was the location of Westplains in 1927 and apparently until it closed in 1949.



WILLARD

In the late 1880's the Burlington Railroad extended its line from Sterling, Colorado to Cheyenne, Wyoming. In the southwestern corner of Logan County the railroad passed a short distance south of the small, established settlement of Arnold. In 1888 the railroad platted a town that they named Willard. The new town was slow to grow. In 1910 the site was re-platted by William A. House and the post office was moved from Arnold to Willard.

Willard did develop into a small town with a grain elevator and shipping facilities for livestock and farm produce. There were also other small businesses to serve the residents of this portion of Logan County.

Willard is still a pleasant community with several homes, a grain elevator and a couple of agricultural related businesses. When I visited Willard in May 1996, there was a large, new home under construction on the east side of the community.

The name is attributed to Dan Willard who was president of the Burlington Railroad during the construction period in Logan County.

In March 1920 Raymond Mahoney was appointed postmaster for Willard. He served forty-six years, to October 1966. Mrs. Virginia Walters who was the acting postmaster until the Willard Post Office closed in July 1967 followed him.

From US Highway 6 in Merino, drive north five miles and then turn west. Seven miles west will bring you to Willard.


Winston was a rural post office located six miles southeast of Peetz on the east side of the Burlington Railroad. It provided postal services to a surrounding farms and ranchs but there is no evidence that there was an organized community.

From Peetz, drive six miles south on Colorado Highway 113 to Logan County Road 62. Turn west and go three miles to the railroad. The location of Winston was south of Road 62. There is an access road south along the railroad and near its end there is a group of abandoned buildings that seem a likely location for Winston. In addition, there are a windmill and a corral a quarter mile east of the railroad on Road 62. There is a signal station on the railroad, which is named East Buchanan.
