

# **PUEBLO COUNTY**

Pueblo was one of the original seventeen counties authorized on November 1, 1861 by the Colorado Territorial Legislature. The village of Pueblo was chosen as the county seat, and has continued in that role as Pueblo grew into a prominent city.

When Las Animas County was carved from Huerfano County on February 9, 1866 a portion of Huerfano County was added to Pueblo County, altering the southern boundary of the county. Since then the county boundaries have remained unchanged. El Paso County lies to the north; Crowley and Otero Counties mark the eastern boundary. Las Animas and Huerfano Counties are along the southern border. Custer and Fremont Counties form the western boundary of Pueblo County.

The county lies astride the Arkansas River, which drains the entire county. Several major streams feed into the Arkansas River. From the north Fountain Creek is the most prominent stream. From the south the St. Charles River, Greenhorn Creek and the Huerfano River are the major streams. Together with the Arkansas Riverz these streams are a source of water for irrigation in the bottomlands along their courses.

The western edge of the county is on the eastern slopes of the Wet Mountains, which culminate at Greenhorn Mountain (12,234 feet), in the southwest corner of the county. More than ninety percent of the county is east of the mountains. That portion is a rolling topography, in places sharply incised by the creeks and rivers that flow through it.

At first the area that comprises Pueblo County was the contested territory of the Ute and Comanche Indians. Occasionally other tribes encroached on the area. The Spaniards and the Mexicans explored the area and made some attempts at settlement but unsuccessfully so.

In the early 1800's exploration parties from the United States also entered the area but it was the trappers and mountain men that first established settlements. Trading posts related to the larger Bents Fort were established on Hardscrabble Creek and where Fountain Creek joins the Arkansas River was the settlement that would one day become Pueblo. These posts had hard times, as the Indians did not favor their presence. On Christmas Day 1854 the Utes attacked the "Pueblo" and the settlers were killed.

During the late 1840's and into the 1850's there were attempts to settle on the large land grants that had been made by the Mexican government prior to the annexation of the area by the United States. The most prominent of those was that of Charles Autobees on the Huerfano River near the Arkansas River

In 1858 the start of the Pikes Peak Gold Rush was the beginning of extensive settlement in Pueblo County. As the gold rush grew in intensity, the Arkansas River Valley became an important route for emigrants traveling to the mountain mining districts. A major north-south road developed along Fountain Creek and southward to connect Denver with Santa Fe and Taos. Pueblo, the county and the town, were at the crossing of these roads.

The crossroads position would be maintained with the coming of the railroads. The Atchison, Topeka and the Santa Fe from the east, and the Denver and Rio Grande from the north. Today the railroads are still there but Interstate 25 and US Highway 50 carry the passenger traffic and much of the freight.

The Missouri Pacific Railroad was another railroad that entered Pueblo County from the east and the Colorado and Southern – originally the Denver, Fort Worth, and New Orleans – came from Denver on its way to Trinidad and beyond.

For the most part mining played a minor role in the economy of Pueblo County. There were attempts at precious metal mining in the Wet Mountains but no major discoveries were made. Some coal

was mined but again not to the extent that took place in neighboring Huerfano and Fremont Counties. Sandstone and limestone quarries were also active in Pueblo County.

However a major steel industry did develop at Pueblo. The extensive, nearby deposits of coal and lime made it profitable to exploit iron deposits in other areas of Colorado and ship the ore to Pueblo for smelting. For many years the large steel mill of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company at Pueblo provided the city with a major employer and gave it the title of the "Steel City" or "Pittsburg of the West."

From the earliest days it was agriculture that contributed most to the economy of the county. The Arkansas Valley, with irrigation produced a wide variety market garden produce. The other major streams watered hayfields and grain fields. Away from the river livestock, mainly cattle, were fed on the extensive grasslands of Pueblo County.

The agricultural areas of Pueblo County foster a large number of rural post offices. Some developed into small communities. Others that were mainly ranch or farm post offices operated briefly before disappearing.

Pueblo has always been the center of population and activity in the county. In recent years the developments at Colorado City and Pueblo West have also become centers of population but they have not supplanted Pueblo as the commercial center for the county.

For the collector of postal history, Pueblo County seems to have a high number of these small post offices from which I have not yet recorded any postmarks.

A Warning: The road names or numbers used in the descriptions of the towns are the names that either I read from road signs when I visited the area or the names shown on a 1990s (?) version of *Colorado Atlas & Gazetteer* produced by DeLorme Mapping. It is my observation that Pueblo County, like El Paso County its neighbor to the north, is moving away from number or letter designations for county roads. Instead the roads are being given specific names; hence it is possible that there have been changes since my sources were created.

**Another comment:** At Avondale US Highway 50 divides with one branch being called US Highway 50 Business or Bypass. One branch is south of the Arkansas River, the other in north of the river. The DeLorme *Colorado Atlas and Gazetteer* labels the northern branch as US 50 Business. However, highway maps label the southern branch as US 50 Business. I have chosen to designate the northern branch as US 50 Bypass and the southern branch as US 50.

**Google Earth:** For some reason, Pueblo County seems to have more post offices for which there is no public access or whose location is unknown. I seek your help in identifying locations for the latter group. [SRM: Several of the post office locations are speculative. I have indicated such locations on the maps by placing a question mark after the post office name.]





Post Office Location Map – Western Pueblo County




Post Office Location Map – Eastern Pueblo County

#### **ABBEY**

Abbey was a rural post office on the road from Pueblo to Walsenburg. There is no indication or record, that it was more than a ranch or farm complex near the Greenhorn River. S. A. Abbey, the Pueblo Postmaster, filed the Site Location Report. Apparently this is another post office in this area that was named for a Pueblo Postmaster (see Crow).

The site of Abbey is on the east side of Interstate 25 about a mile north of Exit 77. Exit there and take the frontage road north. At the location of Abbey there is an underpass but no ramp to I-25. There is a large, well-kept ranch complex to the east of the interstate. In 2001 the ranch appeared to be the headquarters of the Cedarwood Land Development Company. Perhaps Abbey is about to become a community, more than a hundred years after it was established.



#### **AGATE**

Agate was a small settlement and rural post office on the St. Charles River. Located on the river, the river bottoms could be irrigated to grow crops. The surrounding countryside, away from the river, was good grazing land for livestock.

Take Exit 88 from Interstate 25 and go west on Burnt Mill Road. To begin this is Pueblo County Road 247. It soon becomes County Road 246 and then intersects County Road 230. By this route, the location of Agate was six miles from Interstate 25.

Agate was on the southeast side of the St. Charles River but in 2001 there was no road on that side of the river. From Burnt Mill Road I could see no evidence of buildings or a settlement south of the river. I did observe a small dam and diversion canal on the river at about the location of Agate.

The early and brief period that this Agate Post Office existed makes it unlikely that anything remains at the actual site.

#### **ANDERSONVILLE**

Andersonville was a short lived rural post office on the St. Charles River about seven miles southeast of Pueblo. Some sources claim that it was southwest of Pueblo but reliable sources, including the Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report, support a direction to the southeast of Pueblo. Given the early date of the post office it may have been a stage or rest stop on the early road along the St. Charles River.

Go east from Pueblo on US 50 to 25th Lane. Turn south and go to South Road and then east a short distance to 27th Lane and turn south. In about a mile the road crosses the St. Charles River.

Andersonville was on the north side of the river along the present day road. In 2001 there was one small house in the trees near the river. Pueblo is rapidly expanding in this direction so the situation may have changed since 2001.

From Andersonville you can continue south to the sites of Wilson, Undercliffe, Huerfano and Hermosillo.

I have found no historical reference to this place in Pueblo County. A postmaster was appointed but six months later the appointment was rescinded. It is probable that Mr. Fulton could not qualify or was no longer on site. I believe the post office was never in operation.

There is no Geographical Site Location Report on file; therefore I have no information as to where Arland might have been.

#### **ARMOUR**

I have not found any historical references to this rural post office that was located northwest of Beulah and only a mile from the Pueblo-Custer County line on North Creek, a tributary of the St. Charles River. Ranching and possibly lumbering would have been the activities in the area of Armour. I have no information as to the origin of the name.

The Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report does provide a location that spots it on Pueblo County Road 212, which at some point becomes Forest Service Road 307.

County Road 212, also called North Creek Road, begins on the east edge of Beulah. From the turn onto Road 212 it is five and two-tenths miles to a group of older buildings along the road. There is an occupied dwelling. There is also an old barn and an old part-log building along the road.

# **ARTMAN**

I have not found any historical reference to this place in Pueblo County.

The one and only postmaster was Lewis J. Artman, thus it would seem that the post office took his family name. The post office did last for eight plus years. That might indicate the presence of a store at the location. The post office would have served farmers along the south side of the Arkansas River.

The Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report places Artman south of the Arkansas River and east of the St. Charles River. From Pueblo drive east on US Highway 50 to the community known as Vineland. Turn north on Pueblo County Road 331 and go one mile. Artman was located on the west side of Road 331 and south of the Arkansas River.

In 1997 I could not identify any buildings that would possibly date from the period the Artman Post Office was in operation.

#### **AVONDALE**

The eventual site of Avondale is believed to have been homesteaded by a son of Charles Autobees. Most accounts agree that about 1890 Sam Taylor, an Englishman, moved to the area. He opened a general store and named the community for his hometown of Stratford-on-Avon, England – the home of William Shakespeare.

An alternate derivation of the name traces it to a subdivision in Pueblo, which J. E. Green developed before platting Avondale. Perhaps there was a family connection to William Wallace Green, the first postmaster.

Avondale became a small community that supplied the surrounding farms and ranches. This area along the Arkansas River, taking irrigation water from the river, was a market-garden area raising produce for sale in the larger Colorado cities. Away from the river ranching predominated.

Over the years the town included a school, church, café, service station and many residences. Avondale has not changed a great deal. Development from Pueblo has spread mostly to the west but there has been some development to the east. The Pueblo Army Depot, the Transportation Department Test Track and the Pueblo Municipal Airport provide employment for area residents.

From Pueblo drive east on either US Highway 50 or US 50 Bypass. The two roads join at Avondale.





#### **BEAVER**

I am not certain that this post office should be included in Pueblo County. The post office began life as Beaver Creek, a short distance west of the Pueblo-Fremont County line. In 1902 the post office name was shortened to Beaver. A 1902 report for Beaver is the last one found in the Fremont County file of Geographical Site Location Reports. In the Pueblo County file there is a report for Beaver that appears to indicate a move of the Beaver Post Office to a location less than a mile east of the Pueblo-Fremont County line.

Beaver was the third and final name to be applied to a post office located where Beaver Creek joins the Arkansas River. For directions to this site, its history and a description of the location, please refer to the discussions of Toof and Beaver Creek in Fremont County. That location on the USGS Topographic Map of Pueblo County (Sheet 1) is labeled Dobson.

The information that follows is largely what was included in the Fremont County chapter of *The Colorado Postal Encyclopedia*.

In 1862 a post office with the name Beaver Creek was opened on the north side of the Arkansas River where Beaver Creek joins the river. The area was one of farms raising vegetables for sale in the mining camps. In 1868 George W. Toof became the postmaster of Beaver Creek but two years later the office closed.

A post office would reappear at this location in 1881 but it was called Toof. However, the name of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad Station continued to be called Beaver Creek and soon the post office name was changed to Beaver Creek.

There is no evidence that there was an organized community here on the flats along the north side of the Arkansas River where Beaver Creek flows into the river. There was an early flour mill at Beaver Creek and the railroad station became a shipping point for the ranches and farms along Beaver Creek.

I have not visited the location in Pueblo County. Access would be south from US Highway 50, approximately a mile east of the county line and via Pueblo County Road 101. The aforementioned USGS map does indicate some buildings on the north bank of the Arkansas River.

#### **BEULAH**

Beulah is located on the open, but sloping, alluvial fan in the foothills of the Wet Mountains where several streams join to form the North St. Charles River. The location has an interesting but confusing history.

There are references to this place first being known as Fisher's Hole. Robert Fisher was an early trader and trapper. More commonly it was known as Maces Hole, for Juan Mace, a Mexican outlaw that supposedly roamed the countryside from the Arkansas River to Taos and Santa Fe. However, there are no records of anyone who actually knew Juan Mace, thus it seems that the story may be nothing but a legend.

Another reference claims that during the Civil War, following the Battle of Glorietta Pass, Maces Hole was a refuge for Confederate sympathizers. Perhaps that has some validity as by 1862 a small community was beginning to develop.

In 1865 John Jacob Sease moved his family to Maces Hole. In 1867 John L. Boggs and his four sons – David W., Oliver L., Lewis G. and J. Denver, joined him. Lewis G. Boggs would be the postmaster for Maces Hole and continued in the post after the change of name to Beulah.

#### **BEULAH - Continued**

By 1876 the residents had become unhappy with the name Maces Hole and its unsavory connections to outlaws and rebels. Several names were suggested – Silver Glen, Spruce Valley, Glen Eden and Beulah. In the end the residents voted for the name Beulah that had been suggested by a Reverend Gaylord.

Beulah has biblical connotations but Beulah, "a land of peace and rest" was more popularly associated with John Bunyan's *Pilgrim's Progress*.

Initially there was interest in mining and trapping for furs. The fur animals disappeared and the mining never amounted to anything.

The area then became devoted to agriculture and stock raising. Lumbering was also an important contributor to the economy of Beulah. Those activities are still important to Beulah but the village has become a haven for summer homes and camps. It is also adjacent to the Pueblo Mountain Park.

There is a small business district and the school serves a wide area west of Pueblo. For many years Kansas State University has based its summer geological field camp at Beulah. The Beulah Outdoor Art Show is an annual event. For the Christmas Holidays, the Yule Log Hunt and Festival attracts a large number of visitors to Beulah.

From Pueblo, drive west on Colorado Highway 76. Beulah, in the foothills, is a short distance north of the highway but is well marked by road signs.



#### **BOONE**

Colonel Albert G. Boone and his brother Val Boone first established Boone(ville). Both these men were great-grandsons of Daniel Boone, the famous frontiersman. In 1859 the Boones were given 1,400 acres of land east of Pueblo. They moved to the land, established a stage station, and the settlement took the name of Booneville. In 1863 Albert Gallatin Boone became the first postmaster of Booneville.

The arrival of the Missouri Pacific Railroad and the Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe Railroad made Booneville the commercial center for the ranches and farms along the Arkansas River east of Pueblo.

According to the original Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report, Booneville was slightly to the west of present day Boone. The arrival of the railroads and the stations they established were likely the reason the community grew eastward into its modern location on Colorado Highway 96.

#### **BOONE - Continued**

To the north of Boone, the country is grazing land for livestock. Along the Arkansas River irrigation made possible the growing of a variety of market garden crops. Among the products shipped from Boone were corn, beets, watermelon, hay, and pinto and dried beans. Pinto beans were a major local product and for many years Boone held an annual Pinto Bean Festival.

In 1891 the name of Booneville was shortened to Boone.

I have not found a reference as to when the Town of Boone(ville) was platted. It may have been at an early date but it was not until 1956 that Boone was incorporated.

Boone still has a small business district and a good number of small homes. The Pueblo Army Depot and the Transportation Department Test Track, to the northwest, provide employment for residents of Boone.



# **BOONEVILLE**

Colonel Albert G. Boone and his brother Val Boone first established Booneville. Both these men were great-grandsons of Daniel Boone, the famous frontiersman. In 1859 the Boones were given 1,400 acres of land east of Pueblo. They moved to the land, established a stage station and the settlement took the name of Booneville. In 1863 Albert Gallatin Boone became the first postmaster of Booneville.

One source states that Fosdick was the first name for this settlement. However, it is more accepted that the name Fosdick was applied to the Missouri Pacific Railroad station at Booneville. Henry M. Fosdick, a civil engineer, was the second postmaster at Booneville.

For a few years Booneville was a stage station on the Barlow, Sanderson, and Company Stage Line between Pueblo and Bent's Old Fort. In early 1863 the stage station at Haynes Ranch was closed. Operations were moved to Booneville and the recently opened Booneville Post Office supplanted the post office at Haynes Ranch.

Booneville was served by two railroads: the Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe and the Missouri Pacific.

Booneville may have been platted as a town but was not incorporated under that name.

With railroad connections, Booneville became the commercial center for this portion of eastern Pueblo County. It served the farms and ranches of the area providing supplies and a shipping point for produce and livestock. For a few years it was also a supply center for Fort Reynolds located nearby, on the south side of the river.

In 1891, the name of the town and post office was shortened to Boone.

According to the Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report, the site of Boone was slightly to the west of modern day Boone. If that location is correct and early reports are sometimes less than accurate, the early community was located in the area south of Colorado Highway 96 and west of Colorado Highway 209, which connects Colorado 96 to US 50 on the south side of the river. Most of that area is overgrown with trees and brush.

# **BRONQUIST**

The only reference to Bronquist that I have encountered is in *Colorado Ghost Towns, Volume II* by Leanne C. Boyd and Glenn Carson. Unfortunately, I have difficulty with their description. They class Bronquist as a "roaming site," and report that an 1885 map shows it as a stop on the discontinued Pueblo, Silver Cliff, and Pacific Railroad. A Pueblo and Silver Cliff Railroad was chartered but it was never constructed. That railroad would have run west from Pueblo and along Red Creek, where, in the twentieth century, the Bronquist Post Office was located. That could indicate a long history for the place, before it actually acquired a post office.

Next, they state that Bronquist was shown northeast of Goodpasture, on Colorado Highway 76 on a 1924 map. That is also open to question as, according to the Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report, in 1924 Bronquist was at a location on what is now Red Creek Road.

Since the post office only operated between 1917 and 1925, it is possible that at an earlier date the name Bronquist was attached to some other location(s).

A further complication is that the DeLorme *Colorado Atlas and Gazetteer* places Bronquist at what was the location from 1897 to 1904 of the Lees Post Office.

The area surrounding the Bronquist and Lees Post Offices is grassland used for raising livestock.

Follow the directions to the Lees Post Office that are given below. Continue east another two and one half miles. Bronquist would have been on the north side of the road. The only thing visible is an old corral on the hill.



#### **BURNT MILL**

In November 1907 the name of the Kinkel Post Office was changed to Burnt Mill. I have found no explanation for the change. Perhaps it was simply dissatisfaction with the odd name of Kinkel.

There was a gristmill at the site operated by the Dotson brothers. The mill was apparently called "La Marquina de San Carlos." I assume this is Spanish but I have been unable to find a translation of "La Marquina."

The name indicates the fate of the mill. One story has it that the owners were operating an illegal still in the mill. The still blew up and burned the mill to the ground.

Follow the directions to Agate that have been described previously. Continue southwest on Burnt Mill Road (Pueblo County Road 230) to the intersection with Pueblo County Road 221 (3R Road).

According to a local rancher, the site of Burnt Mill was on the south side of the St. Charles at the ranch on the bluff above the river.

# **CEDARWOOD**

Cedarwood was established in late 1911 or 1912. It was located on the route of the Colorado and Southern Railroad. Later, the Denver and Rio Grande also had tracks passing through Cedarwood.

The name of the community was suggested by the Reverend J. H. White, a minister and ranch owner, for the cedar trees present in the area.

A small community did develop at Cedarwood but was never platted. The Cedarwood Station and post office would have served the surrounding ranches and farms.

Exit from Interstate 25 at Exit 74 (Colorado City). Turn east from the interstate and go south on the frontage road to Abbey Road (Pueblo County Road 345) and there turn east. Go to the intersection with Cedarwood Road (County Road 342). Take Cedarwood Road east to the railroad tracks. In 1999 there were still some abandoned buildings on both sides of the railroad.

#### **CHILCOTT**

Chilcott was a ranch post office on Spring Branch, a tributary of the St. Charles River. It was named for George M. Chilcott who was an early settler at Pueblo and a United States Senator. In 1884 Harry S. Chilcott served as the second postmaster. From that I assume that George Chilcott may have been involved in ranching in the area.

The initial request was to name the post office "Spring Branch, for its location."

The easiest route to Chilcott is to begin on Colorado Highway 78, east of Beulah. From Highway 78 turn south on Pueblo County Road 230 (Three R Road) and go five and seven-tenths miles. At that point County Road 230 makes a sharp turn from south to east-northeast. At the turn there is an unmarked road to the southwest. That road, on private property, should go to the two sites of Chilcott on Spring Gulch. Unfortunately when I visited the location in 2001 a locked gate blocked the road. It was not an impressive looking road. I doubt that there would be much to see if you could get to the locations.

The October 1884 location is about two miles from Road 230 and the March 1884 location is another mile up the valley.

An examination of the area using Google Earth, does not show any recognizable structures near the October 1884 location. It is difficult to determine the March 1884 location but I do not believe there is anything there either. From Google Earth it does appear that it might be possible to reach the March 1884 sight from Colorado Highway 165, south of San Isabel.

#### **COUSIN SPRINGS**

Cousin Springs was a rural post office five miles north of Goodpasture. Its claim to fame was a good, natural, clear spring that supplied the surrounding residents with fresh water. Ranching would have been the dominant activity of the area.

Period maps refer to the place as Cozzens Springs, which likely took the name of an early owner. The name was altered to the easier to spell form of Cousin Springs.

From the location of Goodpasture on Colorado Highway 78, drive five miles north on Siloam Road (Pueblo County Road 201). To the west there is a private road that goes into the trees and then curves to the north. In 2001 a locked gate blocked that road. The location of Cousin Springs should be less than a half mile from Siloam Road. With a little rain already in the air, I chose not to explore the road, so I do not know if there is anything there to be seen. The private road seems to get some but not frequent use.

An examination of this location using Google Earth, does not show any evidence of structures near Road 201. However, there appears to be some modern development about a mile to the west of Road 201 with several new roads and homes in that area.



#### **CROW**

The history of Crow began with the settlement of Alexander "Zan" Hicklin on a grant of 5,118.72 acres on Greenhorn Creek. Following the war with Mexico the large land grants that had been awarded by the Mexican government were contested. After lengthy court battles, some of the grants were accepted by the United States government but others were greatly reduced in size. Zan Hicklin did obtain a patent for his land.

#### **CROW - Continued**

In the early 1880's Calvin W. Goss bought land from Zan Hicklin. Goss established a store and obtained a post office which he named Crow. Over the years the place became more popularly known as Crow Junction. but the post office never bore that name. It is generally accepted that the office was named for Matthew Crow who was the postmaster at Pueblo from 1885 to 1889.

Crow did develop as a community but I have no information that it was ever platted or incorporated. It was on the wagon road and later on the highway between Pueblo and Walsenburg but was bypassed by railroads and the interstate highway.

In 1963 the Colorado City Development Corporation acquired much of the land that had constituted the Zan Hicklin Ranch. The corporation announced their intention to construct a planned community that would have an eventual population of 30,000. An extensive street network was platted and construction begun.

Colorado City does exist but it has not fully met the grandiose plans of the Development Corporation. There is a golf course, a couple of small commercial centers and a number of homes on a street network. At Exit 74 there is a service station. In 1969 a Holiday Inn was built on the west side of the interstate. That motel now goes by a different name but is still in operation.

In late November 1969 an odd event took place at Colorado City. The Chamber of Commerce and the Lions Club conducted a "wake" for the old community of Crow Junction, complete with a parade and the symbolic burial of remnants of Crow Junction. The "grave" was placed beneath the then under construction Holiday Inn. I think that it was an interstate highway directional sign for Crow Junction, replaced by one for Colorado City that was buried beneath the motel.

The site of Crow is accessible via Colorado Highway 165 from Interstate 25, Exit 74. The modern Colorado City stretches west along that highway towards Rye. The Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report places the Crow Post Office approximately a mile west from Exit 74.

Nothing remains of the buildings that were Crow. One possible exception is a two-story building that once housed the Crow Mercantile Company and a wayside hotel. In February 1969 that building was moved to the east end of the golf course where it became a warehouse for building supplies and development company shops. It is quite possible that even that building no longer exists.




#### **DAWKINS**

Dawkins was at a station on the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad about five miles south of the Pueblo-El Paso County line. In addition to the station, there were likely a few residences. The Wood Valley School was moved to Dawkins from the east side of Fountain Creek. Dawkins provided ranches in the area with a shipping facility for livestock.

In 1907 the post office was moved a half-mile to the south and re-named Pinon.

From Interstate 25, take Exit 108, the Pinon Exit, and go north on the east frontage road to Pueblo County Road 108. Dawkins was a half-mile north of Road 108 and along the railroads. In this area there are parallel tracks for the Denver and Rio Grande and for the Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe Railroads.

There are no buildings remaining along the railroad; however, a short distance north there is a residence between the railroads and the interstate.



I have found no historical reference to this place in Pueblo County. A postmaster was appointed but three months later the appointment was rescinded. It is probable that Lillian Newton could not qualify or was no longer on site. I believe the post office was never in operation.

There is no Geographical Site Location Report on file, therefore I have no information as to where Duke might have been.

# **EDEN**

Eden was a railroad post office about six miles north of Pueblo. There was a small station and a siding but no town. At first the post office was located in the station building and, I think, to the east of the tracks. In 1900 the post office moved a short distance to the southwest and to the west side of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad.

As was the case with the other stations along the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad, there would have been facilities to hold livestock and to load them for shipment to market.

Eden was the site of the third worst railroad disaster in the United States history – ninety-seven dead and others missing.

#### **EDEN – Continued**

Don Helmers in *Tragedy at Eden* describes the setting as follows:

Hogan's Gulch is particularly interesting to anyone who pauses to study and examine it. It resembles the Grand Canyon in a miniature way. Usually these gulches do not have even a trickle of water in them, but, on occasion, when rains fall upslope, they can run full from bank to bank for brief periods. This is what happened on the evening of August 7, 1904. A cloudburst dumped huge amounts of water in the small basin drained by Hogan's Gulch, and a torrent of water came rushing down the arroyo and washed out the flimsily-built county road bridge. The wreckage of this bridge was carried downstream and crashed against the Denver & Rio Grande railroad bridge, known as bridge No. 110-B, weakening it and setting the stage for the "Tragedy at Eden."

In the early evening, a Denver and Rio Grande Railroad passenger train, from Denver to Pueblo, traveling slow, approached the bridge. In poor visibility and unaware that the bridge supports had been destroyed, the engine passed onto the bridge and nearly made it to the south side before the tracks gave way. The engine, tender and two passenger cars were pulled into the flood waters. The air brakes halted two additional cars before they reached the north end of the bridge. The confirmed dead totaled 97, to that date the worst railroad disaster in the United States. A number of other persons were listed as missing.

The actual site of the disaster was about a mile and a quarter north of the Eden Station. Hogan's Gulch is now known as Porter's Draw.

Depart from Interstate 25 at Exit 104. Eden was on the east side of the highway and just north of the underpass. There are no remaining structures at the site.



#### **EXCELSIOR**

The only information I have found about Excelsior describes it as a rural post office about seventeen (sic.) miles southeast of Pueblo. It was on the stage route from Pueblo to Old Bents Fort. Apparently it was a stage and rest station.

The Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report is not very helpful. The report places it on the north side of the Arkansas River and eleven miles east of Pueblo. That would locate the site in the strip of land between Pueblo County Road 231, from Vineland and the modern interchange of the US Highway 50 Bypass with Colorado Highway 96. It would be in the area between US 50 and the river. That area is now virtually unoccupied. In 1997 there was a sod farm between the highway and the river.

#### **FISHER**

In my reading I found only two mentions of Fisher. Both describe it as a rural post office. From a visit to the location I saw nothing to contradict that description.

Fisher was located on the north side of the St. Charles River. Fisher was a late nineteenth-early twentieth century successor to the Saint Charles Post Office (1866-1881), which was in the same area.

From Interstate 25 Exit 88, drive west on Burnt Mill Road (Pueblo County Road 247). After leaving the interstate, Burnt Mill Road goes southwest for about a half mile before turning to the west. Southeast of the road and between Interstate 25 and the turn to the west, there is ranch complex on a low hill. I believe that the Fisher Post Office was at or near that ranch. It is likely that the St. Charles Post Office was in the same place.

#### **FOOTHILLS**

I have found no historical reference to this place. From its location it is reasonable to assume that it was a ranch post office that for nearly six years served scattered ranches in southeastern Pueblo County.

The location provided by the Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report is about three miles north of the Pueblo-Huerfano County line and six miles west of Pueblo County Road 705. None of my current maps show any roads leading in that direction, with Road 705 being the closest.

This area, viewed with Google Earth, is largely level ground. There are scattered scrub trees and some "ranch" roads. I could not find any evidence for the presence of buildings.

The post office did last six years and at least one cover has survived.

#### FORT REYNOLDS

On July 3, 1867 Captain Simon Snyder moved troops of Company F, Fifth United States Infantry, from temporary quarters on the edge of Pueblo to the site of Fort Reynolds. The new fort was on the south side of the Arkansas River, about three miles from Booneville on the north side of the river.

The military reservation of twenty-three square miles extended from the Huerfano River to about the location of the modern Vineland community and southward from the Arkansas River. The fort was named for Major General John Fulton Reynolds who was killed at Gettysburg on July 1, 1863.

Fort Reynolds was surveyed and laid out by Lieutenant Henry Jackson of the United States Cavalry. It had 22 buildings, mostly adobe. The stables were 225 feet long, 75 feet wide. The main barracks would easily accommodate 500 men.

The purpose of the fort was to protect the settlers along the Arkansas River, from Pueblo through Booneville, and those at Charley Autobees Plaza on the Huerfano River.

Within a few years the threat of Indian troubles was deemed over and Fort Reynolds was abandoned on July 15, 1872. The Secretary of War was authorized to sell the property at public auction. The auction did not take place until May 3 and 4, 1881.

The former military reservation was broken into farms and ranches and now includes the site of the town of Avondale.

#### **GOODPASTURE**

Lee Roper, who arrived in the area in the late 1880's, is credited as the founder of Goodpasture. Mr. Roper was a rancher and raising livestock was the principal occupation of the surrounding residents.

A small hamlet developed but it never grew to any size and as the twentieth century progressed, Goodpasture dissolved into a few ranches and homes along Colorado Highway 76 and Siloam Road (Pueblo County Road 201).

Goodpasture was named for William Goodpasture who was the postmaster of neighboring Beulah at the time the Goodpasture Post Office was authorized.

From 1917 to 1926 the Pueblo County Fair was held at Goodpasture.

Beginning at the side road that leads into Beulah, Goodpasture is two and seven-tenths miles to the east, at the intersection of Colorado Highway 78 and Siloam Road. There is an historical marker that briefly notes Goodpasture and Rock Creek. The countryside is agricultural and grazing land with a few farms or ranches.





#### **GRANEROS**

Graneros was a railroad station and post office on the original route of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad from Pueblo to Walsenburg.

The primary activities in this area were raising livestock and growing grain. The Graneros Station would have had stock pens and loading chutes for shipping livestock to market.

The Spanish word for granary is, "granero." Graneros is the plural and was first applied to a nearby stream and the flats where the Graneros Post Office was situated.

There is no evidence for an organized community. The post office served a few railroad employees and the surrounding ranches.

In 1924-1925 the Rio Grande Railroad abandoned their old alignment that passed through Graneros. The new alignment was six miles to the east. Without the railroad Graneros served no purpose and the post office was closed.

Exit from Interstate 25 at Exit 74 (Colorado City). Turn east from the interstate and go south on the frontage road to Abbey Road (Pueblo County Road 345) and there turn east. Go to the intersection with Cedarwood Road (County Road 342). Take Cedarwood Road east to the intersection with Clay Mine Road (south) and Wolfenberger Road (north). These may also be designated as Pueblo County Roads 341 and 339 respectively.


Graneros was in the northwest corner of this intersection. There are no remaining structures, appropriately, just open grain fields.



# **GREENHORN**

Greenhorn takes its name by succession from Greenhorn Creek, Greenhorn Mountain and the Comanche Indian Chief – Cuerno Verde, "Green Horn." Nearby, on September 3, 1779, a party of Spanish troops led by Juan Batista de Anza fought a party of Comanches and killed Cuerno Verde.

In January 1847 George Frederick Ruston crossed Greenhorn Creek. He found a small settlement of French Canadian hunters who were doing some farming on the land that was later occupied by Alexander Hicklin.

The village of Greenhorn began in the early 1860's and was an important stage station on the route from Pueblo to Santa Fe. The location was on the ranch settled by Alexander "Zan" Hicklin.

A small community developed around the stage station. In the early 1870's George Sears came to the settlement and opened a store. George Sears also became the postmaster at Greenhorn, a post he held for twenty years. A prominent feature at the store was a well that produced a high quality drinking water. The well still exists and produces water for visitors.


The store was a two-story building with the upper floor occupied by the Odd Fellows Hall. Across the road were a drug store, saloon and a blacksmith shop. The village also included a lumberyard, a grain mill and a shop where wagons were made.

Greenhorn was a viable community into the twentieth century. Located on US Highway 85-87 it was a service point for travelers on the highway. By mid-century Greenhorn had begun to slowly decline, but the construction of Interstate 25, two miles to the east, virtually doomed Greenhorn. No longer on the main highway business declined and residents of the surrounding area went to Pueblo or Walsenburg to purchase supplies and other goods.

To visit Greenhorn, exit from Interstate 25 at Colorado City. Drive west on Colorado Highway 165 to Apache City Road (Pueblo County Road 273). Turn south and it is two miles to Greenhorn. In 2001 there were several buildings, some occupied, in Greenhorn. The old well was clearly marked and there was a large building that had once been the Kaiser-Frazer dealership at Greenhorn.

# **GRIMALDI**

There is no Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report for Grimaldi in the file for Pueblo County.

# **GRIMALDI – Continued**

Grimaldi is mentioned in only two of the books that I have read. Both describe it as a rural post office eighteen miles south of Boone. One reference notes that it is shown on 1916 through 1934 maps.

I have checked the maps in my files. Grimaldi is spotted on *Clason's Guide Map of Colorado - 1919*. Using that map, I believe that Grimaldi was about seven or eight miles west-northwest of the location of Waremont. It is possible that it was on or near Pueblo County Road 3702. That road can be reached by following the directions to Undercliffe (the site south of the Huerfano River) and then turning north towards the location of Juniata. About two and a half miles from the site of Juniata, Road 3702 is to the right. I have no idea about the condition of Road 3702. It goes southeast into a lonesome and very sparsely settled countryside. Grimaldi, if I have it located anywhere near correctly, would be six to seven miles from the beginning of Road 3702.

The Grimaldi Post Office operated from 1913 to 1920 and postmarks from there have been recorded. The *Post Route Map of the State of Colorado* showing post offices in operation on the 1st of August 1932 does show a discontinued post office at Grimaldi, being served twice a week by a post route from Avondale through Undercliffe (also discontinued). It is not shown on the 1938 Post Route Map. That would indicate that Grimaldi was still inhabited as late as 1932. I would be surprised if anything but remnant foundations could be found at the site.

Using Google Earth, an examination of the area where I believe Grimaldi was located does not show any structures. However, there is one area of disturbed ground and a small clump of trees that could have been the location of Grimaldi. It is on the east side of, and close to Road 3702.


#### HAYNES RANCH

Haynes Ranch was a station on the Barlow and Sanderson Stage Route along the Arkansas River. It was at the ranch of James H. Haynes who was the postmaster during the period of operation of the Haynes Ranch Post Office.

Apparently Mr. Haynes was not the most pleasant or trustworthy of individuals. It is said that he mistreated the stage line animals in his care and as a result the stage line asked Colonel Albert Boone to move the station to his ranch at Booneville. In 1864 Haynes was charged with stealing horses at Fort Lyon. On August 21 of that year, two men, who were employees at the Haynes Ranch and were on their way to testify in the case against James Haynes, were found scalped eighteen miles west of Fort Lyon.

#### **HAYNES RANCH - Continued**

The Post Office Department files do not contain a Geographical Site Location Report for Haynes Ranch and I have been unable to find any information that would provide even an approximate location for Haynes Ranch. From the known information, the ranch was somewhere between Fort Lyon and Booneville. I suspect that it was closer to Booneville than to Fort Lyon as that is where the stage company chose to move their station. It would almost certainly have been on the north side of the Arkansas River. More information on the history and location of Haynes Ranch would be appreciated.

#### **HERMOSILLA**

This settlement was established by Joseph Bainbridge Doyle who, in 1859 purchased a large tract of land along the Huerfano River, southeast of Pueblo. He established a headquarters ranch and apparently a small community grew around the ranch.

At various times the place was known as Doyles, Doyles Ranch, Doyles Mill, and Hermosilla. Hermosilla is a variation of the Spanish word "Hermosa"- beautiful.

#### **HERMOSILLA – Continued**

I assume that to visit this place you will have previously visited Andersonville and Wilson and are now where Broadacre Road (Pueblo County Road 321) reaches the Huerfano River. That location is known as Doyles Settlement and there is a restored cabin and an historical marker there.

However, the Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report for Hermosilla appears to place it some four miles further to the southwest and on the opposite side of the river.

From the Doyle Settlement I turned southwest on Pueblo County Road 312 and I was able to go almost three miles before I encountered a locked gate. A sign at the gate identified the property as the "Hermosillo Ranch; Bar Nothing Ranches L. L. C." That could indicate that Hermosilla was indeed another mile or so further to the southwest. From the gate, looking down the road it was obvious that this was an active ranch, so ranch buildings would be expected at some point.

An examination of the area, using Google Earth, shows a large ranch complex about a mile beyond the gate at which I was stopped on my attempt to visit the site. Another mile further, close to the plotted site for the Hermosilla Post Office, there is a new building and a series of stock pens. There is no evidence of early buildings at either location.

# **HOLDEN**

I have found no historical reference to a place of this name in Pueblo County. The Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report does provide a location that plots it at the present community of Vineland at the junction of US Highway 50 and Pueblo County Road 331, six miles west of Avondale. The Site Location Report does mention that the document was "for the establishment of a post office at Vineland."

Naming the post office Vineland would have caused possible confusion with the Vineland Post Office in Los Angles County, California. I have no thoughts on the source of the name Holden.

Holden was another of the short-lived post offices in this area between Booneville and Pueblo. It seems likely that it was intended to serve a small agricultural community on the south side of the Arkansas River.

#### **HUERFANO**

The settlement of Huerfano presents some problems. There was a similarly named settlement and post office, in Huerfano County; and the two, if there were two, have often been confused.

The Huerfano Post Office in Huerfano County was established in 1862. In 1879 it was moved north to Undercliffe in Pueblo County.

Ray Shaffer, in *A Guide to Places on the Colorado Prairie* believes that the early Huerfano (1862-1879) was in Pueblo County. I do not know his evidence for that claim but based on the relationship of the early Apache Post Office in Huerfano County to the Huerfano Post Office in that county, I question his conclusion. Confused? So am I.

In Huerfano County, the post office with that name came and went a couple more times before finally closing in 1929.

I am including mention of it here to cover the possibility that for a brief time it operated as Huerfano Post Office in Pueblo County.

A possible location of this post office in Pueblo County would be at the present day crossing of the Huerfano River by Pueblo County Road 703, the continuation of Broadacre Road (County Road 321). That location is known as the Doyle Settlement and there is a restored cabin and cemetery there.

# **JACKSON**

I have found only one mention of this place in the historical literature for Colorado. Leanne C Boyd and Glenn Carson in *Colorado Ghost Towns, Volume II* mention it as being two miles south of Boone on the wagon road to Undercliffe.

The Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report does not provide a definitive location for Jackson. The report does describe it as being south of the Arkansas River and on the east bank of Huerfano Creek. The accompanying sketch map shows Jackson at the junction of the two streams.

Another map places Jackson in Section 7 of Township 21 South, Range 61 West. That would seem to place it west of Huerfano Creek.

According to the Geographical Site Location description Jackson would be on the northeast side of US Highway 50, just before that road crosses the Huerfano River and reaches the junction with Colorado 209 north to Boone. That is an area of open fields, partially cultivated and partially sagebrush. At best Jackson was a rural post office serving an area south of the river and west of Nepesta.

There is another complication with the history of the Jackson Post Office. In addition to this office in Pueblo County, there was also a Jackson Post office in Gunnison County. The Records of PostmasterAppointments have mixed the two together. Therefore, I am not sure when the office in Pueblo County closed. Since it is not listed in the 1888 and subsequent Postal Guides I believe it closed before 1888, probably in 1887. I think that the office in Gunnison County opened in 1890.

Although not unusual, I wonder why, if this office was open for thirteen years, no postal markings have been reported. Could there be more confusion in the records than I have recognized?

# **JUNIATA**

Juniata is described as a rural post office and small town on the Huerfano River southwest of Booneville. I have found no information to indicate that a townsite was platted for Juniata. Located on the Huerfano River there would have been some irrigation for farming; but the surrounding countryside was good grazing land for cattle.

Juniata remained on maps as late as the 1920's. I have not found information as to the source of the name.

If you are making a loop from Andersonville and have just crossed the Huerfano River to the junction of Red Top Road and East Huerfano Road, then the latter road will take you to the site of Juniata. Turn onto East Huerfano Road and go eight miles northeast towards Boone. It is not easy to accurately follow this road as it winds along parallel to the river without helpful crossroads to mark your progress.

Another choice is to come south from US Highway 50. Just east of the bridge to Boone, take Pueblo County Road 702 south. Once again there are multiple names to the roads in this portion of Pueblo County. From US 50 this is 58th Lane. It turns west as Grape Road and then turns south as East Huerfano Road. The previously described site is eight miles from US 50. If you choose this route, you can continue on to the sites of Undercliffe, Hermosillo, Huerfano, Wilson and Andersonville before returning to US 50 on the east edge of Pueblo.

From that discussion, it seems that there was a mill, operated by the Dotson brothers, at the site. The mill burned hence the origin of the name Burnt Mill.

I have no information as to the source of the name Kinkel.

Follow the directions to Agate that have been described previously. Continue southwest on Burnt Mill Road (Pueblo County Road 230) to the intersection with Pueblo County Road 221 (3R Road). Please refer to the discussion of Burnt Mill for a description of this place.



# **LAMAR**

I have found no historical reference to this place in Pueblo County. From the location it seems that it was likely a station on the Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe railroad, perhaps with a stock-loading facility. For some reason no mention of the railroad is made in the Site Location Report.

It is interesting that only one week after the Lamar, Pueblo County Post Office closed, a new Lamar Post Office opened in Bent (now Prowers) County. Since that office was also on the Santa Fe Railroad, could there have been some connection between the closing of one and the opening of the other?

Three years after this office closed, a new post office, Nyburg, opened in the same quarter section. Refer to the discussion of Nyburg for more on the location of this post office.

#### **LEBANON**

I have found no historical reference to this place in Pueblo County. The Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report does provide a location that is a mile due south from the town of Rye.

This post office predates both the Table Mountain and Rye Post Offices in this area on the upper reaches of Greenhorn Creek. From the time period and the location it was apparently no more that a rural post office in an area where ranching was just beginning to take hold.

From Rye, on Colorado Highway 165, drive south on Pueblo County Road 271 and cross Greenhorn Creek. The location of Lebanon was on the south side of the creek and to the east of Road 271. When Jim Ozment and I visited the area in 1999 we found a couple of well-kept older buildings among scattered recent houses. However, neither of the older buildings appeared to date from the 1870's.

Lees is another of the post offices in Pueblo County that seems to have escaped mention in the historical literature of Colorado.

The Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report does provide information as to the whereabouts of Lees. For some reason, the Post Office Department location of Lees is shown on the DeLorme *Colorado Atlas and Gazetteer* as the location of Bronquist. The Post Office Department places Bronquist two miles further to the east.

From the location of Goodpasture, at the intersection of Colorado Highway 76 with Siloam Road, drive north seven and one-half miles to the intersection with Red Creek Road. Turn east and go four miles. There are some ruins on the south side of the road that could be the remnants of Lees. This is just west of the entrance to the Red Creek Ranch.

The countryside around this location is grazing land for livestock and it is doubtful that Lees was anything but a ranch post office.

Percy Lees was the first postmaster here, so it is easy to conclude that the post office was named for him.

#### LIME

At first this settlement was known as San Carlos. The development of limestone quarries led to the change in name to Lime. It was under that name that a post office was authorized in 1898. The quarried limestone was used in the smelters of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company in Pueblo. The location had a railroad connection to the steel mills in Pueblo.

On a lease basis, contractors Orman and Crook began quarrying the limestone. Under subsequent operation by the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company the development expanded and a town was started. The town included a boarding house, stables and a few dwellings.

In 2001 there was no public access to the site of Lime. Reportedly only a few foundations remain there. Examination of the location with Google Earth does show some foundations and what might be a rather large building of some sort.

Take Exit 91 from Interstate 25 and go southeast on Pueblo County Road 308 to where it turns north as County Road 302. At that turn there is a road to the southeast but in 2001 a locked gate blocked it. The side road is also known as Lime Road. For photographs, the best I could do was a view down the road towards Lime and a photograph of an old foundation near Lime Road.



# **MACES HOLE**

Legend has it that Juan Mace, a Mexican outlaw and cattle thief, used this valley as a hideout for nearly a decade. His depredations are said to have ranged from the Arkansas River to Taos and Santa Fe.

An 1851 map of the Territory of New Mexico, compiled by 2nd L. Jno. G. Parker U.S.T.E. and drawn by Richard B. Kern, is the earliest appearance of the name being applied to the area as MASA'S HOLA. Although this story is believed by many there is virtually no documentation to confirm the truth of the legend.

James O'Niel was an early settler, perhaps arriving in 1863. Coburn and Root followed him. Lewis Boggs was another early arrival and became the first postmaster at Maces Hole.

In 1876 the residents of the valley voted to change the name of their settlement and post office to Beulah. It is quite likely that they sought to distance themselves from the unsavory reputation of Juan Mace.

Maces Hole, now Beulah, is located just north of Colorado Highway 78 at the foot of the Wet Mountains. Please refer back to the discussion of Beulah for more about this location.

Marnel was a railroad post office on the Colorado and Southern-Denver and Rio Grande Railroad south of Pueblo.

The post office name may have been proposed as Marvel and for some reason changed to Marnel. That may have been a misreading of the submitter's handwriting.

I have found no information to indicate that there was anything more at Marnel other than the railroad station and probably loading pens for livestock from the surrounding ranches.

Take Exit 87 from Interstate 25 and drive southeast on Verde Road (Pueblo County Road 337). It is about four miles to the vicinity of Marnel and Verde. Marnel was located on the east side of Greenhorn Creek, between the creek and the old railroad grade. Unfortunately there is no public access to that area.

An examination of the area using Google Earth does not show any existing structures.



#### MERCIER

Mercier was a rural post office located in extreme southeastern Pueblo County. The surrounding area is cattle range. Some small scale farming may be possible along the Apishapa River. The Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report places Mercier on the west side of the Apishapa and adjacent to the Pueblo-Otero County line.

I have no information as to the source of the name.

From Colorado Highway 10, at the county line, the site of Mercier is a mile and a half to the south. Nothing is visible from the highway and there are no accessible roads to the location. This is wide open, grasslands and I suspect that little or nothing remains at the location.





Muddy Creek was a rural post office at the junction of Muddy Creek with Greenhorn Creek. The Geographical Site Location Report states that, "there are four families within two miles of the proposed office." That confirms the rural nature of the Muddy Creek Post Office.

The site of Muddy Creek is a mile north of the location of Abbey. It is in the vicinity of where Interstate 25 crosses Muddy Creek, about two miles north of Exit 77. Exit there and take the frontage road north to Abbey, then go under the interstate and continue north on the west frontage road. On the south side of Muddy Creek there are some new residences and one that appears to be an older structure. Because of the interstate, it is difficult to determine whether Muddy Creek was on the east side, the west side or under the interstate. The area along the stream is under cultivation.

# **MYRTLE**

Myrtle was a rural post office in the northwest corner of Pueblo County. From the location and a comment in the Site Location Report, it is quite likely that Myrtle was associated with the quarrying operations in the vicinity of Stone City.

The location is now within the boundaries of the Fort Carson Military Reservation and there is no access to the site. The closest you can get is from US Highway 50, four miles east of the Pueblo-Fremont County line. From US 50, drive north on Pueblo County Road 111. Four miles from US 50 you will find a gate and a large sign telling you to, "STOP/ HALT" as you are about to enter the Fort Carson Airburst Range. The site of Myrtle was some three miles further to the north. It is doubtful that anything other than foundations and evidence of the quarrying would be found.

An examination of the location using Google Earth, shows no evidence of structures in the vicinity of Myrtle or its neighbor Stone City. A quarry is visible.



# **NEPESTA**

This community began in the early 1870's as a stage station on the road that followed the Arkansas River west to Pueblo. In 1876 the Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe Railroad built a station and section house where their tracks crossed to the north side of the river. A large stockyard with loading chutes was also built. For a brief time the place was called Santa Fe Station.

A small community developed around the railroad facilities; however, the land was low, close to the river and subject to frequent flooding. Eventually most of the community either scattered to other places or moved to higher ground away from the river. As such Nepesta was no longer an organized community.

#### **NEPESTA – Continued**

The surrounding countryside was devoted to ranching with farming on the fertile bottomlands along the river or where irrigation was feasible.

The name Nepesta was taken from the Spanish name for the river - "Rio Nepestle." Some state that this is a Spanish word but others claim it to be from an unknown Indian source. One claim is that it was from the Osage language "Ne Shusta" – red water.

From the Otero-Pueblo County line drive west about five miles to Pueblo County Road 613, which goes north across the railroad and the river to Colorado Highway 96. The original settlement was at the railroad and the river. The 1929 and subsequent location of the post office was on the south side of US 50 between County Road 613 to the north and Road 721 to the south.

There are some scattered ranches along the highway and the Nepesta Cemetery is clearly marked.



# NORTH AVONDALE

North Avondale was located north of its namesake – Avondale – and on the north side of the Arkansas River. At that point, it was on the lines of the Missouri Pacific and the Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe Railroads.

A small community did develop at this point. The primary focus of the community would have been the railroads and the stations that would have received goods for Avondale and area residents. The stations also provided a shipping point for produce and livestock from the surrounding farms and ranches.

North Avondale is on Colorado Highway 96 at the intersection with Pueblo County Road 326. This is about a mile east of the intersection of Highway 96 with the US Highway 50 Bypass. There are some scattered homes along Highway 96 and Road 326.

North Avondale is essentially the access point to the U.S. Army's Pueblo Ordnance Depot and the Department of Transportation's High Speed Ground Test Center.



#### **NYBURG**

Nyburg was a railroad post office nine miles west of Boone. It was at approximately the same location as the Lamar Post Office (1885-1886).

The Missouri Pacific Railroad and the Atchison, Topeka, and Santa Fe Railroad share a joint track through Nyburg, on the north side of the US Highway 50 Bypass.

Using the Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Reports and the USGS Topographical Map for Pueblo County (Sheet 2). It appears that Nyburg was stretched along the railroads for about a mile. The USGS map shows Nyburg at the western edge of Section 36, south of the railroads and US Highway 50 Bypass. It also shows Nyberg a mile to the east in Section 31 T21S R62W and north of the railroads.

Historical information about this place is scant. From a visit to the site I believe that it was little more than a railroad siding with stockyards and a facility for loading cattle and other local produce for shipment. There were a few residences, mostly south of the railroads.

From North Avondale, drive west on the US Highway 50 Bypass to Pueblo County Road 442, to the south. There are a few older buildings just south of US 50. Continue a short distance west to Chico Road (County Road 545). Turn north and cross the railroad. North of the railroad there is evidence of a siding that has been removed. There is the foundation of one building and another abandoned building.



#### **OSAGE**

Two years after the Osage Avenue Post Office closed, there was a resumption of service at the same location. However, the new post office was simply Osage. Like its predecessor, it was a ranch post office at a remote location in western Pueblo County. Please refer to the entry for Osage Avenue for a discussion of the location and directions to the site.

The drive through this section of Pueblo County is quite scenic. After reaching Colorado Highway 76, east of Beulah, and if you have the nerve, you can continue west, passing Pueblo Mountain Park and climbing over the mountains to Colorado Highway 185. Highway 185 connects Rye with the road to Florence or Westcliffe. I have been over this road a couple of times. It was not the best of roads but it was passable with a standard vehicle. Perhaps in recent years has been improved.

#### **OSAGE AVENUE**

Osage Avenue was located on the south side of the St. Charles River where the river exits from the Wet Mountains. Topographically this is an interesting location. The USGS Topographic Map of Pueblo County (Sheet 3) shows that the branch of the St. Charles River divides into two streams that rejoin shortly before reaching the main course of the river. The result is a small "park" along the river. That area became headquarters for a ranch that is now known as the 3R Ranch, which gives its name to the road through the location.

It would seem obvious that the name relates to the Osage Indians but I have no idea why it would be called Osage Avenue.

In 1882 the Osage Avenue Post Office was discontinued. In 1884 a new post office opened at the same place but with the shorter name of Osage.

The site of Osage Avenue is a mile and a half from the site of Sitton and four miles south of Colorado Highway 76. From either direction you will be on Three R Road (Pueblo County Road 230.)

I note that Peter K. Dotson was the first postmaster at Osage Avenue. I wonder if he had a connection with the Dotson brothers who operated the gristmill at Burnt Mill.

# **OVERTON**

On August 19, 1891 the town of Overton was platted on the east side of Fountain Creek. Pueblo realtor Andrew J. Overton sold 60 acres to the Rocky Mountain Oil Refinery. A refinery was built near Cactus, a whistle stop on the Denver and New Orleans Railroad.

The community was named for Mr. Overton, who was secretary of the Z. V. Trine Investment Company, the original owners of the property.

Since 1885 there had been a small brick school at Cactus. The refinery included a superintendent's house and houses for the refinery workers. In addition, a hardware store, a Catholic church, and several saloons provided for the needs of the workers.

Apparently the refinery was not successful and suffered from numerous problems, being referred to as "cursed." By 1907 the Trojan Safety Powder Company of Allentown, Pennsylvania was operating at Overton. Trojan was an unreliable employer, functioning irregularly until it closed for good in 1910. After the powder company closed the buildings were no longer used or guarded and were gradually dismantled, to a large extent carried away by scavengers.

From Interstate 25, on the north edge of Pueblo, take Exit 101 to Colorado Highway 47. Go east, crossing Fountain Creek to Murphy Road, which soon becomes Overton Road (Pueblo County Road 501). Go north four and a half miles north to a sharp, but brief "S" bend in the road. Overton was in the area north of the bend. The area is open countryside with active ranches or farms along both sides of Overton Road. No remnants of the refinery/powder mill were visible.

#### **PINON**

Pinon was a station on the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad, and the Denver and New Orleans Railroad. It was about a half-mile to the south of the Dawkins Station and Post Office, which in 1907 it supplanted. The original intention was to name the Dawkins Post Office Pinon. Two years after the Pinon Post Office in Montrose County was closed, a change in name and location of Dawkins was acceptable to the Post Office Department.

#### **PINON – Continued**

I have read of no reason why the change was made. Most likely the railroads found it easier to develop more extensive facilities at the site of Pinon.

A town did not develop at Pinon but even though there is no longer any railroad facility the name remains on maps and identifies Exit 108 from Interstate 25.

Leave Interstate 25 at Exit 108 and take Pueblo County Road 106 to the railroad tracks. Pinon was to the north of Road 106. There are no remaining structures but there is evidence of the former siding and railroad facilities.

#### **PUEBLO**

In 1842 Jim Beckwourth and other traders built a trading post where Fountain Creek joined the Arkansas River. The post attracted a small settlement of Mexican farmers and was a winter camp for Mormons traveling to Utah. The settlement was not continuously occupied. At Christmas 1854 the Mexican inhabitants were celebrating with "Taos Lightning." They invited some nearby Ute Indians to join the party. The Utes turned on their hosts, murdered all but one young woman and her two children who were kidnapped. The slaughter left the fort with an unsavory reputation. By 1858 when the Pikes Peak Gold Rush began only ruined walls remained.

In 1858 as prospectors began to flood into the area, they established a camp at the junction of Fountain Creek with the Arkansas River. Before settling on Pueblo the new camp had several names including Fountain City, Independence City and Junction City.

Independence City (Junction City) was surveyed and platted in the summer of 1859 but soon appropriated the name Pueblo. Fountain City was quickly included in the new town.

Pueblo was at a fortuitous location. It was at a major crossroads one route was from the new settlements at Cherry Creek in the north to Santa Fe and Taos in New Mexico. And from Bents Fort to the east, Pueblo was on the main travel route along the Arkansas River that went into the mountains to the mines in South Park or the upper Arkansas Valley.


In 1872 the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad reached Pueblo. At first the railroad terminated on the north bank of the Arkansas River but in a typical Rio Grande action the railroad soon crossed to the south side of the river, built its main terminal there and established the town of South Pueblo.

Another community, Central Pueblo, was also developed. Pueblo was incorporated in 1885 and in 1886 the three Pueblos were consolidated as Pueblo. With the establishment of the steel mills southeast of the growing city, the community of Bessemer was also platted. On March 21, 1894 Bessemer was annexed to Pueblo.

In June 1921 a major flood of the Arkansas River swept through the lower lying portions of Pueblo. When all was done, there had been major damage to the rail yards, which were then on the south side of the river. A new channel was dug for the river with the result that the rail yards and Union Station are now north of the Arkansas River.

Pueblo became known as the "Steel City" and at times was referred to as "Little Pittsburg." For a more detailed history of Pueblo I refer you to the many published histories of the city.



#### **BELMONT STATION**

The following paragraphs are taken from the Dedication Program (June 28, 1969) for the Belmont Station, Pueblo, Colorado 81001:

Construction of the Belmont Station began on October 3, 1968. The building is brick and moss stone masonry and has a total gross area of 8,188 square feet, which includes a loading platform of 1,000 square feet. The outside area covers 30,000 square feet of which 3,186 square feet are surfaced patron parking. There is a paved vehicle parking and maneuvering and loading area.

The interior of the Belmont Station is pleasant and comfortable with eye-saving fluorescent lighting, air-conditioning, hot-water heating, non-glare asphalt plank floor in the workroom area, modern open and low style counters, a complete Self-Service Postal Unit in the lobby, and many other features which the Post Office Department has designed for efficient and economical mail handling and for improved postal service to the public.



#### **BESSEMER STATION**

The community of Bessemer was platted on August 12, 1886 by the Central Colorado Improvement Company and named for Sir Henry Bessemer, who perfected the process of converting iron ore to steel. The community was on the southeast edge of Pueblo, south of the Arkansas River and north of the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company steel mill.

Bessemer became the principal residential area for the workers at the steel mill. In 1891 it was renamed and platted as Minnequa, for the name of a nearby lake and of the steel mill at that time. In 1892 Jay Gould and John D. Rockefeller gained control of the steel mill. In 1894 the community was annexed to Pueblo.

Bessemer never operated as an independent post office. In 1895 it was established as a Station of Pueblo. From 1904 to 1929 the Bessemer Station was also known as Station A. From 1920 it was Station A, which appears to have been closed around 1976.

Bessemer is on the east side of Interstate 25 between Exits 97A and 97B. It is a community of small homes and scattered businesses.

#### COLORADO CITY RURAL STATION / COMMUNITY POST OFFICE

This Colorado City is a creation of the late twentieth century and has no relation to the original Colorado City that was established in 1860 in El Paso County.

In 1963 the Colorado City Development Corporation announced plans to create a planned community west of Interstate 25 in the area of the old community of Crow (Crow Junction). The planned development would include a large portion of the historic Alexander Hicklin Ranch and was planned for an eventual population of 30,000. The "dreamland" city in the country was to be a group of villages surrounded by open county and every resident would be within walking distance of open spaces, to be preserved in perpetuity.

Colorado City does exist but it has not fully met the grandiose plans of the Development Corporation. There is a golf course, a couple of small commercial centers and a number of homes on an extensive street network. At Exit 74 there is a service station and in 1969 a Holiday Inn was built on the west side of the interstate. That motel now goes by a different name but is still in operation.

The Colorado City Post Office was established as a Rural Station of Pueblo. It is now classified as a Community Post Office and has never had independent status.

In late November 1969 an odd event took place at Colorado City. The Chamber of Commerce and the Lions Club conducted a "wake" for the old community of Crow Junction complete with a parade and the symbolic burial of remnants of Crow Junction. The "grave" was placed beneath the then under construction Holiday Inn.

Colorado City is accessible via Colorado Highway 165 from Interstate 25, Exit 74. The community stretches west along that highway towards Rye. My last visit to the area was in 1999 so it is possible that it has grown.







#### PUEBLO WEST RURAL BRANCH / COMMUNITY POST OFFICE

Pueblo West is a late twentieth century community. Although some development in the area had begun by 1960 it was not until September 16, 1969 that Pueblo West was organized as an extensive planned community to be developed west of the city of Pueblo and north of the Arkansas River.

Adding to the interest in the plan was the construction of the Pueblo Dam and Reservoir. The dam, completed in 1975, is part of the Frying Pan-Arkansas Project to divert water from the western slope of Colorado to the eastern side of the Continental Divide to increase water supplies for cities and farms. The Pueblo Dam created a reservoir with a capacity of 357,000 acre-feet.

At first Pueblo West was slow to grow; but, by 1998 it claimed a population of 13,000. The Pueblo West Post Office is one of the modern creations that by all reason should be an independent post office but is not. The policy of the U. S. Postal Service, likely to control costs, is to avoid adding new independent post offices when they can add the administrative responsibility to a nearby city post office.

In 2002 the Pueblo West Post Office was located at 356 McCullough, in one of the suites of a small strip mall.

Established in 1960 as a Rural Branch of Pueblo, the Pueblo West Post Office is now classified as a Community Post Office.

#### **ROCK CREEK**

Rock Creek was nothing more than a store and post office at the foot of Rock Creek Hill on the road from Pueblo to Beulah. Charlie Fehr operated the store and his wife Kate, was the postmaster. The store served as a halfway stop for those traveling between Pueblo and Beulah.

Today, the site is on Colorado Highway 76, ten miles east of the entrance to Beulah from Highway 76. The site was about where Highway 76 descends from Rock Creek Hill and reaches Rock Creek. There are no remaining structures but there is evidence of past activity in the more or less open area as you approach the creek.



#### **RYE**

In 1874 Captain William Meredith, from Missouri, homesteaded on Muddy Creek. In 1882 Calvin Goss laid out the town of Rye. Calvin Goss was also instrumental in the establishment of Crow in 1885.

The first post office in the area was called Table Mountain and was on the ranch belonging to David Nichols. It is standard for historians to equate Table Mountain to Rye; however, according to the Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Reports the Table Mountain Post Office was more than a mile to the west-northwest of the initial location of the Rye Post Office.

The Table Mountain Post Office closed October 4, 1880. It is possible that when a new post office was opened in early 1881, there was intent to name it Table Mountain. That attempt failed and the post office was named Rye, ostensibly for the presence of wild rye in the area.

Rye developed as a combination agricultural center and resort town. Farm crops, including rye, were grown in the area. Ranching was also prominent in the surrounding countryside.

The location of Rye, in the foothills of the Wet Mountains and on the edge of the San Isabel National Forest, made Rye a center for those wishing to hunt, fish or camp in the mountains. Some of those people established summer homes in Rye.

Because of its varied economy, Rye has managed to survive and has experienced a slow growth. It has a modest business district and a considerable residential district.

From Exit 74 on Interstate 25, drive west eight miles on Colorado Highway 165 to Rye. The original location of the Rye Post Office was north of the present town. From Rye, drive northwest a short distance to Old San Isabel Road and turn north. Six-tenths miles from Colorado 165 there is a ranch with a number of old buildings. I suspect that this was the original location of the Rye Post Office. The location of Table Mountain was a mile and a half further west along Old San Isabel Road.

When next a location was reported to the Post Office Department in 1941, the Rye Post Office was in the present town. I feel reasonably certain that it had moved into the town well before 1941. Sometime between 1972 and 1989 a new post office was built in Rye. The new building is a large brick building and indicative of Rye's permanence.



#### SAINT CHARLES

Settlement here may have begun as early as 1853 when William Kroenig and a party of traders camped near a couple of deserted log cabins at the trail crossing of the St. Charles River. There was no development and it was not until the mid-1860's that true settlement began.

In 1887 George Crofutt described Saint Charles as, "A ranch and crossroads post office, situated in a section of country devoted wholly to raising cattle and sheep." Saint Charles would have been on the wagon and stage road from Pueblo southwards.

In 1879 a Geographical Site Location Report submitted to the Post Office Department referred to the place as also being known as Fairhurst Ranch. That was logical since James Fairhurst was postmaster at the time and confirms the ranch post office status of Saint Charles.

From Interstate 25, Exit 88, drive west on Burnt Mill Road (Pueblo County Road 247). After leaving the interstate Burnt Mill Road goes southwest for about a half-mile before turning to the west. Southeast of the road and between Interstate 25 and the turn to the west, there is ranch complex on a low hill. I believe that the Saint Charles Post Office was at or near that ranch. It is likely that the Fisher Post Office (1895-1908) was in the same place.

#### **SALT CREEK**

Salt Creek was located on the original alignment of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad. The surrounding area was stock raising country but there was also a facility to burn lime for use as fertilizer or in plaster.

The location is on Salt Creek, hence the name of the post office. When the application for a post office was submitted, "Salt Creek Lime Works" was the name of choice. Obviously the Post Department did not favor a name of that length and shortened it to Salt Creek.

The Salt Creek Post Office was closed in 1893 but reopened in 1904. When that application was submitted the name of choice was Sears. That name was rejected, perhaps in fear of confusion with the Sears Point Post Office in Sonoma County California. If so this is another example of the Post Office Department's concern that clerks could misread Col. as Cal.

Exit from Interstate 25 at Exit 74 (Colorado City). Turn east from the interstate and go south on the frontage road to Abbey Road (Pueblo County Road 345) and turn east. Go to the intersection with Cedarwood Road (County Road 342). Take Cedarwood Road east to the intersection with Clay Mine Road (south) and Wolfenberger Road (north). These may also be designated as Pueblo County Roads 341 and 339 respectively.

In May 1999, Jim Ozment and I visited this area to investigate the post office locations. According to the map we were using there was no road to the Salt Creek location. From the above intersection we did drive north two and a half miles on Wofensberger Road to the head of the Salt Creek Valley. We reversed direction and went back to a road that was not on our map – Black Horse Drive. We went east on that road to Railroad Spring Road and turned south to the Salt Creek bridge.

There we realized that we were on the old railroad grade. There was evidence for a railroad siding and we concluded that the Salt Creek Post Office and Salt Creek Lime Works Station were in the area west of Railroad Spring Road and next to the railroad grade. There were no remaining structures.

The original (1880) location of Salt Creek would be about a half mile west of Railroad Spring Road. The 1904 location would be adjacent to the present day road.



#### **SILOAM**

Other names for this place include Red Creek Springs, Parnassus Springs and Siloam Springs. Apparently the name Siloam was the more popular and became attached to the place and the post office. Siloam is a biblical reference, to the healing pool made famous by the story of the blind man (John 6).

There is no evidence that any sort of community developed at this location. It would seem that the springs were not significant or failed to attract the attention of developers. The topographic maps of the area do not even show the symbol that would indicate a spring.

#### SILOAM - Continued

To visit the site drive west from Pueblo on Colorado Highway 96. The site of Siloam is about four miles east of the Pueblo-Custer County line, at the intersection with Siloam Road (Pueblo County Road 201). All that remains of Siloam are a few foundations and a slab in the southwest quadrant of the intersection.

The Siloam Post Office lasted for more than fifty years but the lack of structures or signs of real development lead to the conclusion that Siloam was a rural or ranch post office. I have not found a reference but it is possible that there was a country store at Siloam.





#### **SITTON**

Sitton was a rural post office five miles southeast of Goodpasture. On a 1956 map it is shown as "Sitton Corner." There is no evidence for a community of any sort at Sitton.

This site can be approached either from Colorado Highway 76 via Three R Road (Pueblo County Road 230), or from Interstate 25 via County Road 230 (Burnt Mill Road). The later choice would take you by the sites of Fisher, Saint Charles, Agate, Kinkel and Burnt Mill.

From the site of Burnt Mill, stay on Road 230 to the junction with County Road 229. At that point, Road 230 is marked as Three R Road and continues to the west. Go an additional two miles. If you come to a fork in the road, keep to the left. The site of Sitton was on the south side of Road 230, where it changes direction from southwest to due west before turning south to intersect Road 231. There is a ranch complex on the south side of the road and the surrounding countryside appears to be used for livestock.

#### **SOUTH PUEBLO**

The Central Colorado Improvement Company, a creation of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad, established South Pueblo. In typical Rio Grande fashion, when the railroad reached Pueblo on the north bank of the Arkansas River, they crossed to the south bank and placed their station on property owned by the railroad. After the disastrous flood of June 1921, the Arkansas River was rerouted through Pueblo and the terminal and rail yards were then north of the river.

#### **SOUTH PUEBLO – Continued**

On October 27, 1872, the town of South Pueblo was platted. In 1885 Pueblo, South Pueblo and Central Pueblo were consolidated. As development proceeded, the former South Pueblo became a center of the growing Pueblo.

South Pueblo became the location for the steel mills of the Colorado Coal and Iron Company. The first furnace was blown in on September 9, 1881. Associated with the steel mill was the community of Bessemer that provided housing for the workers at the mill.





#### **SPARROW**

Sparrow has been described as a stock-raising and farming community on the south side of the Arkansas River at the junction with the Huerfano River. Another report places it northwest of Jackson at the river junction.

The location that is provided by the Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report is a bit at odds with the above description. The report places Sparrow south of the Arkansas River but the location in the northwest quarter of Section 8 is clearly on the north side of the river. That would be on the southeast corner of Boone, which seems unlikely. To be south of the river the location would be in Section 17.

#### **SPARROW - Continued**

I am willing to place Sparrow south of the river at virtually the same place as the Jackson Post Office (See the discussion below). However, if that is correct, then both post offices were in operation at the same time. But remember the Post Office Department records for Jackson are mixed up, so it may be possible that the Sparrow Post Office was a successor to Jackson. I also observe that the first postmaster for Jackson was Alfred Clough and the postmaster at Sparrow was Mrs. Annie L. Clough. That may indicate a close relationship between the two post offices.

This area, now on the north side of US Highway 50 and east of the Huerfano River is partially cultivated fields and partially sagebrush covered rangeland with no remaining structures.

### Further discussion of the Jackson-Sparrow situation

I think that it is appropriate here to review the problems that I have encountered in presenting the history of the Jackson and Sparrow Post Offices in Pueblo County.

My sources of information are the Post Office Department Records of Postmaster Appointments and the Geographical Site Location Reports. In addition there are a few, very few, remarks in Colorado historical literature. The annual Postal Guides are another source of information. I have post office listings from the 1876 and the 1881-1894 Guides. I also have available the official Post Route maps of Colorado for 1875 and 1884, Nells 1880 Map of Colorado and Glenn Scott's *Historic Trail Maps of the Pueblo 1°X 2° Quadrangle, Colorado*.

First to summarize the information from these sources:

#### Jackson

- Post Office established March 21, 1873 with Alfred Clough as postmaster.
- William Allen appointed postmaster May 18, 1881
- There is no date of discontinuance in the Records of Postmaster Appointments. Following Allen's name is a simple notation "Gunnison County," with no qualification.
- Jackson is listed under Pueblo County in the Annual Postal Guides for 1876 and 1881-1887. It does not appear in the 1888 Guide.
- The Site Location Report places Jackson in Township 21 South, Range 61 West, one mile south of the Arkansas River and on the east bank of Huerfano Creek (River).
- The maps referred to above place Jackson about two miles further to the southwest, in what I estimate to be Section 24 of Township 21 South, Range 62 West.
- The Jackson situation is complicated by the opening, probably in 1890, of a Jackson Post Office in Gunnison County.

#### **Sparrow**

- Established October 5, 1883 with Mrs. Annie L. Clough as postmaster
- Discontinued December 23, 1885, papers to Jackson. That seems to confirm the operation of the Jackson Post Office in 1885.
- Sparrow is listed under Pueblo County in the 1884-1887 Postal Guides but does not appear in the 1888 Guide.
- Sparrow and Jackson are both shown on the 1884 Post Route Map, with only a short distance between them. The same is true for the Pueblo Quadrangle Trail Map.

#### **Summary**

- Sparrow was located in the area that today lies between US Highway 50 and the Arkansas River and east of the Huerfano River.
- Sparrow and Jackson were both in operation during the 1883-1885 time frame.
- The Clough family appears to have provided postmasters to both Jackson and Sparrow but not at the same time.

#### SPARROW - Continued

- Is it possible that with the appointment of Mr. Allen as postmaster for Jackson, the post office moved to the southwest from its original location? That could explain the Clough family being postmasters at Jackson and later at Sparrow and the relationship shown on the various maps..
- Why was it necessary during 1883-1885 to have two post offices in such close proximity? There was no river to separate them.
- At present I have no firm answer to this situation. I tend to equate the location of Sparrow to the original location of Jackson but I am willing to consider a later location of Jackson to the southwest of the original site.

The problem is unresolved and warrants further investigation by someone with access to additional records, perhaps in Pueblo County archives.

#### **SPERRYVALE**

I have found no historical reference to this place in Pueblo County. A postmaster was appointed but three months later the appointment was rescinded. It is probable that Mrs. Schaefer could not qualify or was no longer on site. I believe the post office was never in operation.

There is no Geographical Site Location Report on file, therefore I have no information as to where Sperryvale might have been.

#### STONE CITY

Stone City was located in the northwest corner of Pueblo County. A community did develop with housing and services for the workers that were employed at the sandstone quarries and clay mines that surrounded the settlement.

Over the course of its forty-five years of operation the Stone City Post Office moved at least three times, from its original location. However, none of those moves was of any great distance. They may have been made necessary by expanding mining or quarrying activities. The Turkey Creek Stone Company was the principal operator of the quarries.

#### **STONE CITY - Continued**

Myrtle was another community in the same area, preceding Stone City. It too was based on a quarry operation and the Myrtle Post Office was less than a mile northeast of the sites of Stone City.

Stone City was served by a railroad, the Kansas Colorado Railroad. The railroad was chartered in 1911, went through a couple of name changes and was finally dismantled in 1958.

The location is now within the boundaries of the Fort Carson Military Reservation and there is no access to the site. The closest you can get is from US Highway 50, four miles east of the Pueblo-Fremont County line. From US 50, drive north on Pueblo County Road 111. Four miles from US 50 you will find a gate and a large sign telling you to "STOP"/ "HALT" as you are about to enter the Fort Carson Airburst Range. The locations of Stone City were some two miles further to the north. It is doubtful that anything other than foundations and evidence of the quarrying would be found.

An examination of the location using Google Earth, shows no evidence of structures in the vicinity of either Stone City or its neighbor Myrtle. A quarry is visible.



#### **SWALLOWS**

Swallows was located on the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad west of Pueblo. It was the successor to the earlier post office of Taylorville.

Swallows was named for the large number of cliff swallows, *Petrochelidon pyrrhonota*, that nest in the limestone cliffs that border the Arkansas River.

Swallows was a small settlement that had easy access by wagon and had railroad switches and loading facilities for cattle and produce.

There are seven Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Reports for Swallows and one for Taylorville. All of the reports reference the post office to the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad. Prior to 1932 the reports for Taylorville and Swallows all place Swallows on the south side of the Arkansas River. After 1932 the Swallows Post Office was on the north side of the river but its location was still referenced to the Denver and Rio Grande Station, south of the river.

In 1970 construction began on the Pueblo Dam and Reservoir, a part of the Frying Pan-Arkansas Project that brings water from the Western Slope to the east side of the Continental Divide. Swallows and Taylorville are at the extreme western end of the reservoir. As part of the reservoir construction, the Denver and Rio Grande tracks were relocated well to the north of the river and all signs of the communities of Swallows and Taylorville were eliminated.

To reach this area at the west end of the reservoir, drive west on US Highway 50 to the western edge of Pueblo West. Turn south on Swallows Road. Two and a half miles from US 50, Swallows Road turns west for a mile and then again briefly south. In 2002 the reservoir level was very low and Jim Ozment and I were able to continue on a dirt track down on to the reservoir bottoms and explore the area on the north side of the river where Swallows was located. We found no evidence there.

A portion of the old Santa Fe Railroad grade was visible. Prior to 1921 the Santa Fe had tracks on the north side of the Arkansas River but the disastrous flood of June 1921 washed out large portions of the tracks and they were not replaced.

We left the river bottom and drove up to the small Swallows Cemetery, which sits on the bluff above the river and the reservoir basin. From that vantage point nothing was visible that could be connected to any of the sites of Swallows or Taylorsville.



#### TABLE MOUNTAIN

Table Mountain was an early ranch post office on Muddy Creek about two miles west-northwest of the town of Rye. It is claimed that David Nichols "kept a post office," and that in 1881 James C. Thomas moved the Table Mountain Post Office to Rye. Neither of these names appears in the Records of Postmaster Appointments for either Table Mountain or Rye. That does not preclude these men of having an involvement with those post offices but just not as postmasters.

The short life of the Table Mountain Post Office demonstrates its ranch or rural nature.

Follow the directions previously given to Rye and to the original location of the Rye Post Office. From that site continue west on Old San Isabel Road another mile and a half. At that distance there are some scattered buildings and open fields. I found nothing that I thought might be a direct connection to the Table Mountain Post Office.

#### **TACONY**

Tacony was a rural post office in the extreme northeastern corner of Pueblo County. The surrounding area is devoted to agriculture and stock-raising.

Miss Mary J. Cook is credited with establishing the post office and supposedly, for twenty-five years, the post office was in a store on her homestead. That statement does not agree with the information found in the Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Reports. Five location reports were filed.

The initial report is for a location that was just south of the Pueblo-El Paso County line and a mile east of the Pueblo-Crowley County line. Miss Cook was postmaster at that location. The 1940 and 1941 reports are for sites in the same general area. In 1928 the post office moved north into El Paso County, about a mile northwest of the original location. In 1937 the post office was back in Pueblo County, two miles south of the Pueblo-El Paso County line and one mile east of the Pueblo-Crowley line.

To visit these sites I suggest that you begin at Boone on Colorado Highway 96. Drive east from Boone to Boone Road (Pueblo County Road 611). This road wanders east for about four miles before turning due north for a long run into El Paso County. Go thirteen miles north to Highland Road (County Road 618). Go east six miles to Morland Road (County Road 625) and turn north. Go a mile and a half north to the end of that road where there is a ranch and an old stone building. I believe this was the 1937 location of Tacony.

Now, backtrack a mile to Russell Road (County Road 614). Turn west two miles to Prairie Hill Road (County Road 613) and turn north. As you cross into El Paso County, in the distance to the east there is an old structure of some sort. A little further north, there are more remnants of a structure to the east of the road. Either of these could be the 1928 site of Tacony in El Paso County.

You are now on Whitemore Road. Two miles north of the county line turn east on Rasner Road and go two miles east to Rasner Lane. In 1997 this was marked as a dead end road. Turn south on Rasner Lane, which leads into a ranch complex on, or just south, of the county line. This active ranch group is in the area of the 1915, 1940 and 1941 locations of the Tacony Post Office.

#### **TACONY - Continued**

Reportedly Miss Cook once lived in Tacony Station, Pennsylvania, hence the name she chose for the post office. The initial Site Location Report indicates that Cook was the preferred name for the post office. That choice may have been rejected to avoid confusion with the Cook Post Office in San Benito County California.



#### **TAYLORVILLE**

Taylorville was the first post office to be established on the south side of the Arkansas River at the far western end of the modern Pueblo Dam and Reservoir. The original location of the post office was at the ranch of Daniel Taylor, the first postmaster of Taylorville. The Taylor ranch was two miles from the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad station of Swallows.

Having access to railroad facilities, a small settlement developed at Swallows and in 1892 the Taylorville Post Office moved to Swallows and took a new name.

Please refer to the discussion of Swallows for more about this place and directions to the location. From the south there is no apparent public access to the site.



#### UNDERCLIFFE

Undercliffe is another of the settlements that were near the Huerfano River, southeast of Pueblo. And like the others – Huerfano and Hermosillo – there are questions about its placement and its history.

Undercliffe was a ranch post office on the Huerfano River and it had some connection to the Huerfano Post Office. The Post Office Department records indicate that in 1879 the Huerfano Post Office was moved to Undercliffe. The question remains whether that was move from a location in Huerfano County or from a nearby location in Pueblo County.

The November 1878 Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report is reasonably clear, placing Undercliffe on the south side of the Huerfano River.

There is some irrigation in the area but mostly the land is devoted to stock-raising.

To reach that site, having come southeast from Andersonville via Pueblo County Road 321, and assuming you have reached the Huerfano River at the "Doyles Settlement," cross the river on what is now Pueblo County Road 705 to the junction of Red Top Road and East Huerfano Road. Continue southeast three-tenths miles on Red Top Road to a gate and a farm road to the south. This is the entrance to the Vold Ranch. I was fortunate that when I reached the gate to the ranch, a ranch-hand was coming out from the farm road. After I explained my interest, he allowed me to go through and it was another mile and a half to the ranch complex. That ranch complex matches to the location in the 1878 Site Location Report. The ranch is the home of the Harry Vold Rodeo Company (2001).

At the ranch I talked with the residents. They were unaware that Undercliffe might have been at their ranch. They directed me to another location several miles to the northeast and to the north of the Huerfano River.

It is for that location, that when describing the directions to the Wilson Post Office I remarked about crossing Undercliffe Road as you continued south from Wilson. To visit this "second" location of Undercliffe, please refer to the discussion of Wilson.

Back at the intersection of Pueblo County Roads 322 and 333, go east on Road 322 three and one-half miles to a T intersection with County Road 325. This is also designated as the corner of Undercliffe Road and 44th Lane. There are some buildings of various ages in the area.

I have no good reason to doubt that at some time the Undercliffe Post Office was in this area. If it was here, then apparently the move was not reported to the officials in Washington or at least not properly recorded.

#### VERDE

Verde was another of the rural, railroad post offices on the original alignment of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad south of Pueblo.

Apparently Verde was a bit more than the railroad station and its attendant facilities. There was a school, although that building is a mile or so from the location of Verde on the west side of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad. There is also a Verde Cemetery, a mile north of the location of the post office.

As with its neighbor Marnel, there is no public access to the location of Verde on the railroad. The schoolhouse has been converted to a private residence.

Take Exit 87 from Interstate 25 and drive southeast on Verde Road (Pueblo County Road 337). It is about four miles to the vicinity of Marnel and Verde. Unfortunately, there is no public access to the railroad and the sites of Verde or Marnel. The Verde School is on the west side of Verde Road. The cemetery is a half-mile east of the road.

#### WAREMART/WAREMONT

This was a rural post office thirteen miles south of the site of Nepesta on US Highway 13. Today the surrounding area is open rangeland and has likely been so since the time of this post office.

There is some question as to the correct spelling of the post office name. The Post Office Department used the spelling Waremart. However, it has appeared on maps as Waremont. I choose to accept the spelling of Waremart. No matter which version is correct, the name was derived from that of the first postmaster – William R. Ware.

Beginning at Nepesta on US Highway 50, drive south on Pueblo County Road 721. There will be some jogs in the road. Go two and one-half miles to County Road 17 and turn west one half mile to Road 729. Two miles from the intersection the road turns slightly southwest, then back to the east before again

turning due south. From the turn south it is seven miles to the intersection with Road 718 to the east. Waremart was in the southeast quadrant of this intersection. In 2001 there was a small pile of concrete rubble at that location.

With several twists and turns, County Road 729 continues south eventually reaching Colorado Highway 10 near the site of White Rock.

#### WHITE ROCK

White Rock was a rural post office in the southeast corner of Pueblo County. There is no evidence that it was more than a few ranches to the west of what is now Pueblo County Road 729.


It seems probable that the name was a reference to Cretaceous limestone exposures in streams of the area.

Pueblo County Road 729 crosses Colorado Highway 10 three miles west of the Pueblo-Otero County line. To the north Road 729 will take you to the site of Waremont and eventually to US Highway 50. To the south, Road 729 is a variable distance east of the three locations of the White Rock Post Office that are described in the Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Reports. The first site (1908) is a mile and a half south of Highway 10 and about a mile west of Road 729. The second location (prior to 1923) was two and a half miles south of Highway 10 and more than a mile west of Road 729. The final location (1923-1927) was about two miles south of Highway 10 and no more than a quarter mile from Road 729.

In 2001, when I visited the area, for the 1908 location, there was an adobe wall still standing, some distance west of the road. From the road nothing was visible in the direction of the pre-1923 location. At the 1923-1927 location a portion of a concrete foundation was still visible.

#### WILSON

The Pueblo Rock Ford Land Company platted the town of Wilson on January 27, 1911. There is no evidence that it ever developed to any significant extent. The post office lasted only two and a half years, which is an indication of the lack of success of the development.

Wilson was located southeast of Pueblo on the higher ground between the St. Charles River and the Huerfano River. The area is generally level, mostly grazing land with a scattering of ranches and other residences.

Follow the directions to Andersonville. Continue south across the St. Charles River. Once across the river you are on Broadacre Road (Pueblo County Road 321). Take the road southeast, passing the Broadacre Landfill on the west side. Go five and eight-tenths miles to Bush Road (County Road 328). Turn east and go one and four-tenths miles to the intersection with County Road 333. Wilson was in the vicinity of the intersection. At the intersection there is an older house and what may be a junkyard.

From Wilson, turn south on Road 333 and go two and two-tenths miles to Broadacre Road and continue on to the location of Huerfano.

A short distance before reaching Broadacre Road you will cross Undercliffe Road (County Road 322). It may be a good choice to turn east on that road to visit what might have been a site of Undercliffe before continuing south.

It is possible that you will find signs that label Broadacre Road as Doyle Road. This is an indication of the changes in road names that are to be expected in Pueblo and El Paso Counties.



#### WOOD VALLEY

The Wood Valley Post Office opened in 1862 at a location on the east side of Fountain Creek. The single Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report does not provide a firm location for the post office. In addition, Wood Valley had an intermittent existence, closing and reopening twice before closing for good in 1869. Wood Valley was on the stage road from Colorado City to Pueblo. It appears to have been a combination ranch and stage station.

The best clue to the location of Wood Valley is in the discussion of the construction of the Denver and New Orleans Railroad, down the east side of Fountain Creek. James R Jones, in *Denver & New Orleans, in the Shadow of The Rockies* makes the following statement:

#### WILSON - Continued

It was six miles south of Wigwam where the line passed within 50 feet of the door to Wood Valley School. Later that summer, the school board voted to move the school to Dawkins, a station stop across the creek on the D&RG and Santa Fe. Later the Dawkins name was changed to Pinon.

From that comment, it would appear that Wood Valley was opposite the sites of Dawkins and Pinon and on the east side of Fountain Creek.

To visit that area, follow the directions to Pinon. Continue east on Pueblo County Road 106 crossing to the east side of Fountain Creek to Overton Road (Pueblo County Road 501). Wood Valley was most likely somewhere in the vicinity of this intersection.
