

## ALAMOSA COUNTY

Alamosa County was one of the final Colorado counties to be created. It was authorized on March 8, 1913 and was created from portions of Costilla and Saguache Counties.

Alamosa County is situated in the east central portion of the San Luis Valley. At its maximum dimensions, the county is thirty-two miles from east to west and 27 miles from north to south. On the north lies Saguache County, to the northeast, at the crest of the Sangre de Cristo is Huerfano County, to the southeast Costilla County, to the south Conejos County and to the west Rio Grande County.

The county is traversed from east to west by US Highway 160 from Walsenburg over La Veta Pass, through Alamosa and on to Durango via Monte Vista, Del Rio and Wolf Creek Pass. From the Rio Grande County line to Alamosa, US-160 shares the road with US Highway 285, which at Alamosa turns south on its way to Santa Fe. From the north, coming over Poncha Pass and south through Saguache County is Colorado Highway 17 that terminates at Alamosa. Access to the Great Sand Dunes National Park is either east from Mosca on Colorado 17, or north from US 160, a short distance west of Blanca in Costilla County.

As the principal city of what would become Alamosa County, Alamosa came into being in 1878 when the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad reached the site after building west from Walsenburg over La Veta Pass. From Alamosa, the railroad turned south to Antonito, went over Cumbres Pass to Chama, New Mexico and then wound its way west to Durango and eventually to Silverton. A branch line was built west up the Rio Grande as far as Creede. Another branch of the Denver and Rio Grande separated from the main line at Mears Junction, north of Poncha Pass and then followed the future route of Colorado 17 to Alamosa. Alamosa thus became an important junction point for the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad until service south and north of the city was discontinued. There is still intermittent traffic to Alamosa, but with the recent closure of the major lumber mill at South Fork, freight service beyond Alamosa is almost non-existent.


Most of the county is level to near level land sloping towards the Rio Grande River that enters the county from the west and curves to the southeast, exiting into Costilla County. The northeastern portion of the county reaches into the Sangre de Cristo Mountains and includes Mosca Pass (or Music Pass) which can no longer be traversed. Other than the Rio Grande, the other streams in Alamosa County are seasonal, with the water from most sinking rapidly in to the porous sand and gravel that make up the valley floor.

At the foot of the mountains, where the road from Mosca Pass once reached the valley floor are the Great Sand Dunes. For many years a National Monument, in 2000 Congress elevated the status to the "Great Sand Dunes National Park. The city of Alamosa is the primary hotel and restaurant service area for the park. Another local attraction is the Alamosa National Wildlife Refuge located a few miles southeast of Alamosa. Alamosa is also the home of Adams State College.

In addition to tourism and the college, agriculture has been a principal activity in Alamosa County. Livestock are raised throughout the area and farming is extensive on land irrigated from the Rio Grande River or from wells. A new agricultural enterprise is also striving to succeed: The Colorado Gator Farm. Yes, alligators. The often frigid San Luis Valley seems an unlikely place to raise alligators, but some of the deep wells produce hydrothermal water that is sufficiently warm to nurture the reptiles. The Gator Farm also raises fish, tilapia, for sale to the market.

Mining was never a major activity in Alamosa County. There were some mines on the western slopes of the Sangre de Cristo Mountains, but none lasted for long or produced significant values of metals. However, as a railroad center, Alamosa was a major transshipment point for supplies going west to the San Juan mines and ore coming out of those mines.

The climate of Alamosa County is mild; however the temperature can go to extremes in winter or in summer. The basin of the San Luis Valley tends to hold air, allowing it to either heat in summer or cool in winter. Rainfall is modest as is to be expected in a semi-arid region and you are more likely to see dust devils in summer than steady rains.

## ALAMOSA

Alamosa was a creation of the Denver and Rio Grande as the railroad built west into the San Luis Valley towards the San Juan Mountains. A. C. Hunt, President of the railroad, is credited with establishing the town in early 1878. Initially, Alamosa supplanted Garland (City) as the end of track. With that status, came the end of Garland. The buildings at Garland were dismantled or loaded on flat cars and moved to the new end of track. Within a few days the new town of Alamosa was on the map.

There was an earlier settlement and post office in the area by the name of "Wayside." Some claim that Alamosa occupies the site of Wayside, but other reports indicate that it was slightly west of the townsite of Alamosa.

Wayside was a stage station, but the establishment of Alamosa sealed the fate of Wayside. The Post Office Department records indicate that both places had post offices for about six months in mid-1878. This fact could support the contention that they were at separate locations, or it might simply be tardiness of the Post Office Department in accommodating the presence of two post offices at the same place.

The railroad established shops at Alamosa and made it a division station. Eventually it would be a railroad hub with lines from Salida via Poncha Pass, Durango via Cumbres Pass, Walsenburg via La Veta Pass and a line west to Creede at the edge of the San Juan Mountains.

Alamosa is centrally located in the San Luis Valley, a rich agricultural land; thus it became a trading and shipping point for produce. It is also centrally located with respect to a number of mining districts and Alamosa became the central supply for the mines.

There is still some railroad activity while mining has nearly disappeared from the surrounding area. Agriculture has grown in importance and the establishment of Adams State College has helped Alamosa remain a prosperous community and continue to grow. Alamosa is also the tourist center for the nearby Great Sand Dunes National Park.

The name "Alamosa" was bestowed by A. C. Hunt and is a Spanish word meaning "cottonwood grove."





## CATHERIN

I have found no information relative to Catherin in the historical literature. From what remains at the site, I expect that it was at best a cluster of farmsteads probably with a combination store and post office. I have no information on the source of the name. Pure speculation would attribute it to the wife, daughter, or other relative of the first postmaster.

#### **CATHERIN - Continued**

To reach the site of Catherin, drive south from Alamosa on US-285 about two and one-half miles to Colorado Highway 370. Drive west seven miles on Colorado 370 to the location of Catherine. At this location is a grouping of farm and ranch buildings of mixed vintage.

## CORYELL

Coryell was a small rural community and post office in northwestern Alamosa County. The area is ranch and farmland in the central portion of the San Luis Valley.

To reach the site of Coryell, from Mosca drive west on Lane 5 eight miles to a point one mile east of the County Line. There is one older building on the south side of the road, but nothing on the north side where Coryell was reported to be located.

The first postmaster was George E. Coryell, so it seems obvious that the post office took his family name. By 1890 Mr. Coryell was no longer postmaster and the office name was changed to Stanley.

## GARNETT

Goudy was a ranch community in the northwestern corner of Alamosa. The name was changed to Garnett when a post office was established there in 1888. The name "Goudy" was that of an early settler, but I have not found any information as to the origin of the name Garnett.


From Hooper, drive six and one-half miles west to Road 102 North, then two miles south to Lane 9 North. The southeast corner of this intersection was the location of Garnett in 1913. One mile south and one mile east was the location in 1888, however, nothing remains at that site.

## GARRISON

Garrison was surveyed and platted in February 1881. It was located on the Denver and Rio Grande Railway and has served as a supply and shipping point for ranches in northern Alamosa County and southern Saguache County.

In 1896, to eliminate confusion between "Garrison" and "Gunnison" within the mail and railroad systems the name of the settlement was changed to "Hooper."

Garrison was named for William Garrison, a homesteader who sold his land to the Garrison Town Company.

Garrison/Hooper is on Colorado Highway 17, north of Alamosa and straddles the Saguache-Alamosa county line.

## HENRY

This community has generated considerable confusion in Colorado historical literature. There was a community of the same name in Rio Grande County and most historical references are to that community and not to the one in Alamosa County.

The Alamosa "Henry" is about seven miles southwest of Alamosa on US Highway 285, at a location more commonly known as "Estrella." Estrella is just south of the intersection of US-285 with Colorado Highway 368 to the west.

There was a railroad siding at this location, therefore it is likely that Henry was a small community that served both the railroad and ranches and farms in the surrounding area. The actual site is on a by-pass to the east of US-285 and there are several residences along the by-pass.

## HIRST

Hirst was established as a camp to serve the Commodore Mine on Big Bear Creek. Activity centered on one large building that served as a combination store, boarding house and post office, run by Gard Howe. There were a few other cabins.

The camp was initially named "Commodore" for the mine, but when a post office was requested, several names were proposed: Beckworth, Howe, Bear, Calkins and Hirst. Hirst was chosen in honor of W. R. Hirst, editor of the Alamosa newspaper.

Locating the site of Hirst on the maps of today is not a simple task. The U.S.G.S. Topographic Map of Alamosa does not show a "Big Bear Creek" in the area of Hirst. Nor does the map indicate a mine site. From the Post Office Department Geographic Site Location Reports, the location plots on "Chimney Gulch." A Jeep trail leads into the area, but not to that canyon. According to the U.S.G.S. map there may still be remnants of a building in the vicinity. There is a road east from Colorado Highway 150 which I started on, but after three-quarters of a mile, it became obvious it would not go where I wanted to go, so I went no further.

From U.S. Highway 160, drive north a little more than three miles. You will see the road to the right, trending northeast towards the site of Hirst on the lower slopes of Blanca Peak.

## HOOPER

The townsite of Hooper was originally owned by William Garrison who sold the land to the Garrison Town Company. In 1890, the Town Company established a community on the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad and named it after William Garrison. The similarity of Garrison and Gunnison caused confusion for both the Post Office Department and the railroad, so in 1896 the name was changed to "Hooper." The new name honored Major Hooper, General Agent of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad.

Hooper remains a small, agricultural based community on Colorado Highway 17, nineteen miles north of Alamosa and on the county line with Saguache County. Hooper is also the home community for the Colorado Gator Farm: yes, alligators. Hot water from wells provides the environment to raise alligators in this most unlikely location. The "farm" also raises tilapia (fish) for market.





#### **MEDANO SPRINGS**

The Medano Ranch began when W. W. Dickey bought land from the early settlers and it became a major cattle ranch in what is now eastern Alamosa County. According to the literature, there was a post office at the Medano Ranch. The headquarters ranch was at Medano Springs. However, this not in agreement with the Post Office Geographic Site Location Reports which locate the Medano Springs Post Office on the south side of Mosco Creek and on the trail from Mosco Pass, at what appears to be the later location of the Montville post office

"Medano" is a Spanish word for "dune" or "sand hill." An alternate spelling is "Madano," which is used in the one known postal marking from this office, but not in the official records or on modern maps.

From the present day community of Mosca on Colorado Highway 17, drive east on Colorado Highway 150 towards the Great Sand Dunes National Park. Ten and one-half miles from Mosca a side road goes north four miles to a ranch that may be the Medano Ranch. Continue on into the National Park and beyond the visitor center to the main viewing area for the dunes. To the east of the viewing area, a little distance up the slope is an abandoned cabin. The Montville Nature Trail will lead you towards this structure.

## MONTVILLE

Montville has escaped mention in the historical literature, but has been memorialized by the "Montville Nature Trail" in the Great Sand Dunes National Park. To reach the site, follow the directions given for Medano Springs.

The origin of the name appears to reflect its location at the foot of the Sangre de Christo Mountains. The location on the Mosca Pass trail makes it likely that Montville was a rest and supply stop on the trail as well as a ranch location. There may also have been some mining in the area.

The remnant buildings at this location, previously mentioned, most likely date from the Montville period, rather than from an earlier era. The postal history of this site is rather complex, with four different names having been used for what may be either the same site or four sites in very close proximity. There simply isn't much room between the mountains and the dunes for an extensive community or group of ranches.

First was Medano Springs (1874-1879). Next was Mosco (1880-1882), overlapped by Orean (1881-1887) and followed finally by Montville (1887-1900). From the overlapping dates, it appears the Mosco and Orean may not have been at the same place, or perhaps it is a reflection of a slow reaction of the Post office department to a changing situation and a new postmaster. It is also probable that Montville came to an end when the Mexican Land Grants were confirmed and the settlers were forced out.

## MOSCA

When the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad surveyed the route from Poncha Pass to Alamosa, T. J. Henry organized the Mosca Town Company. At first it was proposed that the new town be called Patterson for the original owner of the site, however, the residents preferred the name "Mosca" for the nearby, well-known pass over the Sangre de Cristo Mountains. Please refer to "Mosco" for a discussion of the derivation of the name. It should be mentioned that Mosca Pass has often been called "Music Pass" because of the musical sounds originating from the nearby sand dunes.

Mosca was less than two miles south of the older community of Streator and with the presence of a railroad station, Streator faded and its post office was closed and moved to Mosca assuming the name of that town. Mosca is on Colorado Highway 17, seven miles south of Hooper and the Alamosa County Line.

Mosca became a supply and shipping point for ranches and farms in the surrounding portion of the San Luis Valley. Although the railroad is gone, the town continues as a small supply center.





## MOSCO

Mosco was a stage station and supply center at the foot of Mosca Pass over the Sangre de Cristo Mountains. At times it was referred to as "Moscow City," but it was never officially known by that name. When the road over La Veta Pass was improved, Mosca Pass declined in importance and so did Mosco, however, it remained to serve cattle and sheep ranchers in the area.

It is claimed that this place was also known as Orean, however, post offices existed at both Mosco and Orean for almost a year. Thus, while the two sites may have been very near one another, they were probably separate locations. To further complicate the situation, the Medano Springs (earlier) and Montville (later) post offices were also in the immediate area of Mosco.

The name, with a slightly different spelling refers to Mosca Pass. It is the Spanish word for "fly." Or perhaps it is a contraction of the name of a Spaniard named either Luis de Moscoso or Moscoso Alvarado who may, or may not, have led a Spanish expedition over the pass in 1542. Some even claim this was the remnant of the De Soto expedition.

Once again, refer to Medano Springs for directions to the site of Mosco.


## **OREAN**

Orean was the third in the sequence of settlements and post offices on the east side of the Great Sand Dunes at the foot of Mosca Pass. There was a sawmill, a quartz mill and about 100 people living in the area. The post office was located in the home of Charles F Holly, Jr. the postmaster.

In spite of the sketch map included with the 1885 Geographic Site Location Report, the quartersection location given would place Orean about a half mile south of its general location at the mouth of Mosca Creek and Canyon. Perhaps this explains the relation between Orean and Mosco. The same document is also reference to Montville.

The directions to Orean are the same as given for Medano Springs, Mosco and Montville. I have no information as to the probable origin of the name "Orean."

## **RIO GRANDE**

Very little is known about Rio Grande, even its location is uncertain. One historical reference calls it "a town at the junction of La Jara creek with the Rio Grande." This would locate it about a mile north of the southern boundary of Alamosa County. Another reference places it "about 8 miles southeast of Alamosa along the Rio Grande River below the junction with Alamosa Creek." In any event, both of these locations are within the boundary of the Alamosa National Wildlife Refuge. This is a flat, very marshy area with few passable roads, none of which are open to the public. From US Highway 160 you can drive two and one-half miles south to the Refuge Visitor Center and from there look southeast across the marshes in the direction of Rio Grande.

The name is obviously that of the river upon which it was located: El Rio Grande Del Norte. If a purpose can be assigned to Rio Grande, it is most likely that of a stage station and roadside rest stop.

## **STANLEY**

In 1887 the name of the Coryell Post Office was changed to Stanley. No explanation is given for the change in name and no new Site Location Report was submitted to the Post Office Department. Perhaps Mr. Coryell fell out of favor with the local residents and they chose to honor another local personage.

The directions to the site of Stanley are the same as previously given for Coryell.

## **STREATOR**

Streator was the name of the first settlement in the vicinity of present day Mosca. Two years after its establishment, the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad built through the area, but chose to accept the new town of Mosca as a location for a station. Streator faded and the post office was moved to and renamed Mosca.

Streator was named by homesteaders Saul and Dick Asay, John Poundstone and George Dicus who had arrived in the San Luis Valley in 1887 from Streator, Illinois.

The first location of Streator was on the south side of Colorado Highway 150, one mile west of Colorado 17. It was later moved to a location on the east side of Colorado 17, one mile north of Colorado 150. A short time after that move, Streator gave way to Mosca.

## WAYSIDE

Wayside was a stage station established by the Barlow and Sanderson Stage Company. The name is a generic one indicative of its purpose as a stage and rest stop.

There has been a general consensus that Wayside was a predecessor to Alamosa and that its existence ended with the establishment of Alamosa. I have no doubt that the creation of Alamosa did soon result in the demise of Wayside, but the sketchy information available from the Post Office Department Geographic Site Location Reports raises a question as to where the office was actually located.

The Site Location report gives a section (4) and a quarter/quarter (NW) but unfortunately does not give the Township and Range. There are two possibilities within a reasonable distance from Alamosa. The key would appear to be in the statement that Wayside was 3/8 of a mile north of the Rio Grande.

The northwest quarter of Section 4, Township 37 North, Range 10 East includes the northwestern portion of Alamosa, but is on the south side of the Rio Grande, at least as the Rio Grande exists today.

#### **WAYSIDE - Continued**

The second choice is in Township 38 North, Range 9 East. In this case section 4 is on the north side of the Rio Grande, about seven miles northwest of Alamosa. At this location there is one fairly new building and an old corral and a big cottonwood tree.

A further fact to be considered is that the Wayside Post Office continued in operation for six months after the Alamosa Post office was established. Since Alamosa came into existence with the arrival of the railroad, this would promptly eliminate the need for any nearby stage station, I doubt that Wayside would have survived for six months. However, if it was seven miles further west from Alamosa and still on the stage route to the San Juan Mines, it could have lasted for a while pending a restructuring of the stage route.

The question remains open and I would appreciate any definitive information for the location of Wayside that any of you can provide.

## ZAPATO

The original name of this settlement was "Zapata." It was a Spanish-American community, settled in 1864 by former residents of Taos, New Mexico. The settlers raised sheep and sold the meat to nearby Fort Garland.

By the late 1870's a number of Mormon settlers had arrived in the area and when a post office was obtained, for some unknown reason the spelling had become "Zapato."

To reach the site of Zapato, from Mosca drive east on Six Mile Lane to the junction with Colorado Highway 150 and turn south. You will see signs advertising the Zapata Ranch and its entry is well marked on the west side of Colorado 150. In the same area, and on the east side of the highway, is a community also using the Zapata name. However, this community appears to be a modern one and I could find no buildings that might date from the late nineteenth century.

Early covers from Zapato often bear a corner card of the Zapato Ranch. It appears that the ranch continues to exist, but that it has now become a fine resort with modern pseudo-rustic buildings, a restaurant and a golf course. However, there are many signs that the site has been occupied for a long time, thus I conclude that this was the site of the Zapato Post office.


