County Seat: Conejos

CONEJOS COUNTY

Conejos County was one of the sixteen original counties created by the Colorado Territorial Legislature on November 1, 1861 [SRM: originally named Guadalupe the name was changed to Conejos November 7, 1861]. As first constituted, Conejos County occupied much of the southwestern portion of the Territory. On February 10, 1874 La Plata, Hinsdale and Rio Grande Counties were authorized reducing Conejos County to what are today Archuleta and Conejos Counties. Archuleta County was removed on April 14, 1885 and Conejos County assumed its present day boundaries. Over the years there were other alterations to the boundaries of the surrounding counties. Eventually, Montezuma and Mineral Counties claimed portions of the original Conejos County.

Conejos County is ethnically diverse. The early immigrants were from New Mexico and there is still a heavy Spanish-American population in Conejos County. In the 1880's the Mormons came to the Conejos River Valley and established several agricultural communities in which the Church of the Latter Day Saints is still prominent. Mining and the railroad added other nationalities to the mix.

Initially the county seat was at Guadalupe, which never had its own post office. In the years prior to 1876, much of the population of Guadalupe shifted across the Conejos River to a new settlement, Conejos, which became the county seat and has retained the position in spite of being overshadowed by Antonito, its close neighbor.

Currently Conejos County is an irregular rectangle. The maximum east-west distance is about fifty-four miles and the maximum north-south distance is a little more than twenty-seven miles. Rio Grande and Alamosa Counties bound it on the north. The eastern boundary with Costilla County is along the Rio Grande River. The southern boundary is shared with Taos and Rio Arriba Counties of New Mexico. The western boundary is with Archuleta County.

Topographically the eastern portion of the county is part of the San Luis Valley and is generally level. There is a north-south trending series of basaltic mesas that force the Conejos River to flow northward from Antonito before emptying into the Rio Grande River in the northeastern corner of the county.

The western portion of the county is increasingly mountainous and at three places the Continental Divide briefly enters Conejos County.

With the exception of the tiny areas west of the Continental Divide, the streams of Conejos County all drain into the Rio Grande River. The three principal tributaries are the Alamosa River, La Jara Creek and the Conejos River. Los Pinos Creek flows north through the Toltec Gorge from New Mexico to join the Conejos River near Alamosa.

Throughout its existence, the economy of Conejos County has been primarily based on agriculture – farming and raising livestock. Timber has also contributed to the economy. Platoro, on the upper reaches of the Conejos River, was the only significant mining development in Conejos County and it had only a modest and intermittent impact. In the mid and late twentieth century the production of perlite provided employment for a few hundred residents.

The only significant industry in the county was the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad. In 1880 the railroad built south from Alamosa, established Antonito and via the Toltec Gorge and Cumbres Pass went into New Mexico and then on west to Durango and Silverton. Antonito became a junction point on the railroad with a branch line to Santa Fe and was an important rail center servicing the trains that climbed over Cumbres Pass.

The tracks of the Santa Fe Branch were removed in 1942. Regular service beyond Antonito on the Durango Branch ceased in 1968 and the tracks beyond Chama were removed by 1971. The section


between Antonito and Chama became the joint property of the states of Colorado and New Mexico and operates during the summer months as the Cumbres and Toltec Scenic Railway.

US Highway 285 runs south from Alamosa, through Antonito and on into New Mexico. Colorado Highway 17 is the road from Antonito over Cumbres Pass into New Mexico. There are other state highways that link the active towns. County roads provide a network in the east-central portion of the county and with Forest Service roads offer limited access into the mountains to the west. There are large sections of the county that lack roads or have only trails.

In the twenty-first century, Conejos County still depends heavily on agriculture. Recreational activities play an increasing part in the county's economy. The Cumbres and Toltec Railroad brings a large number of visitors. Hunting, fishing, camping and other outdoor activities flourish in the western portion of the county. However, Conejos County is somewhat remote from the principal routes of tourist travel and major population centers, thus it has not developed to the extent that have other sections of Colorado. There are many that consider that a good thing.

ANTONITO

Antonito was a creation of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad. Prior to the arrival of the railroad Conejos was the principal settlement. The company failed to receive desired land and other concessions at Conejos and thus, as was all too typical of the Rio Grande, they chose to establish a new town little more than a mile southeast of the existing Conejos.

The Denver and Rio Grande Railroad reached the site of Antonito in 1880. In November of that year a post office with the name San Antonio was established. Two months later, at the end of January 1881 the name was changed to Antonito. The stated reason for the change in name was to avoid confusion with a similarly named community some four miles to the south of the new Antonito.

Antonito is located north of the San Antonio River from which the original name was taken. Antonito ("Little Anthony") is the diminutive form of Antonio.

Antonito became a division point for the Denver and Rio Grande and it was the junction of the San Juan Branch from Alamosa to Durango via Chama, New Mexico, with the New Mexico Branch of the railroad.

Antonito was incorporated in 1889. Although Antonito quickly outgrew Conejos, in size and activity, the Conejos County seat has remained in Conejos (originally Guadalupe) ever since the county was authorized on November 1, 1861.

In the twenty-first century Antonito is still connected by rail to Alamosa and during the summer months the Cumbres and Toltec Scenic Railway operates excursion trains between Antonito and Chama, New Mexico.

When the railroad was in full operation, Antonito was a thriving community, providing housing and services for the railroad personnel and acting as a major shipping and supply point for the ranches and farms in the surrounding countryside.

Another factor in the economy of Antonito was the development of perlite mines in the vicinity of No Aqua, New Mexico. Perlite is a natural volcanic glass that when heated expands to become a light-weight material used in insulation and other products. A processing mill was built at Antonito and during the 1980's employed some 125 people. Antonito earned the nickname, "The Perlite Capitol of the World."

Today the railroad is a minor part of the economy of Antonito. Tourists who come to ride the train do contribute to the economy and Antonito is still a shipping and supply center for the region.

Antonito is located on US Highway 285 about six miles north of the Colorado-New Mexico State line. In 1999 the Antonito Post Office was on the corner of Main Street and Fifth Avenue.

OSIER CONTRACT STATION

During the summer of 1999 the Osier Contract Station was in operation at Osier. Osier is the place where the trains of the Cumbres and Toltec Scenic Railroad meet to exchange passengers who are making the complete Chama to Antonito, or vice versa trip. Osier is also the lunch stop for the trains.

Apparently, after a single season, the operators of the concession at Osier found that operating the Contract Station was not worth the effort and they did not renew the contract for the year 2000.

BROYLES

In my extensive reading of Colorado historical literature I have found no mention of a place named Broyles in Conejos County.

The Post Office Department Geographic Site Location Reports do provide a location for Broyles. Starting at the bridge over the Conejos River, north of Mogote, drive west on Colorado Highway 17 about five and one half miles. That will bring you to a community now called Fox Creek. At that location there are some older homes and this fits with the Site Location Report. It is about a mile west of the Broyles Bridge over the Conejos River.

It should be noted that Fox Creek was the proposed name for the post office. I have no idea as to the source of the accepted name - Broyles.

It seems obvious that Broyles was a rural post office, perhaps one that was intended to provide services to hunters, campers and fishermen visiting the area.

CAPULIN

The organized community of Capulin began in 1867 with the arrival of Mexican immigrants from Ojo Caliente, New Mexico led by Hippolito Romero. There were settlers in the area at least as early as 1859 and in 1862 the farmers diverted water from the Alamosa River to irrigate their crops.

In 1909 the present townsite was platted by a group of which Luis J. Rivera was one of those involved in developing the new town.

The name Capulin is an adaptation of the Aztec word, "capolin," meaning wild cherry or choke cherry.

In the early twentieth century, Capulin was a small but thriving community with three general stores, a parochial school and a lively dance hall. In 1912 one of the San Luis Valley's most beautiful Catholic churches was built at Capulin.

From its beginnings Capulin was a gateway to the Alamosa and La Jara Canyons and the ranching and mining areas along those streams. It was, and to some extent still is, an outfitting point for hunters and fishermen on their way into the San Juan Mountains to the west.

Today Capulin remains a small, active community with a number of residences and a few small businesses. It is located on Colorado Highway 15 (Conejos County Road X) four miles west of Colorado Highway 371 and two miles east of where Colorado 15 turns north towards Monte Vista.

In 1999 the post office was on the north side of the road in a bright lime green adobe building. It was in the same building in 1972.

The 1881 location of the Capulin Post Office was a mile to the east, in the northeast quadrant of the intersection of County Road 9 with Colorado 15. There is a group of farm buildings at that location.



CENICERO

Cenicero was founded in the early 1860's by a group of people from Cochiti, New Mexico. The settlers were members of the Pentitente brotherhood - La Hermandad de Nuesto Padre Jesus - and south of Cenicero they constructed the first morada in the San Luis Valley. At Cenicero there was a plaza surrounded by adobe walls for protection against Indian attack.

CENICERO – Continued

Cenicero is a Spanish word and is reported to mean, "ash heap." This is believed to be a reference to a group of volcanic hills located about nine miles southwest of the community.

The early settlers were farmers and also raised sheep.

In 1902, the name of the post office was changed to Lobatos and at the same time it was moved about a half mile to the west.

The old town of Cenicero is now on a large ranch called the T-Bone. From US Highway 285 in Antonito, drive east on Eighth Avenue. East of Antonito this becomes Conejos County Road G. It is three and three-tenth miles to County Road 17. Lobatos was in the southeast quadrant of this intersection. It is another mile east to County Road 18. Cenicero was in the southwest corner of this intersection. That corner is an open field and appears swampy, which may have contributed to moving the settlement west to Lobatos.

COCKRELL

Cockrell was a small hamlet on the Alamosa River in an area that was principally devoted to raising cattle and sheep. It was on the wagon road that eventually crossed the Continental Divide via Elwood Pass. The settlement took the name of Peter M. Cockrell who was postmaster from 1879 to 1886.

The stated location plots on the north side of the Terrace Reservoir, a short distance west of the dam that contains the reservoir. It is about two miles from the Forest Service Road 255 bridge that crosses the Alamosa River and the site of the Terrace Post Office.

The present day road is on the hillside above the river and it seems probable that Cockrell was below the road within the reservoir basin. There is no visible evidence of buildings or a community.

Approximately two miles west of the dam, the presence of a mine dump on the hillside above the road, indicates that there was some mining activity in the area.

CONEJOS


In 1854 Major Lafayette Head with a group of Spanish-Americans established a colony on the north side of the Conejos River and it took the name of Guadalupe. On November 1, 1861 this small settlement became the county seat of Conejos County when the county was authorized by the Territorial Legislature.

CONEJOS – Continued

The Guadalupe site was on low ground that was subject to flooding and soon Lafayette Head and others moved to higher ground on the south side of the river. For a short time the new community may have continued the name of Guadalupe. However, when a post office opened in 1862 it was under the name of Conejos and Conejos was recognized as the county seat.

Conejos is the Spanish word for rabbits.

In 1856 a church, Our Lady of Guadalupe, was constructed. The original building was frequently enlarged but in 1926, except for the walls, it was destroyed by fire. It was rebuilt and is a large attractive edifice, worthy of a visit to Conejos. The church is still in operation and is recognized as the oldest surviving church in Colorado.

For several years Conejos was the principal town in this part of the county. In 1880 the Rio Grande Railroad was built into the area. As was typical the railroad established a new town to serve its needs. This was Antonito, less than a mile to the southeast of Conejos.

In spite of the rapid growth of Antonito, Conejos has retained the county seat; however it has no real business district. The church, the Court House, a school and the post office are all clustered together.

Access to Conejos is from US Highway 285 just north of Antonito. The exit is well marked and the town is about a mile to the west of the highway.





CUMBRES

In December 1880 construction of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad reached the summit of the divide between Los Pinos and Chama Creeks. At an elevation of 10,015 feet, a post office was established and Cumbres became a year around settlement for Rio Grande employees working for the railroad.

There was a depot, service sheds and a wye for turning equipment that had been used to help trains up the long grades from Chama to the south or Antonito to the north. The depot is still standing and there is a water tank that during the summer months is used by the excursion trains of the Cumbres and Toltec Scenic Railway.

Cumbres Pass is crossed by Colorado Highway 17 from Antonito. The road trip up the Conejos River Canyon, over La Manga Pass (10,230 feet), then to Cumbres Pass and on to Chama New Mexico is an enjoyable drive. During the summer months, with good timing, it offers a number of places where the excursion trains can be viewed. In winter months, deep snow is the rule. One year, on opening day at the end of May when Jim Ozment and I rode the train, the snow at Cumbres was still higher than the roofs of the train cars.






DEL RIO

I have found no reference to Del Rio in the historical literature of Colorado. Fortunately, the Post Office Department Geographic site Location Report provides a location for the post office.

From Capulin, drive west on Colorado Highway 15 to where that road turns north. Continue straight ahead, now on Conejos County Road X. After a mile and a half this road curves to the northwest. The turn is at Centro and is marked by a large junkyard. In part this road is also designated as Road 6 and soon becomes Forest Service Road 255. Go seven miles to Conejos County Road BB. Turn right on that road and descend down towards the Alamosa River.

In 1999, on the west side of the road and before reaching the river, there was what appeared to be an abandoned motel. There were several buildings including one that had doorways to several side-by-side rooms. There was also a single building on the east side of the road.

From Del Rio, return to Forest Service Road 255 and continue west towards Terrace and Cockrell in Conejos County and Jasper in Rio Grande County.



EPHRAIM Ephraim was one of the Mormon settlements in the San Luis Valley. It was founded in 1881. Like its neighbor Manassa, it was named for a son of the Biblical Joseph. The chosen location was not a good one; at times becoming swampy and by 1888 the settlers had moved two miles further north to establish Sanford. Some historians have assumed that Ephraim and Sanford were the same but that is definitely not the case.

The residents of Ephraim were engaged in agriculture. They constructed an irrigation system but poor drainage contributed to the swampy conditions and forced the move to the new location at Sanford.

From Colorado Highway 142 on the east edge of Manassa, drive north on Conejos County Road 18 (First Street) three and one-half miles to Road T. Turn east for one mile to Road 19. Ephraim was located in the southeast quadrant of the intersection. There does not appear to be any early structures remaining, but there is modern activity and a few buildings.

ESPINOSA

Espinosa was one of the early settlements along the Conejos River. It was a fortified plaza built by Don Incarnacion de Espinosa and was originally called Los Fuerticitos de Incarnacion Espinosa - "The little fort of Incarnacion Espinosa." The name was later shortened to Espinosa.


Supposedly the name Espinosa translates as, "thorny." For an unknown reason the name of this community is most often spelled Espinosa. However, the known postmarks use the spelling Ezpinoza.

Espinosa was typical of the small Spanish-American communities in the San Luis Valley. The residents were either engaged in farming or raising sheep.

As late as the 1940's, Espinosa was a viable community but gradually the population moved to more active towns and Espinosa faded into history.

The 1965 General Highway Map of Conejos County still identified Espinosa on Conejos County Road 17 three miles south of Colorado Highway 142, the road that connects Manassa to US Highway 285. There is a short side road to the east. In 1999 all I could find was one old abandoned building but there was evidence for the previous existence of other buildings along the side road and on both sides of Road 17.




FREEDOM

LA JARA

In 1880 the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad built south from Alamosa on the way to Chama, New Mexico and from there to Durango in southwestern Colorado. A water tank was placed where the railroad crossed La Jara Creek. This location was about six miles east of the site of "Old Lajara."

There was also a railroad depot and a small community began to develop. At first the community was called Llano Blanco (White Plain). For a short time the site was known as El Tanque (The Tank). But in 1884, when a post office opened it took the name of La Jara.

The Post Office Department records refer to the old settlement as Lajara - one word - and to the new settlement as La Jara - two words.

The name La Jara comes from the creek on which it is located. The Spanish name is translated as, "rock rose" which is locally confused with brush, a reference to the willows and the thick brush along the banks of La Jara Creek.

LA JARA – Continued

In contrast to the surrounding towns, non-Mormons settled La Jara. It became a marketing and supply center for the surrounding farms and ranches. A plat for the town was filed in 1887 and it was incorporated in 1910, although one report claims the incorporation was in 1897.

The town is still an active community with a number of agriculture related businesses. Most of the town lies on the east side of US Highway 285. In 1999 the post office was at the northwest corner of Main and Poplar Streets.







LAJARA "Old La Jara"

Old Lajara was established about the same time as its neighbor, Capulin. Although this community lasted for several years and had a post office from 1875 to 1884, it failed to develop. It appears that the development of Capulin overshadowed Lajara. In 1884 the post office was moved to the Newcomb Ranch, a little more than two miles to the northeast. The Post Office Department Records of Postmaster Appointments show that Daniel Newcomb was twice the postmaster at Lajara. It is logical to assume that his involvement had something to do with the move of the post office in 1884 to his Lajara Creamery Ranch.

To visit the site of Old Lajara, drive east two and one-half miles from Capulin on Colorado Highway 15. Turn south to Conejos County Road W and then turn back to the west. Old Lajara was on the north side of Road W but there are no remaining structures on the site.

In 1880 the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad built south from Alamosa on the way to Chama, New Mexico and then on to Durango, Colorado. A water tank was placed at the point where it crossed La Jara Creek. That was the beginning of present day La Jara.

LA SAUSES / LASAUCES

Settlement in this area began in 1863-1864. Antonio Marquez, Jose Rodriguez and Francisco Borrego were among the first to establish farms on the west bank of the Rio Grande River and south of the Conejos River.

When a post office opened in 1882 it was with the name Los Sauses. The Los Sauses Post Office lasted only a few months. "Sauses," is Spanish for willows and is masculine in gender. When a new post office opened in 1890, it was with the name La Sauses. Apparently this was a Post Office Department error - the wrong gender and the singular La instead of the plural Las. However the errors became permanently attached to the settlement and the Lasauses name can be found on modern maps. In 1895 La Sauces fell victim to the Post Office Department campaign to revise and shorten post office names and La Sauses became Lasauses.

This community was agricultural in nature. It did have a store, which in 1999 was still standing but was rapidly deteriorating. It seems probable that this was also the post office.

Beginning in Sanford, at the end of Colorado Highway 136, turn east on what becomes Conejos County Road V. This road eventually becomes Road W and curves north through a group of hills. Eight miles from Sanford you intercept Conejos County Road 27. The first location of the La Sauses Post Office was in the southeast quadrant of this intersection. There is nothing of interest remaining.

Continue east another mile to County Road 28 and turn south. You are now in Lasauses. The second location of the post office (Lasauses) was on the east side of the road.

Lasauses is perhaps the least prosperous appearing of the communities I have visited in Colorado. Along Road 28 there is the abandoned store building and some scattered dwellings. There is a church, in relatively good condition, even if nothing else is. I observed one very odd sight - a chain link fence enclosure with two small children inside.

The La Sauses Cemetery is two miles south of the intersection of Roads W and 28.



LADO

Lado is described as a, "small agricultural settlement on the Rio Conejos, three miles west from the town of Conejos." The location description given in the Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report is not clear and it could be in error. However, if Lado was located in Section 26 then it is likely that it was at or near the location of the Paisaje Post Office (1906 to 1920).

Assuming this is correct, then the Lado/Paisaje site is on Conejos County Road 10.75, a half-mile north of Colorado Highway 17. The intersection of those two roads is two and a half miles west of the intersection of Colorado 17 and US 285, on the southwest edge of Antonito.

Given the proximity of this location to both Antonito and Conejos, it is no surprise that the Lado Post Office lasted for only one year.

Along Road 10.75, which angles to the northwest, are a few small houses, some derelict adobe buildings and a church where Road 10.75 intersects County Road G. From that intersection, turn east on Road G and go a short distance to the site of San Rafael on the north side of Road G.

LOBATOS

In 1902 the name of the Cenicero Post Office was changed to Lobatos. Actually, this also involved a move west of less than a mile. Lobato was the family name of the first postmaster at the new location.

Lobatos was a small agricultural community composed of farmers and sheep ranchers. There was a loose assemblage of residences with a few small businesses. Today only a scattering of residences remain. The proximity to Antonito has moved the commercial activity to that town. The Holy Family Church was built in 1952 and has been occasionally renovated. At one time it had "his" and "hers" outhouses in back.

From US Highway 285 in Antonito, drive east on Eighth Avenue. East of Antonito this becomes Conejos County Road G. It is three and three-tenth miles to County Road 17. Lobatos was in the southeast quadrant of this intersection.

LOS CERRITOS

In 1852 Juan Maria Garcia and Pablita Martinez were the first settlers at the site of Los Cerritos. The Ute Indians forced them to leave. Within a few years Rafael Garcia, Antanacio and Ignatius Trujillo brought their families to the location and remained. Agriculture was the principal occupation of the residents.

The name Los Cerritos refers to the two small, inactive volcanic cones that are south of Manassa and west of the location of Los Cerritos.

Los Cerritos must have been a reasonably sized community as there are two good sized cemeteries on the east and south sides of the eastern hill. Unfortunately the cemeteries are all that remain of Los Cerritos. It is probable that the cemeteries are still in use by the residents of Manassa. The Los Cerritos community was east of the hills, on the level ground along the Conejos River.

The easiest way to visit the site of Los Cerritos is to begin in Manassa. Drive east on Colorado Highway 142 to Conejos County Road 19. Turn south and go a mile and a half. That will bring you almost to the bridge over the Conejos River. The Los Cerritos Cemetery is on the left and the village was on the flats along the river.



LOYTON

Prospecting in the western portion of today's Conejos County began at least as early as 1879. One of the earliest camps was called Conejos Camp. The history of the next few years is confusing. It appears that the name of Conejos Camp was changed to Loyton and later this became Stunner.

It is the location of Conejos Camp/Loyton that is confusing. Various historians have placed it on the headwaters of the Conejos River, or La Jara Creek, or the Alamosa River. There also seems to be a connection to Blainvale.

This is another instance where the Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Reports provide help in straightening out the situation.

While the exact location of Blainvale is somewhat questionable, based on the descriptions from the Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Reports it was on the Alamosa River about three miles west of Jasper-Cornwall, very near where the Alamosa River leaves Rio Grande County and reenters Conejos County. When the Blainvale Post Office closed it was moved further west to a new location and took the name of Loyton. Once again the Site Location Reports refer to a location on the Alamosa River.

The post office operated as Loyton for only six months before the name was changed to Stunner. The Site Location Report for Loyton was altered to refer to Stunner, at the same location.

LOYTON – Continued

From these various reports it is clear that Camp Conejos/Loyton/Stunner were on the Alamosa River and there is no reason to doubt that they were essentially the same place. As best I can determine, that location was on the north side of Stunner Pass where the road from Platoro via the pass joins the road along the Alamosa River. At that location there is visible evidence of past mining activity.

Forest Service Road 250 is the road that begins west of Capulin, follows the Alamosa River through Jasper, climbs over Stunner Pass (10,541 feet), descends to Platoro and then follows the Conejos River to a junction with Colorado Highway 15 west of Antonito. From Summitville, in Rio Grande County, Forest Service Road 380 comes east to a junction with Road 250 at the site of Stunner. There is a Forest Service campground near the intersection.

I can not vouch for the condition of Road 380 or of Road 250 between Jasper and Platoro. I suspect that in summer they are reasonably passable with a four-wheel drive vehicle. The ongoing environmental cleanup at Summitville may have brought some improvement to these roads.

Please refer to the discussion of Stunner for more about this particular post office location.

MANASSA

In 1879 a group of Mormons living at Los Cerritos decided to acquire land to the north of their community. In the summer of 1879 Manassa was laid out and surveyed, "into thirty-two blocks of ten acres each including streets, and each block was divided into four lots of two and one-half acres each." A short time later the west half of the section was surveyed. That made the town of Manassa one mile square. Manassa was incorporated in 1899.

Mormon Elder Lawrence M. Peterson suggested the name Manassa in honor of the eldest son of Joseph of ancient Israel.

Manassa developed as an agricultural community with only minor amounts of mining and the manufacture of turquoise jewelry. The economy of Manassa is still largely based on agriculture. There is a modest business district providing services and supplies to the town's residents and the surrounding farms and ranches.

Manassa is noted as the birthplace of the famous boxer, Jack Dempsey. There is a small museum devoted to his memory.

Manassa fits the pattern of nearly all of the towns in the San Luis Valley. The most prominent, best maintained, and often the largest building in the community, is the local church.

From Romeo, on US Highway 285, drive east three miles on Colorado Highway 142 to Manassa.







MOGOTE

Mogote (Los Mogotes) was first called San Juan. With a neighboring settlement, Servilleta, it was settled in 1856, soon after the founding of Guadalupe (Conejos).

There are two explanations for the name. The more commonly accepted definition is that it was named for nearby mountain peaks, "Los Mogotes," that resemble sheaves of corn - *mogotes*. The other explanation claims that in the Spanish of New Mexico and Colorado, *mogote* refers to a clump of trees standing isolated in a plain.

Juan Jaramillo, from the Chama Valley of New Mexico was one of the early settlers. The placita at Mogote became a gathering place for traders at a well-traveled crossing of the Conejos River. Sheep raising was an important activity for the early settlers. There was a general store and a church.

In the twentieth century, as interest in the recreational possibilities of the Conejos River Valley and the San Juan Mountainss increased, Mogote became a source of supplies for hunters and fishermen. Supposedly, the first tourist accommodations in Conejos County were built at Mogote, near where Colorado Highway 17 approaches the river crossing. In recent years RV parks have developed in the area.

Mogote is located on Colorado Highway 17, where the highway turns northwest before crossing the Conejos River. There are several older buildings on the east end of the community, the Cottonwood Meadows Cabins and the Dios es Amor Church.

The Post Office Department Site Location Reports provide only a single location for the Mogote Post Office. However, that location does not fit to the existing community of Mogote. The reported location is more than three miles further to the west, on the road along the south side of the Conejos River, just beyond a tiny community known as Canon. I did visit that location, but found nothing worth photographing.

MOGOTE – Continued

Frances Harvey Mead, in *The Canyon...The River...The Villages and the People of Conejos County* lists the postmasters of Mogote and states that the post office was in their homes. That could explain the reported location. If accepted, that claim is a good example, that often moves of the small rural post offices were not reported to the officials in Washington.

MORGAN

There was no organized community named Morgan. It was a rich farming district with its children attending the rural Morgan School until a consolidated school was established in La Jara. It is assumed that Morgan was the name of one of the local landowners.

On May 14, 1901 the post office name was changed from Morgan to Freedom. The post office operated under that name until 1905. But apparently the locals preferred the name Morgan as the USGS Conejos County Topographic Map of 1979 (Sheet 2) labels the location as Morgan.

The location is on Conejos County Road AA, one mile east of Colorado Highway 371. From Colorado Highway 15, drive north three miles to County Road AA and turn east. The location was in the southeast quadrant of the intersection with Road 13. The location is the site of a large modern farm complex.

NEWCOMB

In 1884 the post office at "Old La Jara" was closed and moved five miles to the west-northwest to the Daniel Newcomb Ranch, taking the name of Newcomb. The new location, on the south side of Spring Creek and a half-mile south of the Alamosa River, was locally known as the Newcomb Farm or the La Jara Creamery Ranch. Daniel E. Newcomb was the last postmaster at Old La Jara and the first at Newcomb.

Two months after the move, the La Jara Post office reopened at a different location. The Newcomb Post Office lasted only two years.

NEWCOMB – Continued

To reach the site, drive west from La Jara on Colorado Highway 15 to the intersection with Colorado Highway 371. Turn north. The location was a half-mile north of Colorado 15 and on the east side of Colorado 371. In 1999 there were still some older farm buildings at the location.

ORTIZ

The settlement of Ortiz began when Jose Maria Casias, a Civil War veteran, took a homestead on the western side of the Los Pinos River. Nestor Ortiz joined him in the early 1870's, opened a store and became a wool broker for the surrounding sheep ranchers. Nestor Ortiz was also skilled in the manufacture of filigree silver jewelry.

In 1890 a request was made for a post office to be named for the Los Pinos River. At the time there was a Los Pinos Post Office in La Plata County so another name had to chosen. The post office was to be in the store belonging to the Ortiz family, so the name Ortiz was selected to honor the pioneer family.

Ortiz was an important sheep ranching center. It was a compact community with stores, bars and schools. There were Presbyterian and Baptist missions and a very active Catholic Church dedicated to San Cayentano and Juan Nepomunceno. During prohibition Ortiz had a reputation as a center for bootlegging.

From Antonito drive southwest on US Highway 285 to where US 285 turns south away from Colorado Highway 17. Stay on US 285, but almost immediately turn right on to Conejos County Road 12.5. For the first mile this road goes southwest, then turns due south for three miles where the road again angles to the southwest. Go to the intersection of County Roads 12.5 and B. Turn south into the community of Ortiz. There are a few homes, a few trailers, some collapsing adobes and the Catholic Church which is still well maintained.

This short trip will take you through the community of San Antonio that was mentioned in the discussion of Antonito.



OSIER

Prior to the arrival in 1880 of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad, Osier was a tiny settlement on a toll road that came from the Conejos River Valley and went on to New Mexico. This was a difficult and hence not an important route for travel.

With the arrival of the railroad Osier became a construction camp and continued to exist as railroad facility providing coal and water for the trains. It was also a place of shelter and communications for the train crews and in winter for snow removal operations.

Osier was also a busy location for the shipment of livestock from the surrounding ranges.

The depot and the water tank still stand. The depot now houses a lunch stop for the summer excursion trains of the Cumbres and Toltec Scenic Railway. Osier is also the point where trains originating at either Antonito or Chama meet. Engines are exchanged and passengers can either continue on over the complete run, or switch to the other train for the return to their place of origin.

Osier is located at Mile Post 318.48 (from Denver). It is on a slope above Los Pinos Creek and a short distance before the railroad enters the spectacular Toltec Gorge.

It is possible to drive to Osier from the Antonito side. I have not made that trip and I suspect that it is not the best of roads. It is perhaps best suited to a four-wheel drive vehicle. The easiest and most pleasant way to visit Osier is to take the train from Chama or Antonito. I highly recommend the trip. Although not as popular as the better known Durango and Silverton excursion trains, it is my opinion that the Cumbres and Toltec offers more spectacular views than does the Durango and Silverton. I would also recommend making the full trip in order to fully appreciate the difficulty of operating a railroad in the high mountains and to enjoy all of the spectacular scenery. From either Antonito or Chama, a bus, included in the excursion, will return you to your place of origin.

The Osier Post Office was discontinued in 1928. In the summer of 1999 a Contract Station of Antonito was operated at Osier, but the station did not resume operation in 2000.



CONTRACT STATION (Of Antonito)

For simplicity, the listing of this station is mentioned here. Please refer to Antonito for the complete details.

PAISAJE

Paisaje is one of three post offices that over the course of several years operated in the area west of Conejos and Antonito. The first post office in the area was Lado (1884-1885). Next was San Rafael (1890-1895) and finally, Paisaje (1906-1920).

In spite of the various names the community was, from its founding in 1857, locally known as San Rafael. Why the post office was named Lado is unknown. Lado is a Spanish word, for which one meaning is, "companion." Paisaje is another Spanish word meaning, "landscape." Sometimes it is also translated as, "passage" and in this case might refer to an easy crossing of the Conejos River at the location.

It has been claimed that in 1906 when an application was made for a post office the desired name was San Rafael, repeating the early post office name and the name of the community. This was rejected because of the existence of a San Rafael Post Office in Marin County California. It is a mystery why that reason was not a factor when the San Rafael Post Office was approved in 1890.

The area west of Conejos and Antonito is one of small farms along the Conejos River with larger ranches on the uplands away from the river.

The Lado/San Rafael/Paisaje site is on Conejos County Road 10.75, a half-mile north of Colorado Highway 17. The intersection of those two roads is two and a half miles west of the intersection of Colorado 17 and US 285, on the southwest edge of Antonito.

Along Road 10.75, which angles to the northwest, are a few small houses, some derelict adobe buildings and a church where Road 10.75 intersects County Road G. From that intersection, turn east on Road G and go a short distance to the site of San Rafael on north side of Road G.



It is believed that mining began at Platoro about 1882, but it was not until 1888 that a post office was opened. Both gold and silver were produced at Platoro and it was the combination of the Spanish words for silver (plata) and gold (oro) that created the name Platoro.

Mining at Platoro was an on again off again proposition. The difficult transportation routes and the long winters meant that only the highest grade ores were worth extracting. When those gave out mining ceased until new opportunities arose.

Some new claims were filed in 1901 and 1902. In 1913 a rich deposit of gold ore was discovered on Klondyke Mountain and the Gilmore Mine produced for a couple of years. There was another flurry of activity in 1916.

Over the years there were sporadic operations at the Mammoth Revenue Mine. In 1959 Alfred Hoyle launched the Platoro Project. A new mill was built and the principal effort was to reprocess the tailings pile from the Mammoth Revenue Mine. There may have been some additional work within the mine proper. When I visited Platoro in 1988 it appeared that there was still some mining activity but I believe that has now ceased.

In 1947 the large Platoro Reservoir was built on the Conejos River, a short distance upstream from Platoro. Two years earlier Clint Wileys had built the Skyline Lodge as a hunting and fishing destination for San Luis Valley sportsmen. The development of the reservoir and the improvement of the road from Antonito to Platoro have contributed to Platoro's modest success as a summer community and resort.

To reach Platoro, drive west from Antonito on Colorado Highway 17 to the intersection with Forest Service Road 250. Highway 17 goes south to Cumbres Pass, while Road 250 continues to follow the Conejos River. Road 250 is a gravel road and at times is on the cliffside above the river but it should not be a difficult trip in the summer months.

It should be possible to continue on from Platoro over Stunner Pass to the site of Stunner/Loyton and perhaps even on to Summitville in Rio Grande County.



ROMEO

At first this location was a settlement known as Sunflower and from 1889 to 1892 had a post office under that name. The Denver and Rio Grande Railroad station was also called Sunflower.

On October 30, 1899 the Romero Town Company filed a plat for a town to be named Romero. Zeph Charles Felt was president of the company and owner of the land on which the town was platted.

It is believed that the town was named for an early settler. When a post office opened in 1901 the name was altered to Romeo. This may have been to avoid confusion with other similarly named communities and perhaps with Romero, New Mexico. The depot and siding had been established to serve the surrounding ranches and farms and also the town of Manassa, located three miles to the east of the railroad.

Apparently Romeo was slow to develop and in 1908 the Post Office Department moved to close the Romeo Post Office. That ordered closing was quickly reversed and by 1923 Romeo had grown large enough to be incorporated.

The importance of Romeo has diminished as Antonito and Manassa have grown. Romeo does have a stockyard, potato exchange and vegetable packing sheds. It is still a shipping point for Manassa and the surrounding countryside. However, the bank once located in the two-story Colonial Hotel Building, is gone and only a few businesses on Main Street still cater to the farmers and ranchers.

Romeo is on the east side of US Highway 285, midway between La Jara and Antonito. In 1999 the Romeo Post Office was on the south side of Colorado Highway 142, one block east of US 285. The building was relatively new, apparently built just for the post office.





SAN ANTONIO

In the southern portion of Conejos County there have been two locations and perhaps a third, named San Antonio. One is a community located south of Antonito on the road to Ortiz. The questionable one was west of Antonito in the vicinity of Las Mesitas, on Colorado Highway 17 shortly after the highway crosses to the north side of the Conejos River.

The third location, the one of interest for this discussion, was the predecessor to modern day Antonito.

In late 1880, soon after the arrival of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad, application was made for a post office that was to bear the name San Antonio. The application was granted, but two months later the name was changed to Antonito. The change was made to avoid confusion with a similarly named settlement to the south of Antonito. That San Antonio still exists as a loose community of residences and small farms.

It is doubtful that the other San Antonio, the one near Las Mesitas, was ever an organized community. It was the location for a modest sized, adobe church which I believe was named San Antonio. In 1999 only the walls of the church were still standing.

SAN RAFAEL

San Rafael was settled in the mid-1850's, about the same time as Guadalupe (Conejos). Over the course of years it came to be also known as Paisaje, a name that frequently appears on maps, including the USGS Conejos County Topographic Map of 1979 (Sheet 2).

As San Rafael it was one of the larger villages in the area and as late as 1939 had its own general store. There is an attractive, but simple church that is dedicated to San Rafael and San Pedro. The current building, built in 1929, replaces an earlier one and in 1999 it seemed to be still in use.

The initial post office to serve this community was named Lado. It lasted only one year (1884-1885). In 1890 a new post office was opened and took the name of San Rafael. That one lasted five years before it too was closed. In 1906, a third post office, Paisaje, opened to serve the community.

It has been claimed that in 1906 when an application was made for a new post office the desired name was San Rafael, repeating the early post office name and the name of the community. This was rejected because of the existence of a San Rafael Post Office in Marin County, California. It is a mystery why that reason was not a factor when the San Rafael Post Office was approved in 1890.

The area west of Conejos and Antonito is one of small farms along the Conejos River with larger ranches on the uplands away from the river.

The Lado/San Rafael/Paisaje site is on Conejos County Road 10.75, a half-mile north of Colorado Highway 17. The intersection of those two roads is two and a half miles west of the intersection of Colorado 17 and US 285, on the southwest edge of Antonito.

Along Road 10.75, which angles to the northwest, are a few small houses, some derelict adobe buildings and a church where Road 10.75 intersects County Road G. From that intersection, turn east on Road G and go a short distance. San Rafael was to the north of Road G. This mile long stretch of road comprises the combined settlement of Lado-San Rafael-Paisaje.

SANFORD

By the late 1880's, the site of Ephraim had become waterlogged from irrigation and the Mormon elders made a decision to move about three miles north to an elevated mesa. The settlers at Ephraim and also those at Richfield (near La Jara) were encouraged by the church to move to the new location. By 1888 the migration of people, houses, barns, the cooperative store and the school from Ephraim was complete and the new community was in full operation.

The post office at Ephraim was moved, taking the name of Sanford, for Silas Sanford Smith, the first president of the San Luis Stake (Mormon Church). The town of Sanford was incorporated in 1907.

Sanford was, and still is, an agricultural community serving the surrounding farms and ranches. It consists of scattered homes of all qualities and a big, fancy, modern Mormon Church.

Starting on US Highway 285, just south of La Jara, drive east three miles on Colorado Highway 136 and turn south into Sanford.



STUNNER

The small mining settlement of Stunner began first as Conejos Camp, became Loyton and finally took the name of Stunner.

Please refer to the discussion of Loyton for a recap of the early history of this location and directions to the site.

Stunner, located near the headwaters of the Alamosa River was a small mining camp. It was not a rich one. A lack of rich ores, the difficulty of transportation and the long winters all combined to make the life of Stunner rather brief. Both gold and silver were produced from the mines.

Activity at Stunner was sufficient to keep the post office in operation for ten years. In 1913 the Stunner Post Office was reopened but was closed again after only six months of operation.

In May 1988 Jim Ozment and I visited the site of Stunner. There was visible evidence of the mining activity.

STUNNER – Continued

Ken Jessen, writing in 2001 (*Ghost Towns Colorado Style - Volume Three - Southern Region*) reports the following:

An old photograph of Stunner reveals that it was never a large town, with one false front store and five cabins.

The site today is difficult to find and it sits next to a U. S. Forest Service campground. The dead-end road to the campground passes through the site. There is one cabin on the hillside overlooking the town site that may be of later vintage.



SUNFLOWER

Sunflower was established midway between La Jara and Antonito as a station of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad. The station was for the convenience of the surrounding farms and the community of Manassa, three miles to the east. The post office was in the nearby ranch house of postmaster William Greene.

The Sunflower Post Office lasted only three years. On October 30, 1899, on behalf of the Romero Town Company, Zeph Charles Felt, owner of considerable farmland, filed a plat for the town of Romero. When a post office opened in 1901 it was under the altered name of Romeo.

SUNFLOWER – Continued

From the description given in the Post Office Department Geographic Site Location Report the Sunflower Post Office was on the west side of present day Romeo and west of the railroad, near US Highway 385.

TERRACE

I have found no reference in the historical literature of Colorado to a settlement named Terrace. Once again I am relying on the location provided to the Post Office Department.

The reported location plots along Forest Service Road 255, east of the dam that contains the Terrace Reservoir. Construction on the Terrace Reservoir began in 1904, but was halted when money ran out. The Terrace Irrigation Company was formed in 1910 and the reservoir was completed in 1911. From that information it appears that the name Terrace was in use prior to the construction of the reservoir and is likely a physical description applicable to the location of the post office.

After returning from Del Rio to Forest Service Road 255, continue west a mile and a half, crossing to the north side of the Alamosa River. Beyond the bridge there is a fairly large level area along the river. There are several well-kept, occupied buildings in the area, including the Last Dollar Ranch.

VADNER

Vadner has been described as a, "small ranch post office on Cat Creek." The location provided in the Post Office Department Geographic Site Location Reports supports that description. The countryside surrounding the location is rangeland, best suited for livestock; however there is some irrigation in the area.

It has been reported that the name of the post office was the name of one of the local ranches. Vadner is located immediately south of the Conejos-Rio Grande County line. To visit the site, drive south from Monte Vista on Colorado Highway 368 to the county line. Turn west on the road along the county line (Rio Grande Road 12S/Conejos Road FF). Go four miles to Colorado Highway 15, crossing it and going another mile. Vadner was located south of the road, just before the road angles to the southwest.

There are no remaining buildings but the ground appears to have been scraped. I did find a couple of rusty cans and a piece of rusty window screen, which could point to the former existence of buildings at the site.
