

HUERFANO COUNTY

Huerfano County was one of the original counties established by the Territorial Legislature in 1861. At that time the county included most of Colorado Territory south of the Arkansas River. In less than ten years the county was reduced to its present boundaries. The "lost" territory became all or part of Baca, Bent, Las Animas, Otero, Prowers and Pueblo Counties.

The county name, Huerfano, is Spanish for "orphan." The name was first attached to the small isolated butte east of Walsenburg, then to the river that drains the county.

In its modern configuration Custer and Pueblo Counties border Huerfano County on the north. Las Animas County forms the eastern and a large portion of the southern border. Costilla County completes the southern boundary and Alamosa and Saguache Counties form the western boundary of Huerfano County.

The boundaries of the county are for the most part irregular following drainage divides. Only the boundary with Pueblo County is a series of straight lines.

The initial county seat was at Autobees, a trading post settlement on the Huerfano River where it joins the Arkansas River. Prior to 1868 the county seat was moved to Hermosillo. Both of these places are now in Pueblo County. Between 1868 and 1870 the county seat was at Badito on the upper Huerfano River. It remained there until about 1876 when the county seat was moved for one last time, to Walsenburg.

In size, Huerfano County can be considered average for Colorado. The maximum width east to west is about fifty-six miles. From north to south the maximum width is fifty-four miles. However, with the highly irregular shape of the county these dimensions are almost meaningless in describing the size of the county.

Topographically Huerfano County is a mixture of high mountains and rolling prairie. The western border is on the crest of the Sangre de Cristo Mountains. The southern end of the Wet Mountains projects into the county and is separated from the Sangre de Cristo Range by the Huerfano River. South of Walsenburg the volcanic Spanish Peaks dominate the skyline as outliers from the mountain range to their west.

East of Interstate 25 the country is rolling prairie with scattered small buttes and mesas. The most notable are Huerfano Butte and the Rattlesnake Buttes.


Huerfano County lies entirely within a single drainage basin. The principal stream is the Huerfano River, which originates in the Sangre de Cristo Mountains, curves through the county and exits north into Pueblo County. Its principal tributaries are the Cucharas River and Santa Clara Creek. There are numerous small streams that contribute to the major streams but most are intermittent as would be expected in a semi-arid climate.

Over the years the economy of Huerfano County has changed. Initially agriculture was the primary focus – ranching and some farming along the major streams.


In the late nineteenth century the focus shifted to coal mining. This was manifested in the large number of small post offices that sprang up at the coal mines in the central part of the county. However, not long into the twentieth century most of those mines were no longer producing and their post offices disappeared.

Following that phase the economy again shifted focus, back to ranching. Ranching has changed; no longer is it only cattle and sheep. To those herds have been added bison and elk.

In more recent years tourism and recreational activities have become important but ranching is still a significant portion of the Huerfano County economy.

Since the early days of the trappers and exploration, Huerfano County has been on the primary routes of travel in what is now southern Colorado. The mountain passes – La Veta, Mosca and Music – first used by the Indians, were primary routes between the plains and the San Luis Valley. North-south travel was along the eastern face of the mountains. The Huerfano River Valley was another principal travel route. As settlement progressed these routes continued to be important.

When the Denver and Rio Grande and the Colorado and Southern Railroads penetrated the area they too followed the earlier routes of travel. With a change from narrow gauge to standard gauge the route of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad was altered. In addition to its main line that passed through Walsenburg, then La Veta and first over Veta Pass, then over La Veta Pass, there was an extensive network of spurs and branch lines that served the coal mines during their period of activity. The principal branch railroad was the Loma Branch from Walsenburg up the Huerfano Valley to Alamo. Only the main line of the railroad remains in operation.

In the present century, Interstate 25 parallels the mountain front, west of the route of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad. Prior to the construction of I-25, this was the route of US Highways 85-87, which are now largely a part of I-25. Colorado Highway 69 follows the Huerfano River and its tributary Muddy Creek, north from Walsenburg into Custer County. At Walsenburg, US Highway 160 diverges from Interstate 25 and goes west to cross North La Veta Pass into the San Luis Valley. Colorado Highway 10, originating at Walsenburg, goes northeast, eventually to La Junta on the Arkansas River.

There is an extensive network of county roads that supplement the federal and state highways. However, many of these secondary roads either wander across the countryside or dead end at some point so a good map is essential in prowling the back-country.

It is hard to believe the change in the road from Walsenburg up the Huerfano Valley; what is today Colorado Highway 69. I first came through there in 1951. At that time it was a dirt road, barely passable in many places, with narrow, questionable bridges. We were lucky to make 30 miles per hour at best. Even in the early 1970's it was still a dirt road. Now there is a good paved road with a speed limit of 65 miles per hour. The scenery is still well worth the trip from Walsenburg to Westcliffe.

ALAMO

Alamo was at the end of the Loma Branch of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad from Walsenburg. That branch line served a string of coal mines and post offices roughly parallel to the route of the modern Colorado Highway 69. The railroad reached Alamo in 1923. On the ground, this location was a move about a mile to the northwest of the original site of Alamo.

Alamo was named for the Alamo Coal Company that operated a mine at the location. Alamo is the Spanish word for cottonwood tree, but it seems likely that the reference was to the historical site in Texas.

Alamo was the most remote of the coal camps along the Loma Branch and as with the others, it was developed as a company town to provide services and homes for the miners.

I assume that prior to seeking the site of Alamo you have been visiting the other coal mines and post offices along Colorado Highway 69 and the former Loma Branch. Refer to the directions to the post office at Tioga and then continue southwest on Huerfano County Road 524. This road intersects Road 521 and quickly thereafter turns to the west. Not quite a mile after the turn you find a modern house set in among the remnants of the walls of a large building. A little further and there is a row of foundations that mark the residential portion of Alamo. The Alamo Mine and the old railroad grade are beyond the buildings and on the south side of Dog Creek Arroyo.

The 1924 Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report has a note that the post office name was to be changed to Butte Valley effective October 25, 1924. There is no further comment that this change was rescinded and the Alamo Post Office continued in operation until October 1, 1938 when it did change to Butte Valley.



APACHE (I)

Apache is but one of several post offices in Huerfano County whose history and location(s) are confusing and difficult to interpret.

From the Post Office Department records and from other historical references it is possible that Apache was first established where the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad crossed the Huerfano River. This was in early 1878, but is several months before the Huerfano Post Office at the same location was moved to Undercliffe in Pueblo County. The unresolved question is whether the move of the Huerfano Post Office occurred earlier than reported or was it simply inoperative during the period of overlap?

APACHE (I) – Continued

A Post Office Department Geographic Site Location Report dated November 29, 1879 indicates the Apache Post Office had been moved from the location on Huerfano Creek to a location on Apache Creek. From this it seems certain that the Apache Post Office did operate at the former site of the Huerfano Post Office. This would then explain why, when the Huerfano Post Office reopened November 10, 1882, the records state it was, "moved from Apache."

There are reports that the location on the Huerfano River was a small community with a railroad station. It is most likely that the later location was only a ranch post office on Apache Creek.

To go to the early (1878) location, exit from Interstate 25 at Exit 64 and drive east on Huerfano County Road 110 to the railroad. Road 110 turns north along the railroad but there is a crossing of the railroad at the turn. Unfortunately when Jim Ozment and I visited the location in 1999 there was a locked gate on the east side of the tracks and we could not go on to the location. We did drive south along the railroad to where we could see the Huerfano River but from that distance we could not identify anything that might remain from Huerfano/Apache/Huerfano.

Access to the 1879 location is also from Exit 64. On the east side of Interstate 25, drive north one mile on the frontage road to Huerfano County Road 110. Turn east and go one and two-tenths miles to County Road 111. Turn north to the Shaffer Ranch, Clark Division. This is a large, active ranch on the south side of Apache Creek. I believe that from 1879 to 1882 the Apache Post Office was in this area.

APACHE (II)

In 1894 a new post office with the name of Apache was opened in Huerfano County. This office was also on Apache Creek from which it took its name. However, it was more than three miles further west than the original Apache Post Office of the late 1870's.

It appears that this version of Apache was a ranch post office serving the surrounding countryside. It did continue to operate for thirty years so it obviously met a need in this portion of Huerfano County.

APACHE (II) - Continued

Begin at Exit 67 from Interstate 25. Some maps label this intersection as "Apache City," but that is a gross exaggeration as there is nothing there. From I-25 drive west on Huerfano County Road 660. Follow that road for two and eight-tenths miles to a large, active ranch on the north side of Apache Creek. That is the location of the post office as stated in the Geographical Site Location Report for Apache (II).



BADITO

This place began as a trading post on the trail to the San Luis Valley. The initial name was Little Orphan, likely a translation from Spanish of the name of the river on which it was situated – The Huerfano River. Four months after the post office opened the name was changed from Little Orphan to Badito. This is a variation on a Spanish word meaning, "little ford."


BADITO – Continued

Badito developed into a modest settlement based on agriculture, mostly raising livestock. Badito also supported a tavern and a blacksmith shop. One reference states that there were 100 residents in the immediate area [see the annotation below to the June 5, 1865 Geographic Site Location Report].

A note attached to the Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report seems to say that Little Orphan and Badito may not have been at the same location. If that is true, then this was a move of the post office, not a simple name change.

From Walsenburg, take Colorado Highway 69 northeast and go about 15 miles to the intersection with Huerfano County Road 520, which goes to the west. The site is easy to identify. It is on the east side of Highway 69 and the Huerfano River. In 1999 there was a historical marker that identified a ruined building on the north side of the side road as the location of the post office and store. There was another, larger building on the south side of the road that was originally a ranch house and was later converted to a stable.

BIRMINGHAM

Birmingham is an oddity in Huerfano County as it came into existence as a gold mining camp. The location was on land owned by Heber Turner and was named for Birmingham England, perhaps the hometown of Mr. Turner.

The community was mostly a tent community with an estimated peak population of 400. The gold soon played out and the site was largely abandoned; however the post office survived until 1894. So there must have been some remnant activity at the site.

Birmingham was located on the upper reaches of Williams Creek and while in operation may have served ranchers in the area.

Jim Ozment and I departed from Colorado Highway 69, a mile east of Gardner, onto Huerfano County Road 630 (National Forest Access, Williams Creek Road). At three and a half miles from Highway 69 we continued on the Williams Creek Road (Road 631). We soon encountered an open gate but there was a chain with an open padlock. We became uncertain about the advisability of going forward into private property and perhaps returning to a locked gate. Therefore we aborted the mission without reaching the site of Birmingham.

From the reports of others, it is likely that little remains at Birmingham other than a few posts and perhaps some evidence of the early mining.

BRADFORD

Bradford, on the road from Walsenburg to Westcliffe, was the northernmost of the post offices in the western portion of Huerfano County.

BRADFORD – Continued

I have not found any reference to this place in any of the Colorado histories that I have read. From the location near the upper end of Muddy Creek I assume that it was a ranch post office that once served a small number of patrons in this remote portion of the county.

Please refer to the directions to Dickson that are given below. From the location of Dickson continue north on Colorado Highway 69. From the entrance to Forest Access Road 559 at Dickson it is three and eight-tenths miles north to the location of Bradford.

Bradford was on the east side of Muddy Creek and in the area just south of what is now the entrance to the Wolf Springs Ranch. The 60,000-acre ranch is (1999) owned by a man from Minnesota who made millions in the cosmetic business. [It takes a lot of lipstick to buy 60,000 acres.] It appears that he now raises bison and elk, not cattle. The entrance to the ranch is through a massive log gateway in the style popular with such landowners.

Even though Bradford is shown on the 1975 USGS Huerfano County Topographic Map (Sheet 1) there is nothing remaining along the road.

BUTTE VALLEY (I)

About 1862 a group of ten Frenchmen settled on the Huerfano River near Huerfano Butte. In the group were Antonio Labrie, French Pete, Norbert Bernard, Leander Bernard, Leon Constantine and Luis Joseph Clothier. John (or Tom) Brown also joined the group.

They named their community Butte Valley for the nearby butte and the valley in which they had located.

During the Civil War, soldiers pursuing the notorious Reynolds Gang came to Butte Valley. Suspecting the residents had aided the escape of the gang the settlers were arrested and taken to Denver. The Frenchmen never returned to the Huerfano but Tom (or John) Brown eventually did, living there until 1876.

In spite of that account, it has been reported that in 1867-1868 Antoine Labrie was operating the stage station at Butte Valley.

This early Butte Valley was an agricultural and ranching settlement and a stage station on the line from Pueblo south to Trinidad.

BUTTE VALLEY (I) – Continued

Begin at Exit 59 from Interstate 25 and drive east three and two-tenths miles on Huerfano County Road 103 to Road 104 and turn north for less than a mile. There is a large ranch on the south side of the Huerfano River. The ranch is a mixture of old and new buildings and I believe it is the likely location of the 1869-1878 Butte Valley Post Office.

BUTTE VALLEY (II)

The original Butte Valley, located on the Huerfano River near Huerfano Butte, was discontinued in 1878. The second Butte Valley Post Office came into existence in 1938 when the Alamo Post Office was moved about a mile northeast to the Butte Valley Mine. This location is about ten miles from the 1878 site and was on Dog Springs Arroyo, a tributary to the Huerfano River.

I have found no reference to this place in any of the Colorado historical literature that I have read. The Post Office Department records confirm its existence and provide a location.

In May 1999 Jim Ozment and I explored this portion of Huerfano County. From the location of Tioga we drove south towards the site of Alamo. At the intersection with Road 524.1 there is, to the west, what at the time I described as a track. This slowly disappeared and we came to a ravine that we could not cross. At that point we turned north up a hill to a small shack, then on to a fence line that we followed back east passing the foundations and cellar pits of several small houses. On the other side of the fence there was the remnant of a large house. It seems logical that this was the site of Butte Valley (II).

However, there was no road. We drove across a field with scattered brush, which likely we should not have been doing without someone's permission.

CAMP SHUMWAY

Camp Shumway was located only a short distance from the mining camp of Gordon. This mining camp began operations as McGuire but in 1911 the post office name was changed to Camp Shumway.

During the time that this place was known as McGuire, the railroad station serving the mine was called Shumway Station. It is possible that Shumway was the name of a railroad official or employee and that a change in ownership of the mine prompted a change in the post office name.

There is no evidence that there was any organized community at the location or that it was more than a small company town providing residences and limited services to the miners there employed.

Camp Shumway (McGuire) was the fifth in the series of coal camps on the Loma Branch of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad branch from Walsenburg.

Follow the directions given below to reach the site of Gordon. Then continue on along Huerfano County Road 525 a few hundred yards to the location. In 1999 there were mine dumps, several foundations and one still standing small building. Road 525 ended at this point.

There is no document for Capps in the file of Post Office Department Geographic Site Location Reports. However, Capps was the new name given to the Scissors Post Office in 1894 and Amelia Capps continued as postmaster after the change in name. Therefore it is safe to assume that they were at the same location.

Capps, like its predecessor. was a ranch post office. There is no evidence for coal mining in the vicinity. Obviously the post office took the family name of its postmaster, Amelia Capps.



CLOVER

Ned and Matilda Willburn lived in the Turkey Creek area and for many years ran a sawmill. The Wilburns opened a store and made application for a post office to be named Clover. Matilda Willburn was the first postmaster.

The Clover Post Office existed at two locations. In 1999 Jim Ozment and I went to the area to visit the sites. From Farisita we drove north on Huerfano County Road 620 to the Valdez (or Maes) Cemetery. From there we continued to the second fork in the road and there kept to the right. We went another three miles north to where we could look to the east towards the original site of Clover. Nothing was visible from the road and there was no vehicle access in that direction. From that point we continued north a quarter-mile and then turned west on Huerfano County Road 625, going west to Road 627 where we turned south.

One and two-tenths miles from the turn south we found a church and several buildings on a small ridge. This location is on the east side of the Turkey Creek Valley and is in agreement with the 1920 site of Clover. To return to Highway 69 we continued south rejoining Road 620 near the previously mentioned cemetery.



CONSOLIDATED

The only reference to Consolidated that I have found is in the *Rogers File* in the Colorado Historical Association archives. That entry states that Consolidated was, "on a branch of the Colorado & Southern Railroad from Walsenburg northwest (Walsenburg-Alamo branch)." That would be the Loma Branch.

From that brief note I can conclude that Consolidated was at one of the many coal mines along the Loma Branch. But I have no information which one.

The establishment of the Consolidated Post Office was rescinded and there is no Geographical Site Location Report on file. Thus, it is also logical to state that this post office was never in operation.

CUCHARA

This place was established in 1906 as a summer resort on the Cuchara River. In 1915 a post office was opened there as Cuchara Camps, an obvious reference to the settlement's purpose and the location on the Cuchara River.

In 1957 the Cuchara Camps Post Office name was changed to Cuchara. The post office continued to operate as a Summer Post Office and a Rural Station of La Veta until it was finally closed because the store/resort owner no longer cared to operate the post office.

The word cuchara is Spanish meaning, "spoon" and is a reference to the shape of the river valley.

Cuchara is ten and one-half miles south of La Veta on the east side of Colorado Highway 12, the road to Cucharas Pass. The Cuchara Country Store is still in operation during the tourist season.



CUCHARA CAMPS

Cuchara Camps was a resort established in 1906 on the west side of the Cuchara River. It consisted of a small settlement with a store, restaurant, camp sites and cabins for guests.

In 1957 the name was shortened to simply Cuchara. It may be that the emphasis of the resort had shifted from catering to tourists to serving mostly permanent or semi-permanent residents.

For much of its existence, Cuchara Camps was a summer-only post office, operating from May 1 to September 30.

From La Veta drive ten and one-half miles south on Colorado Highway 12. The resort complex and the Cuchara Country Store are still in operation on the east side of the highway.



CUCHARAS

This settlement began as early as 1870. Initially it was little more than a way stop on the road from Pueblo to Trinidad. However, in 1874 the anticipated construction of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad through the area resulted in the platting of a town by the Southern Colorado Improvement Company. Initially the town and post office name was spelled Cacharas. In 1872 the spelling was changed to Cucharas.

The community name was derived from the Cucharas River on which it was located.


In January 1876 the Denver and Rio Grande began laying track south from Pueblo and reached Cucharas on February 22, 1876. The railroad continued south but when it lost the race to build over Raton Pass into New Mexico southward progress ended. This eventually became known as the El Moro Branch.

CUCHARAS – Continued

The railroad switched its focus from New Mexico to the new mining district in the San Juan Mountains and began construction of a rail line westward to cross the Sangre de Cristo Mountains and enter the San Luis Valley. Cucharas became the junction point for the rail lines and for many years challenged Walsenburg to be the rail center for this part of Colorado.

In 1911 a direct line was built from Pueblo to Walsenburg and the line through Cucharas gradually deteriorated. The track was removed in 1936.

From Exit 50 of Interstate 25, drive four and one-half miles east on Colorado Highway 10. There are several old, abandoned buildings in the area and one active ranch. These are visible from Highway 10.






DELCARBON

Delcarbon was the seventh in the series of coal camp post offices northwest of Walsenburg along what is today a straight line stretch of Colorado Highway 69. This was the route of the Loma Branch of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad. Calumet was the sixth in the series but it did not have a post office.

Turner was the name originally requested in early 1915 for the post office but that was not accepted. The reason is likely that during 1915 the mine, owned by a Mr. Turner, was purchased by the Calumet Fuel Company of Salt Lake City, Utah and the name of the property was changed to Delcarbon – Spanish for "of the coal."

Delcarbon was a reasonably large operation and company town. Its post office lasted longer than any of the other coal camps in the area.

After visiting the locations of Gordon and Camp Shumway, return to Colorado Highway 69 and continue northwest about a mile and a half.

Delcarbon was on the west side of the highway as the road descends into the Huerfano River Valley. Mine dumps are visible from the road and there are a number of foundations scattered on the hillside.



DICKSON

Dickson was a ranch post office located on Muddy Creek near where Bruff Creek joins the larger stream. It was in an area principally given over to stock raising with some agricultural land along the stream.

The source of the name has not been recorded.

Measuring the distance from the intersection of Colorado Highway 69 and Huerfano County Road 634 west of Gardner, it is seven and two-tenths miles to Forest Service Road 559; the road west towards Medano Pass. Dickson was to the west of Highway 69 and on the east side of Muddy Creek. From the road I was unable to see anything that might be ruins left from Dickson.

FARISITA

The initial post office at this location, established in 1878, was named Huerfano Canon. In 1890 the post office name was changed to Talpa. That post office closed in 1912. In 1923 a new post office, Farisita, opened at the location on the Huerfano River about six miles southeast of Gardner.

It has been frequently reported the Talpa Post Office name was changed to Farisita to avoid potential conflicts with Talpa, New Mexico. However, the Farisita Post Office did not open until eleven years after closure of the Talpa Post Office.

Nearly all historical accounts of Farisita refer to the postmaster as A. (Asperidon) S. Faris. However, the Post Office Department Records of Postmaster Appointments show that the postmaster from 1923 to 1931 was Mrs. Louise Faris, not A. S. Faris.

The historical accounts do agree that the post office was named for their popular daughter Jeanette, called Farisita ("little Faris Girl") by the Spanish-speaking residents. In 1931 Jeanette Faris became the postmaster.

Farisita is in an area of cattle and sheep ranches. Other than hay and some grain there is little other agriculture. There was a store and perhaps some other small businesses related to ranching and agriculture but the community was never very large and by 1990 it consisted of only a few homes along Colorado Highway 69. The post office was discontinued, likely because the store closed and no one was interested in assuming the duties of postmaster. Gardner, six miles to the northwest, was still an active community and could take responsibility for postal service for the remaining residents of Farisita.

Farr was a railroad post office on the Denver & Rio Grande Railroad south of Walsenburg. Coal was its reason for existence. It was named for Jeff Farr, a sheriff of Huerfano County who was also active in promoting coal mining in the area. It is doubtful that there was ever more than the mines, a company store and housing for the miners at Farr.

Take the Walsenburg Exit from Interstate 25 into Walsenburg. Drive through the town on US Highway 160 to the western edge. Go to Huerfano County Road 340 and then turn south. This is the road to the Boy Scout Ranch (1999). One and three-tenths mile from US 160 there is a fairly sharp turn to the west. At that point there are a number of foundations and building remains, which stretch for about a half-mile along the road. Beyond this point the road was blocked and it was necessary to return to Walsenburg in order to continue to some of the other coal camps and sites in this portion of the county.



GARDNER

The original post office at this location was named Huerfano Canyon, not to be confused with Huerfano Canon, which was at the present day site of Farisita, six miles to the southeast. After only a few months of operation the name of the post office was changed to Gardner.


Historical accounts of Gardner agree that the town and post office were named for Herbert Gardner, the son of Henry J. Gardner, former governor of Massachusetts. The reports claim that Herbert began ranching in the Huerfano Valley in 1872. However, since the post office name change took place in December 1871, Mr. Gardner must have been there in 1871 or earlier.

Gardner was a stopping place on the stage line between Pueblo and Santa Fe. This stage line ran south to Walsenburg and then up the Huerfano River to Gardner where it turned west to cross the Sangre de Cristo Mountains via Mosca Pass and on into the San Luis Valley. With the completion of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad over the mountains to Alamosa, traffic on the road through Gardner was greatly diminished.

Gardner did continue, providing services to the residual travelers and becoming a supply center for the surrounding ranches. In recent years the community provides limited services to hunters, fishermen and other visitors to the upper portion of the Huerfano Valley.

Gardner is located on Colorado Highway 69 northwest of Walsenburg, where the road west to Red Wing begins. It is still a modest sized active community.





GORDON

Gordon was the site of the Gordon Mine Number 19, owned and operated by The Gordon Coal Company. A man named Gordon opened the mine and both the mine and the town adopted his name.

Reportedly, John Jones filed a town plat for Gordon on May 29, 1908; however, it was many years before Gordon gained its own post office. Until 1924 the residents of Gordon utilized the post office at the next door Camp Shumway. In 1924 the Camp Shumway Post Office was moved to Gordon and renamed Gordon.

Gordon is the fourth in the series of coal camp post offices along the west side of Colorado Highway 69. From the site of Maitland, continue north on Colorado 69 to Huerfano County Road 521. Turn west on that road a short distance to Road 525. Turn north and you will be at the site of Gordon and a short distance further at the site of Camp Shumway.

Gordon is marked by mine dumps and a number of foundations and collapsed buildings.

An alternative route is to leave Colorado 69 at Maitland and follow Huerfano 525 through Maitland, on to Gordon, and then to Camp Shumway. Much of the road will be on the grade of the Loma Branch of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad that served these coal camps.

HEZRON

Hezron was a coal mining camp about seven miles south of Walsenburg. There was a Hezron Station on the railroad, but the town was located to the west, above the mine and about a mile from the base of the foothills.

For many years this site was not accessible but recent attempts to develop the area have opened some roads into the area, therefore an up-to-date map is highly recommended if you plan to tour this portion of Huerfano County.

Follow the directions that are given below to Ideal and then on to Mayne. Mayne is at the end of Hoofprint Court, which branches from Sunrise Road. From there, continue south to the intersection of Trailsend Drive and Rodeo Drive. From there I am not quite sure where I went. I went two-tenths mile further to Leather Drive and then went four-tenths mile on that road before turning around and going back to the intersection. I then continued east on Leather Drive one mile. That did bring me to a scattered group of mine dumps that I believe were the Hezron Mines.

At this point, not really certain of where I was, I deemed it best to return to Walsenburg and Interstate 25 in order to continue south to Pryor and the post office locations in that area.

HOUCK

The operation of the Houck Post Office is questionable. It was less than four months after its establishment that it was closed.

The Post Office Department Geographic Site Location Report file for Huerfano County does not contain a report for Houck. However, I did find a report - filed under Jefferson County. That location, like the one for Birmingham, is north of Gardner.

To visit the site, go east from Gardner on Colorado Highway 69 to Huerfano County Road 634 and turn north up Sand Arroyo. Six and a half miles from Highway 69 there is a side road to the west, National Forest Road 440, a half-mile down that road there is a windmill and water tank and signs that there may have been a building of some sort. I believe that was the location for this very short-term post office. If it did operate it was no more than a ranch post office.

HUERFANO

This name has been applied to more than one location in Huerfano and Pueblo Counties. To be honest, I am not certain that the information below, from 1862 to 1879, relates to the same location as that subsequent to 1882. Assuming that it does, then in 1862 this place began as a settlement on the crossing of the Huerfano River in present day Huerfano County. It was likely a stage station and it is claimed that a small community did develop.

In 1879 the Huerfano Post Office was moved north to Undercliffe in Pueblo County.

Post Office records indicate that the Apache Post Office was established on May 31, 1878 at the same location as the Huerfano Post Office. It supposedly operated there until November 1879 when it moved to a location on Apache Creek. The overlap of operations of these two post offices is difficult to explain.

HUERFANO – Continued

In 1882 the Apache Post Office was moved to Huerfano from its location on Apache Creek. The 1883 Post Office Department Geographic Site Location Report places Huerfano at a location in Huerfano County, on the Huerfano River and on the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad. This would be on the original grade of the railroad, not the present day route. That post office was closed in 1884.

From 1888 to 1900 there was a post office named Ute at the location of Huerfano. In 1900 the Ute Post Office was re-named Huerfano and continued under that name until it was closed in 1929.

Exit from Interstate 25 at Exit 64 and drive east on Huerfano County Road 110 to the railroad. Road 110 turns north along the west side of the railroad, but there is a crossing of the railroad at the turn. Unfortunately in 1999, when Jim Ozment and I visited the location, there was a locked gate and we could not go on to the location. We did drive south along the railroad to where we could see the Huerfano River but could not identify anything that might remain from Huerfano/Apache/Ute/Huerfano.

HUERFANO CANON

This was the second of two post offices that had almost the same name. The name of this office was the Spanish spelling – canon. The earlier office used the English spelling – canyon. It was also one of three names applied to post offices that were in virtually the same location.

The name is a reference to the location on the Huerfano River and the small canyon that has been carved by the river. The area surrounding this site is almost exclusively grazing land for cattle and sheep.

The post office was in a store operated by the Harmes family. In 1890 the post office name was changed to Talpa. This may also have included a short move to a new location but William L. Harmes remained the postmaster. The Talpa Post Office closed in 1912 and a new post office, Farisita, opened in 1923.

According to the Site Location Reports the location of Huerfano was on Colorado Highway 69, a short distance west of what remains of Farisita.

HUERFANO CANYON

This is the earlier of two post offices with virtually the same name. The name of this office employed the English spelling of canyon. The other office, using the Spanish spelling - canon, was at the location of present day Farisita about six miles to the southeast.

The Huerfano Canyon Post Office lasted less than a year before the name was changed to Gardner. This office would have served local ranchers and also travelers on the road to Westcliffe to the north and the road west to Mosca Pass and the San Luis Valley.

The location provided by the Post Office Geographical Site Location Report is slightly west of present day Gardner, about where the road to Red Wing and Mosca Pass branches from Colorado Highway 69.

IDEAL

Ideal was a railroad post office on the Colorado and Southern Railroad, at the terminus of a short spur from Round Oak. For nearly twenty years it served the Ideal Mine and the surrounding area.

From the site of Round Oak continue south on Ideal Road (Huerfano County Road 330) to mile post five and the entrance to the Silver Spurs Ranch development.

There are several mine dumps and a number of foundations and ruined buildings. The quantity of mine dumps and ruins gives the impression that this was a reasonably large operation. My visit to the site was in 1999 and it is possible that further development of the Silver Spurs Ranch has destroyed many or all of those ruins.

After visiting the site of Ideal I continued on to search for the locations of Mayne and Hezron. It is not easy to describe the route to those locations and the roads are fairly recent and were not named.

LA VETA

Historically the town, today known as La Veta, had its beginnings in 1834 when Colonel John M. Francisco visited the area on a scouting trip. He secured a land grant and with others built an adobe plaza that became variously known as Francisco Plaza, Francisco Ranch and Fort Francisco. The initial post office at the location was called Spanish Peak.

The selected location was at the junction of South Abeyta Creek and the Cucharas River. Title to the land required that the owner occupy, clear, cultivate the land and erect permanent dwellings. The Plaza served as a trading post and refuge for trappers, prospectors and other travelers.

La Veta is Spanish for "the vein." There is some controversy over the reason for the selection of that name. Most historians agree that it is a reference to the igneous dikes that radiate from the nearby volcanic Spanish Peaks. It has been suggested that the name was for veins of a white mineral, yaso (gypsum) found north of the town. That material was used to whitewash the adobe houses. Another possibility is that it referred to veins of coal that are present in the area.

By the mid-1870's the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad was building south and west to cross the Sangre de Cristo Mountains. Prior to the arrival of the railroad, President William Palmer bought most of the land adjacent to the Francisco Plaza and with Alexander Hunt formed the La Veta Town Company.

With the arrival of the railroad the new town grew rapidly with stores, saloons, dance halls and residences. La Veta was established on June 18, 1876 and incorporated in 1886.

La Veta quickly became the supply and trade center for the ranches along the Cucharas River. It was also an important location for railroad shops related to the climb to La Veta Pass and later the new route over Veta Pass.

The modern town of La Veta is an active community that still serves the surrounding countryside but it also provides a supply center for hunters, fishermen, hikers and campers who come to the area during the summer months. It is located on Colorado Highway 12, a short distance south of US Highway 160 and west of Walsenburg.





LARIMER

On December 21, 1906 C. Valentin filed a plat for the town of Larimer. However, the community had been established in the early 1890's by a group of Swedish settlers. The location was on the original route of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad to Cucharas. The location was only a short distance from the double-track line to Walsenburg. Larimer failed to develop and within a few years the station, and its associated settlement of Mustang, became the center of activity in the area and the post office was moved from Larimer to Mustang.

The surrounding area is agricultural but a deficiency in water makes it most suitable for grazing land.

The first attempt that Jim Ozment and I made to visit this location was from the south via Lascar. We were able to go only a short distance beyond Apache Creek before the road disappeared. Two days later we tried again, approaching from the north.

Since we were coming from Walsenburg we left Interstate 25 at Exit 71 and went south on the frontage road along the east side of I-25. This becomes Thacker Road (Road 344) and turns away from the interstate to intersect Pickney Road (Road 343). Turn north on Pickney Road, which soon turns east then wanders back north to intersect Cedarwood Road (Road 342). Go east on Cedarwood Road to the intersection with Clay Mine Road (Road 341) south and Wolfenberger Road (Road 339) north. On Clay Mine Road go south to Road 348 and continue south on that road into Huerfano County where it becomes Huerfano County Road 113. Along the way you will observe portions of the old railroad grade.

The site of Larimer was west of Road 113, adjacent to and a short distance south of the Huerfano-Pueblo County line. Nothing other than the railroad grade remains.



LASCAR

Lascar was located thirteen miles north of Walsenburg on the double-track line of the Colorado and Southern and the Denver and Rio Grande railroads. It is considered to have been a railroad post office and it is likely that there were stock pens for shipping livestock from Lascar.

From the Post Office Department records it appears that Lascar was at or near the site the early Warrantsville Post Office (1876-1877).

The name Lascar has no local significance. The proposed name was Concord Junction but that was rejected because of potential confusion with Concord, California.

One explanation for the name is that the Colorado and Southern agent, H. Burger, had just finished reading a book about Norwegian sailors - "las kars." He suggested the Scandinavian name modified to Lascar. Another explanation is that it is the term for an East Indian sailor or artilleryman, likely also taken from a book someone had read.

Exit from Interstate 25 at Exit 64 and drive east on Huerfano County Road 110 to the railroad and turn north along the railroad. There was a siding at this point and there are two partially collapsed buildings and evidence of other structures along the railroad where the road turns away from the railroad.

From this point "roads" go south to the locations of Huerfano and Ute and north to the locations of Mustang and Larimer. At least that is what the maps say. However, in 1999 the road south was blocked by a locked gate and the road north deteriorated to nothing before we could reach the site of Mustang.




LESTER

Lester was another of the small coal camps on Santa Clara Creek in the foothills of the East Spanish Peak. Coal mining was its only reason for existence.

The question remains as to why there was a need for a post office at Lester as it was less than a half-mile from the larger community of Pryor.

From Pryor, drive southwest on Rouse Road (Huerfano County Road 33) to a fork in the road. In 1999 there was a large frame building at the intersection, a few small buildings to the east of the road and several foundations on the hillside.

LITTLE ORPHAN

Little Orphan was the first name applied to the settlement that became better known as Badito. The place began as a trading post on the trail to San Luis Valley. The date that Little Orphan began is still open to question. Some sources claim it was in the early 1850's.

The source of this original name is unknown. But, since it is located on the Huerfano River near the junction of Oak Creek it seems likely that it was a translation of Huerfano, which in Spanish means "orphan." The name Little Orphan was in use for only four months before it was changed to Badito.

From Walsenburg, take Colorado Highway 69 northeast and go about 15 miles to the intersection with Huerfano County Road 520, which goes to the west. The site is easy to identify. It is on the east side of Highway 69 and the Huerfano River. In 1999 there was a historical marker that identified a ruined building on the north side of the side road as the location of the post office and store. There was another, larger building on the south side of the road that was originally a ranch house and was later converted to a stable.

A note dated June 5, 1865, attached to the Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report seems to say that Little Orphan and Badito may not have been at the same location. If that is true, then the Little Orphan Post Office was moved to Badito and this was not a simple change in post office name.

MAITLAND

Going north from Walsenburg, Maitland was the third in the string of coal mining related post offices along the Loma Branch of the Denver and Rio Grande from Walsenburg. The post office opened in late 1897, which is likely an indication of the commencement of mining operations at the location.

I have found almost nothing about this community. I assume that it was another company town providing residences and limited services for the miners. It was only a mile northwest of the larger town and post office at Pictou.

The Maitland Post Office operated for nearly forty years, outlasting the one at the larger Pictou.

From the intersection of Huerfano County Road 590 and Colorado Highway 69, continue north one mile to an unmarked side road to the west. This is actually on the railroad grade of the spur that served Maitland. Mine dumps and a few foundations are the only remaining evidence of Maitland.



MALACHITE

Tom Sharp is considered to be the father of Malachite. He settled there in 1870 and built a large adobe trading post along the Huerfano River. When I first visited the area in 1971, a large portion of this adobe was still standing near the Huerfano River, on a road along north side of the river that connected Malachite with Red Wing. On later visits I was unable to relocate that building.

In the 1880's chunks of copper ore were found but the vein from which they came was never located. The copper ore, malachite, did lend its name to the community and to the post office when it was established. The Huerfano Mining and Milling Company had interests in the area and there were some attempts at mining as late as 1910 and 1915.

MALACHITE – Continued

The mining was never important and cattle and sheep ranching were, and continue to be, the prime occupation of the area residents.

From Gardner drive five and seven-tenths miles west on Huerfano County Road 550 towards Red Wing and Mosca Pass to County Road 570 – Pass Creek Road. Malachite was scattered along Road 570 from Road 550 to, and slightly beyond, the bridge over the Huerfano River. There are a few buildings along the way. The most prominent is a stone school or church building on the west side of the road. Pass Creek Road climbs south from the Huerfano River to intersect US Highway 160 at North La Veta Pass.



MAYNE

Mayne was another of the many small coal-mining communities that were accessed by spur lines from the Colorado and Southern Railroad. This was not one of the more successful mines and the post office lasted only two and a half years.

To reach this site, take Huerfano County Road 330 (Ideal Road) south from Walsenburg. Follow the directions that have been given to visit Ideal. Continue a short distance beyond Ideal to Rowell Road to the east. Go to Sunrise Road and on that road for a total of three and one-half miles to a side road called Hoofprint Court. At the end of that short road there is a small mine dump visible in the trees. I believe this was the site for the Mayne Post Office.

The USGS Topographic Map for Huerfano County (Sheet 4) locates a Mayne on the railroad; however, that is a railroad siding and not the location of the Mayne Post Office.






McGUIRE

McGuire is described as the forerunner to the Camp Shumway Post Office, located on the Loma Branch of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad from Walsenburg to the coal mines in this portion of Huerfano County.

The source of the name is unknown, as is the reason for the change in name to Camp Shumway. I suspect that both names had some relation to the coal mine and to the owners of the mine. The railroad station here was called Shumway Station, so the change in name might be connected to a railroad official and to the station.

There is no evidence for more than a small community of residences for the miners working there. Since this was at the same location as Camp Shumway, please refer to the discussion of that post office for directions to the site and a description of what remains there.



The Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report provides a location for this post office and that is almost all I know about it. I do recall having read someplace, or heard, that this was a small mining camp above timberline, high on the slopes of Mount Blanca. That does fit with the Site Location Report [SRM: It was a mining town, Walsenburg contemporary newspapers discuss it].

However, the road from Sharpsdale to Seguro and beyond ends several miles short of the plotted location and the only way to explore for McMillan would be on foot. Given the remote, high altitude location it is possible that some ruins would be found.

This is another of the post offices in Huerfano County that were authorized but for which the authorization was almost immediately rescinded. Usually that was because it was realized that there was no need for the office or that the proposed postmaster could not qualify or post the required bond.

Mooney has also escaped mention in any of the Colorado historical literature that I have read. Any information on this place would be appreciated.

MURIEL

Muriel was a railroad post office located at Rouse Junction on the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad southeast of Walsenburg. In 1920 this was briefly the site of the Spanish Peaks Post Office. And it was also the second location of the Pauley Post Office (1922-1929).

There is no indication that Muriel was anything more than a railroad station and siding with loading pens for livestock. However, it was the junction point for the railroad spur that followed Santa Clara Creek to the coal mines at "New" Rouse (see Rouse below) and the other nearby coal camps, hence the station name of Rouse Junction.

Lonora was the original proposed name. That was rejected in favor of Muriel. I have been unable to find any information as to the source of either of those names.

The location of Muriel is not accessible by vehicle. It is possible to drive to the southern side of Santa Clara Creek but there is no bridge over the creek. The adventurous might be able to ford the stream and hike the mile or so north on the railroad grade to the location. The directions to reach that starting point are contained in the discussion of Santa Clara.

MUSTANG

Like Larimer, Mustang was a small community on the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad a mile south of the Pueblo-Huerfano County line. Since Mustang was located on the double-track line to Walsenburg the community was more successful than Larimer on the old narrow gauge line that was being replaced.

The first post office in the area was at Larimer but in 1914 it was moved about one mile to Mustang.

Mustang was a small agricultural community focused on raising livestock. It was served by the Mustang Station, which was the immediate source for the name when the post office was moved from Larimer.

For directions to this site, please refer to the discussion of the Larimer Post Office. Follow those directions and then go to the point where Road 113 turns from south to west. This is close to the present day tracks of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad and is at the site of Mustang. There are two standing buildings and several collapsed buildings scattered along the road.



NIGGERHEAD

This is perhaps the most politically incorrect post office name that once existed in Colorado. But this is the way it is recorded, so this is the way I shall report it.

The term was a coal mining term and was applied to occasional, extremely hard and dense chunks of coal that were encountered during the mining process.

It appears that this post office was never in operation. A Geographical Site Location Report was filed and a postmaster was appointed, but his appointment was rescinded and that was the end of Niggerhead. The date of the rescinding is not given in the Records of Postmaster Appointments and I can only assume that it occurred very soon after the date of the appointment.

Follow the directions to Solar, given below. The stated location for Niggerhead was a half-mile further west on Huerfano County Road 346. There is a small mine dump and some remnant foundations at that location.

I have found no information relative to the purpose of this community. It was established in 1919, and was near the tracks of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad. Perhaps it served as a station or loading point for livestock. There is no evidence for an organized community.



NUNDA

Very little is known about Nunda. The location given in the Post Office Department Geographic Site Location Report places Nunda in the same quarter section as the later post offices of Cuchara Camps (1916-1957) and Cuchara (1957-2004)

At the time the Nunda Post Office was in operation the surrounding population was mostly engaged in stock raising. In the early twentieth century the area became a favorite for fishermen and the resort of Cuchara Camps came into existence.

From La Veta, drive south ten and one-half miles on Colorado Highway 12. In the half-mile north of the Cuchara settlement there are some older buildings that could date from the period of Nunda.

OAKVIEW

The only reference that I have found to Oakview describes it as a, "railroad stop and end of a short spur line, about 1 mile north of the Francisco stop, going up to Veta Pass."

To visit the site of Oakview, follow the directions to the location of Ojo (1913) on Huerfano County Road 441. Continue south on Road 441 and at a fork in the road, keep to the left around the hill. That will bring you to a large mine dump and the foundations and ruins of several buildings.

From what exists at the site and the reference to a railroad spur, it is certain that Oakview was a coal mine with associated residences. You can continue on to Road 440, turn east and go to La Veta.

OJO

Ojo was a small station on the original route of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad over La Veta Pass. It was located on what is today called Abeyta Creek but was first called Veta Creek.

When the Rio Grande abandoned the northern route and moved their line south to Veta Pass the original Ojo faded away for several years. In 1915 it reappeared but instead of a farm center and station on the railroad it was now a coal camp. As such it lasted beyond 1950.

Only one Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report is on file – submitted in 1880. That location is on a side road, south of present day US Highway 160 and about a two miles west of where Huerfano County Road 441 joins US 160.

For a short distance County Road 441 parallels US 160 then crosses Abeyta Creek. The 1991 DeLorme *Colorado Atlas & Gazetteer* locates the Ojo Mines just west of the creek crossing. Considering the description of the later Ojo having been a coal camp, I believe that this was the 1913 and subsequent location of Ojo. The mine dumps are visible from Road 441 and there is an area on the north side of the creek that may have been the location for the residences.



PAULEY

The only references that I have found for Pauley describe it as a rural post office about thirteen miles southeast of Walsenburg. That description, which fits with the initial Post Office Department Geographic Site Location Report confirms that there was no organized community at Pauley.

The Pauley Post Office was at that initial location until 1922 when it was moved west to a location on the El Moro Branch of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad where it remained until closing in 1929.

I made an attempt to reach the 1919 site by driving northeast from Walsenburg on Colorado Highway 10 to Huerfano County Road 210. Road 210 goes to the east and then turns southeast as Road 211. I was able to follow that road several miles to the point where my map indicated that it became Road 212. However, that put me on what was more likely a ranch road and was rapidly becoming more of a trail than a road, so I turned back.

Access to the second site, at Rouse Junction, has been described in the discussions of the Muriel and Spanish Peaks Post Offices. That site is not accessible by vehicle.

The 1919 Site Location Report that notified Washington of the planned move suggested the name of Rouse Junction for the new location but the Post Office Department retained the name of Pauley.

Accompanying the 1919 Site Location Report is a portion of a document requesting a post office to be named Schooler with Nellie Schooler as the proposed postmaster. I have no other information about Schooler, nor what connection it might have had to the Pauley Post Office.

PICTOU

The initial settlers along Coots Creek, now Pictou Creek, named their settlement Sulphur Springs for the twenty-one, evil smelling, mineralized springs in the area. The springs were eventually drained by the operations at the Pictou Mine.

Coal mining began in 1887 and Thomas Lawther, an early superintendent of the mine, persuaded the residents to name the community for his hometown, Pictou, Nova Scotia.

Pictou was one of the larger coal mining camps owned and operated by the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company. It was also where the company had its manufacturing facilities for the two-ton mine cars used in its mines.

In 1888 the Loma Branch of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad reached the location of Pictou.

Pictou was a multi-national town, and that often led to rowdiness and gave the place an unsavory reputation as a rough town. However, Pictou had the first advanced kindergarten in the area.

Production from the Pictou Mine reached 1,000 tons daily and continued until 1912. At that time the town and the production facilities were mostly dismantled.

The Pictou Post Office continued to operate another ten years, before it gave way to the post office at nearby Toltec.

Follow the directions given to reach the site of Toltec, the first of the string of mining camps along Colorado Highway 69. Pictou was at the intersection of Colorado 69 with Huerfano County 590. The site is marked by numerous mine dumps and a few small structures of undetermined use. Toltec is about a mile further on County 590.







PRYOR

After the Civil War, Mack and Ike Pryor settled on the Santa Clara River where it emerges from the foothills around East Spanish Peak. They are credited by some with bringing the first herd of longhorn cattle to Huerfano County. Later they added the Scissors Ranch to their holdings.

With the discovery of coal in the vicinity, a town was established and named for the Pryor brothers. In 1888 the Denver and Rio Grande built a spur to Pryor from the branch line to Santa Clara. The branch and the spur were removed in 1941.

Pryor developed into a modest sized community with its economy shared by coal mining and the surrounding ranches. Apparently there was no formal platting of the townsite nor was it ever incorporated.

To visit Pryor take Exit 42 from Interstate 25 – Rouse Road. This is also Huerfano County Road 310. It is eight-tenths miles to Pryor. The site is still inhabited and there are several buildings remaining at the town and others scattered along the road. There is abundant evidence of the previous mining activities.

Rouse Road continues on beyond Pryor and is the route to the sites of Santa Clara (1889), Rouse, Lester, Capps, Scissors and Quebec.

From 1898 to 1929 the Pryor and Rouse Post Offices were in concurrent operation. From 1910 to 1929 the Lester Post Office was also in operation. These three offices were within a two mile section along Santa Clara Creek. Why three post offices were necessary in this area is a question yet to be answered.



QUEBEC

I have found no historical reference to the Quebec Post Office. It is shown on 1887 maps, southwest of Pryor and on the northwest side of South Santa Clara Creek.

Following visits to the other sites in this area I attempted to reach the location for Quebec. From 4 Mile Canyon Road, south of Pryor, continue south on Rouse Road, (Huerfano County Road 312), taking the left fork on to County Road 313 which crosses Santa Clara Creek and then immediately turn right on to County Road 314. I was able to go six and a half miles from Pryor before the conditions on Road 314 became such that I chose not to risk getting stuck in the mud at such a remote location. I believe that I was close to the location of Quebec but looking up the valley I did not see any buildings and the heavy brush would obscure any remnants.

The Quebec Post Office lasted only four years before it was moved two miles north and renamed Scissors. I would classify Quebec as a ranch post office.

RATTLESNAKE BUTTES

Rattlesnake Buttes was a ranch post office in the eastern end of Huerfano County. The ranch nature of this office is well illustrated by its three different locations scattered through the area.

The name Rattlesnake Buttes was a reference to the so-named buttes - North Rattlesnake Butte north of Colorado Highway 10 and South Rattlesnake Butte on the south side of Highway 10, shortly before that road exits into Las Animas County.

From Exit 50 on Interstate 25 drive seventeen miles east on Colorado Highway 10 to the intersection with Huerfano County Roads 123 (north) and 220 (south). The initial location of Rattlesnake Buttes was a short distance beyond this intersection, on the south side of the highway but there is no visible evidence.

Drive two miles north on County Road 123 to where there is a small group of occupied (1999) farm buildings on the west side of the road. This was the 1920 site. The Rattlesnake Buttes Post Office remained at this location until it was discontinued in 1938.

Continue north on Road 123 about two miles. For a year and half the Rattlesnake Buttes Post Office was on the west side of road 123. Nothing is visible at that site.



RAVENWOOD

Ravenwood was a coal mining town located on the Colorado and Southern Railroad two miles south of Walsenburg.

The Ravenwood Mine was first opened in 1908. R. C. Hills, a geologist employed by the Victor American Fuel Company, named the mine for the many ravens he saw in the area. The community that developed took its name from the mine.

In Walsenburg, from the intersection of US Highway 160 with US Highways 85 and 87, go south on US 85-87. That road soon turns to the east towards Interstate 25. A short distance after the turn you will find Huerfano County Road 330, to the south. This is also called Ideal Road. Go two miles south. There is a road to the west but after crossing the railroad there is a locked gate that blocks any further progress. From that point it is possible to see a portion of a mine dump about a quarter mile in the distance. That would be the Ravenwood Mine. From Road 330 it is not possible to determine if there are any buildings left at the site. However there is a small foundation on the east side of Road 330 that was likely connected with Ravenwood.

REDWING

Red Wing was a small agricultural community on the Huerfano River seven miles west-southwest of Gardner.

I have not found a reference as to when or who established the community. In 1914 there was a store there and the residents decided to petition for a post office. They first requested the name of Crestone but that name was in use for a post office on the west side of the Sangre de Cristo Mountains, in Saguache County.

Legend has it that a group of residents were sitting around discussing possible names when a Mexican came wandering by whistling the then popular tune "Red Wing." That name was agreed upon, submitted and accepted.

Red Wing was never a large community and in recent years has slowly shrunk in size. In 1965 the post office was converted to a rural station of Walsenburg.

RED WING – Continued

My first visit to Red wing was in 1972. At that time the post office was in the same building as the Red Wing Store. The building was well maintained. In 1987 I returned to Red Wing and the post office was now in a small rather decrepit, blue trailer. In 1999 the post office was still in the same trailer. My next visit was in 2002, the store was closed, the trailer was gone, and the post office had closed. There were still a few residents but not much else had changed.



The only description of Round Oak that I have found classes it as a railroad post office. It was located on the Colorado and Southern Railroad, south of Walsenburg.

Follow the directions previously given to Ravenwood and then continue south on Ideal Road (Huerfano County Road 330) for another mile and a half. There is a mine dump and a couple of remnant foundations. From that evidence, I conclude that Round Oak was another of the many coal mining settlements in southern Huerfano County.

ROUSE

The post office of Rouse was at two locations about four miles apart. The first location (1889-1899) was northwest of Pryor and west of Interstate 25. Rouse was a company town established by the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company. The Rouse Mine opened in 1888 at the original post office location. It continued to operate until 1898 when it became uneconomical to pump out the water coming into the mine. Most of the buildings and a school were then moved south to a new location on Santa Clara Creek.

The new mine was on part of the 1871 homestead of A. M. Pryor and was near the Santa Clara Mine. Output from the Rouse Mine grew to 900 tons of coal per day. In 1920 the mine closed, again because of excessive water.

ROUSE – Continued

Operation of the post office at New Rouse was, from 1889 to 1894, concurrent with the post office at Santa Clara less than a mile away. From 1898 to 1929 the Rouse Post Office was in operation concurrently with the Lester and Pryor Post Offices. Again, why were all these post offices necessary in this small area?

If I have correctly located "Old" Rouse and properly identified the roads in the area, it was at or near the junction of Rowell Road with Sunrise Road, which can be reached by following the directions to Ideal. That location is in an area of scattered mine dumps, but it is difficult to identify which was actually the Rouse Mine. I did not observe the remnants of any structures.

To visit the site of "New" Rouse, follow the directions previously given to Pryor. From there continue on to the fork in the road at the site of Lester. Turn on to Huerfano County Road 312 and go a short distance to 4-Mile Canyon Road, the road in to the Black Hawk Ranch. There are several foundations along this road. However, it is difficult to separate what was Rouse and what was part of its neighbor, the early location of Santa Clara.

County Road 312 continues on towards Capps, Scissors and Quebec.

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

SAINT MARYS

Crofutt's Gripsack Guide to Colorado describes Saint Marys as, "On the Huerfano River, consists of a ranch, hotel, post office, and about 100 inhabitants in the near surroundings, who are mostly engaged in raising cattle and sheep. St. Mary's is a point where half a dozen wagon roads centre." That is the only reference to Saint Marys that I have found.

The Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Reports do provide a description of the location in 1871 and 1876. There is a third location description (1891) that is a half-mile or so to the northeast of the earlier location. This was after a brief period of discontinuance and the name proposed was Pearlton. That name was rejected and the old name of Saint Marys was restored.

After driving by the location of Delcarbon on Colorado Highway 69, and before reaching the site of Strong, where the highway begins to curve to the west, Huerfano County Road 611 goes off to the north. There was (1999) a signboard that pointed to the Kimbrel Ranch, a Colorado Centennial Farm. Drive into the ranch, which is one and three-tenths miles from the highway. This large, well-kept ranch is on the south side of the Huerfano River and near a small cemetery. When Jim Ozment and I visited there we attempted to find someone to talk to but were unable to do so. Nevertheless I believe it was one of the locations for the Saint Marys Post Office.



SANTA CLARA

Santa Clara is another of the post offices in Huerfano County that was at two widely separated locations. The initial location was a station on the El Moro Branch of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad.

To reach that location exit from Interstate 25 at Exit 41. Go to the east frontage road - Huerfano County Road 240. At first this road runs south then turns east and finally back to the north. You should be able to drive as far as Santa Clara Creek, the last portion being on the old railroad grade. Near the creek there is an old building and some cattle pens (2001). That was the original site of Santa Clara. The location of Muriel, Spanish Peaks and Pauley was another mile plus north along the railroad grade but is inaccessible by vehicle as there is no bridge over Santa Clara Creek.

The original Santa Clara Post Office closed in 1883. In 1889 a new post office opened about six miles to the southwest and was given the name of Santa Clara. It continued to operate until 1894. This second Santa Clara was at a coal mine. In the same year, 1889, the Rouse Post Office was moved to a neighboring location. The Lester and Pryor Post Offices eventually joined both of these in the same area.

To visit the second site of Santa Clara, follow the directions given to the site of "New" Rouse. Because the two were so close together, it is difficult to tell which was Rouse and which was Santa Clara.

I have not found any information to indicate that there was ever a post office with this name. The only reason I include it with the Huerfano County post offices is that there is a partial document attached to the Geographical Site Location Report for Pauley that provides the information reported below. Most likely this was somehow related to the Pauley Post Office.

SCISSORS

George Crofutt refers to Scissors as "A small ranch post office. Cattle, sheep, goats and babies are the chief productions of the settlers." Crofutt also states that Scissors was "formerly called Quebec." That is not correct. In 1884 the Quebec Post Office was moved two miles north and given the name of Scissors.

I have no idea why the name Scissors was chosen for this post office. In 1884 and again in 1894 Amelia Capps was the postmaster, and in 1894 the post office name was changed to Capps.

After visiting the post office sites around Pryor, ending at the locations of Rouse and Santa Clara at 4 Mile Canyon Road, continue south on Huerfano County Road 312 along Santa Clara Creek four and one-half miles to Huerfano County Road 315.1, to the north. Go north a little more than a mile to an unmarked side road to the left. That will take you a small ranch complex, a total of one and eight-tenths miles from County Road 312.



SEGURO

I have not found any mention of this place in the Colorado history that I have read. This is surprising as the post office appears to have been open for six years. The Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report does provide a location.

The location from the report is on the west side of the Huerfano River. From the junction of Huerfano County Roads 550 and 581 continue west on Road 550 three and a half miles. On the north side of Road 550 there is an unmarked side road that roughly parallels Road 550. That road goes only a short distance to a locked gate. But along the way there is a small open area and a small mine dump. It is possible that there was an attempt to mine a small seam of coal at that location and that was the reason for Seguro.

SHARPSDALE

The first location for the Sharpsdale Post Office was near the junction of Sheep Creek with the Huerfano River. Today that is the junction of Huerfano County Roads 550 and 581. The site is still labeled as Sharpsdale on some recent maps.

I can not explain why eight years elapsed between the filing of the Site Location Report in 1875 and the opening of the Sharpsdale Post Office in 1883.

This original location was on the road from Gardner to Mosca Pass, where that road turned away from the Huerfano River. By 1886 the Sharpsdale Post Office had been moved about two miles up the road towards Mosca Pass. The post office remained there until 1906 when it was moved to a location some six miles southwest of the 1875 location and back close to the Huerfano River. In 1924 the post office went back to near the 1886 location on the road to Mosca Pass. Later that year there was one final move to a location two miles west-southwest of the early 1924 location.

The name Sharpsdale is associated with Tom Sharp who came to the Huerfano River in the early 1870's. He settled near Red Wing and Malachite and erected a large adobe trading post. It was from him that the Sharpsdale Post Office took its name. That may indicate that Tom Sharp had interests in the area west of Red Wing.

It is believed that a tollgate was located at Sharpsdale. This would seem to be appropriate for the 1875 and 1886 locations, although by 1886 traffic on the Mosca Pass Road had been greatly reduced by the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad's line over the mountains to the San Luis Valley.

To search out the sites of Sharpsdale, from Red Wing continue west on Road 550 four and seventenths miles to just short of the junction with County Road 581. There are some small cabins on the south side of the river. This would be the reported 1875 (first) location for the Sharpsdale Post Office. You can continue on another four miles to the Singing River Ranch. Beyond there the road is on private property and I was unable to visit the 1906 site of Sharpsdale.

Return to the first described location of Sharpsdale and then turn on to County Road 581 and go three miles. That will bring you out into a large open meadow. There is a group of large cottonwoods, which seem out of place unless they were associated with a settlement. That is a logical place for the 1886 and early 1924 location of Sharpsdale. From that point there are no roads that would lead to the late 1924 location of the post office.

SOLAR

The only reference I have found for Solar describes it as, "a stop on the Denver and Rio Grande a few miles west of Walsenburg." It was that, but the primary reason for existence was the Solar coal mine at that location. Initially the post office was named Rockland but the name was soon changed to Solar.

Go west from Walsenburg on US Highway 160. West of the town, via an overpass, the highway crosses the railroad. A short distance beyond, there is a side road to the south, Huerfano County Road 346. A half-mile from US 160 you will find a few remnant foundations and mine dumps. This was the site of Solar/Rockland.



SPANISH PEAK

Henry Diagre, Hiram W. Vasquez and Colonel John M. Francisco founded this settlement. They built an adobe plaza that was called Francisco Plaza and served as a fort during the period when the Ute Indians were still raiding in the area.

The plaza served farmers and livestock growers in the area. When a post office was established it took the official name of Spanish Peak, however, the locals added a final "s" in a clearer reference to the two prominent volcanic peaks south of the settlement.

The two peaks are known as The Spanish Peaks or by their Indian name "Huajatolla"- "breasts of the world."

In August 1876 the name of the post office was renamed La Veta - "The Vein."

The location given by the Post Office Department Geographic Site Location Report is in the southern portion of the town of La Veta, near where Colorado Highway 12 briefly turns west before again turning south.

SPANISH PEAKS

In 1920 a post office with the name of Spanish Peaks was established. If it operated at all it was for only six months. It does not appear to have any relation to the original Spanish Peak Post Office (1871-1876), which became present day La Veta.

There is a Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report. However, on the face it is difficult to reconcile the Federal Land Location from that report with the geographical information also contained in the report.

The document places the site only fifteen feet east of the tracks of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad and states that the station was called Rouse Junction.

The key to the 1920 location of Spanish Peaks is probably in the fact that one of the locations for the Pauley Post Office is in the same quarter section and also refers to its proximity to the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad. In addition, the location of the Muriel Post Office is also described as being at Rouse Junction

I believe that this location was on the old, abandoned grade of the Denver and Rio Grande, not the more recent alignment. This is confirmed by the 1927 USGS Topographic Map for Huerfano County [Sheet 3], which maps the old railroad grade through Section 34.

SPANISH PEAKS – Continued

This group of post offices, – Muriel, Spanish Peaks, Pauley and Santa Clara – are all in the extreme southeast corner of Huerfano County east of Interstate 25. Unfortunately locked gates block off the roads, or trails, that lead to the sites.

To make an attempt, take Exit 41 from Interstate 25 to Huerfano County Road 240 on the east side of I-25. Follow that road as far as you can but you will still be a mile or two south of the Spanish Peaks location. I doubt that any structures remain.

STRONG

Strong was another in the series of coal mine towns along what is now Colorado Highway 69. This was the eighth in the series of ten camps and ten post offices that were along the Loma Branch of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad that began at Walsenburg and ended at Alamo. The railroad was gradually extended, reaching Strong in 1904 and Alamo in 1923.

From the site of Delcarbon, continue north on Colorado 69. At Delcarbon the highway begins a curve from a northwest direction to southwest. Strong was about halfway along the curve before the road again turns to the northwest. There are mine dumps on the south side of the road and some foundations along the side of Alamo Arroyo, which is north of and near the road.

From the number of remnant foundations, it appears that Strong was a moderate sized camp housing the miners that worked at the associated mine.



TABEGUACHE

I have found no information relative to this post office. The name was that of one of the tribes of the Ute Indians that lived in the area that comprises Huerfano and western Las Animas Counties.

According to the Records of Postmaster Appointments, the Tabeguache Post Office was open from February 22 to September 20, 1869. However, there is no Geographical Site Location Report on file. That is the usual situation found for a post office that was never in operation. I believe that was the case for the Tabeguache Post Office.

TALPA

The history and the location of this post office are at best confusing. It is further complicated by the similarity in name of two other offices - Huerfano Canyon and Huerfano Canon. Then add the Gardner and Farisita Post Offices to the mix and stir in the Post Office Department Geographic Site Location Reports, some of which are unclear, and I am not certain that I have interpreted everything correctly.

The 1878 Site Location Report, listed below, is the one that was submitted for the Huerfano Canon Post Office. It makes reference to both Talpa and to Gardner but the description fits with the location of the later Farisita Post Office, not Gardner.

Talpa was a small community with a store and a livery barn and several residences. It was the supply center for the ranchers in the immediate vicinity. The Talpa Post Office closed in 1912. The settlement lacked a post office until 1923 when one was opened with the name of Farisita.

TALPA - Continued

In 1913, and again in 1914, Geographic Site Location Reports for Talpa were submitted to the Post Office Department. In addition there is mention in the historical literature of Talpa being in existence until 1921. However, after the 1912 edition, Talpa is not listed in the annual Postal Guides. It appears that there may have been one or more unsuccessful attempts to reopen the Talpa Post Office. The 1913 and 1914 Site Location Reports are included in the chronology that follows.

The 1913 report raises an additional question. It points to a location is Section 10, Township 26 South. The Range location is not clear, but I assume that it was Range 69 West. If so, this would have been about four miles west-northwest of the earlier location on Huerfano River.

My best conclusion is that in 1890 the Huerfano Canon Post Office name was changed to Talpa. This may have included a move of about a half-mile to a new site. The Talpa Post Office closed in 1912. When a new post office opened there in 1923 it was given the name of Farisita. In the time between 1912 and 1923 there were attempts to reopen the Talpa Post Office but in 1913, at a different location and in 1914 with the name of Turkey Creek.

The original site of Talpa coincides closely with the location of Farisita on Colorado Highway 69.

To visit that 1913 "site" of Talpa, begin at Farisita on Colorado Highway 69 and drive north on Huerfano County Road 620 four and two-tenths miles. That will bring you to a road junction and the Valdez Cemetery on the east side of the road. There is one old building nearby and a few modern structures in the vicinity. The presence of the cemetery might support the past existence of a small community at that location.



TIOGA

Tioga is the ninth, and next to last, in the series of post offices that served coal mines and miners along the Loma Branch of the Denver and Rio Grande from Walsenburg to Alamo. The railroad was extended to Tioga in 1907.

Some authors have confused the Tioga Post Office with Tioga Station, supposedly on the Denver and Rio Grande south of Cucharas. The Post Office Department Geographical Site Location Report clearly places the Tioga Post Office northwest of Walsenburg on the branch line that served the numerous coal mines along its route.

From the location of Strong on Colorado Highway 69 continue a mile west to Huerfano County Road 524 and turn south on that road. Tioga was a half-mile down the road on the west side. No period structures remain but the Kebler Mine dumps are visible as are several foundations. A line of trees is said to delineate the main street of the community.



TOLTEC

Toltec was a coal mining camp located at the Toltec Mine about two miles west of Walsenburg. In 1894 P. F. Sharp and John McNiel opened the Toltec Mine. McNiel was the first state inspector of coal mines in Colorado. The name, that of an Indian tribe near Mexico City, was first given to the mine and then to the town and the post office.

Toltec did develop into a modest sized community with services and residences for the workers at the mine.

To begin your trip through the coal mining camps northwest of Walsenburg start at Exit 52 from Interstate 25. Drive a short distance on US Highway 85 to Colorado Highway 69 and turn west going a little over a mile to where the highway turns sharply to the northwest. There is a dirt (1999) road to the south. Pictou was located in the area near the intersection and Toltec was a mile further down the road. I believe this is Huerfano County Road 590.

Toltec is still a small community of residences scattered along the road. The Loma Branch of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad served it.



TOURIST

In the fall of 1887 an attempt was made to change the name of Walsenburgh to Tourist. This appears to have been connected to a land development scheme but it was opposed by nearly all of the residents.

The scheme did go so far as to have the post office name changed from Walsenburgh to Tourist, but within a month the protests succeeded and the name reverted to Walsenburgh.

UTE

Huerfano was the initial post office at this location on the Huerfano River and the original grade of the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad. That post office closed in 1884. Four years later a new post office opened at the same location, but it was named Ute.

It appears that a small community had developed at the location and that it continued for several years. Please refer to the discussion of the Huerfano Post Office for more about this place.

In 1900 the name of the Ute Post Office reverted to Huerfano. This may have been either a choice of the railroad or a preference of the residents.

Exit from Interstate 25 at Exit 64 and drive east on Huerfano County Road 110 to the railroad. Road 110 turns north along the railroad, there is a crossing of the railroad at the turn. Unfortunately when Jim Ozment and I visited the location in 1999 there was a locked gate and we could not go on to the location. We did drive south along the railroad to where we could see the Huerfano River but could not identify anything that might remain from Huerfano/Ute/Huerfano.



VETA PASS (I)

I have not found a Post Office Department Geographic Site Location Report for this post office. Based on the dates that it may have been in operation, I believe that it was located at La Veta Pass where the Denver and Rio Grande Railroad first crossed the summit of the Sangre de Cristo Mountains.

If my assumption is correct, it is possible to visit the site. Drive west from Walsenburg on US Highway 160. About two miles east of North La Veta Pass, Huerfano County Road 443 branches to the south from US 160. Follow that road to the summit. An alternate route is from the west side of North La Veta Pass via Costilla County Road SS.

There are several buildings on the Huerfano County side of the pass. One is a small church. Another may have been the depot. There are also two large buildings one of which was a roadhouse the other probably associated with it. Visiting this site is an easy drive and there is something worth seeing. When I was there in 1999, the church was open to visit.

WALSEN

Walsen was another of the small coal mining towns southwest of Walsenburg. It was on the Denver and Rio Grand Railroad line to La Veta and the San Luis Valley, only a mile or so after the railroad passed through Walsenburg.

The community was named for Fred Walsen who opened the first coal mine at the site. In 1892 the Colorado Fuel and Iron mill at Pueblo began taking coal from the mine at Walsen. By the 1920's the town had a population of 1,200 living in more than 200 company owned, identical residences. There were two general stores, the Levy and Walsen Store and the Unfug Brothers Store. In 1926 a brick schoolhouse replaced the old frame building. The Colorado Fuel and Iron Company put up a YMCA building, which was a much-used community center.

In the 1930's the Colorado Fuel and Iron Company mill changed from coal to natural gas to fuel its furnaces and the community of Walsen quickly disappeared.

In 1910, an electric plant was built at Walsen. Eventually the city of Walsenburg purchased the plant. The power plant still stands, and the mine dumps remain but all other buildings that were once Walsen have been torn down.

Drive west from Walsenburg on US Highway 160. On the west edge of Walsenburg the power plant and mine dumps are easily seen from the highway.

WALSENBURGH / WALSENBURG

Perhaps as early as the 1840's Walsenburg began as a Spanish settlement called La Plaza de los Leones for its founder Don Miguel Antonio Leon. In 1870 Fred Walsen opened a general store, acquired a post office, and became the first postmaster of Walsenburgh. The spelling Walsenburgh was retained until 1892 when the final "h" was dropped, as a part of the Post Office Department's efforts to streamline post office names.

In 1887 the name of the town and post office was changed to Tourist. This change in name did not meet with the approval of the residents and it was quickly discarded. On November 30, 1887 the *Trinidad Citizen* made the following comment: "Those few who wished to run away with an established mining town – name and all – and to merge it into a wildcat scheme of their own certainly deserved this rebuke."

Although originally a Spanish settlement, the 1870's saw an influx of German settlers who took land along the Cucharas River and began farming and raising livestock. Coal was discovered in the area and a large number of mines were opened. Some of the mines developed their own communities but Walsenburg, as the county seat, dominated the political and economic life of Huerfano County. Modern Walsenburg is still the major town and commercial center in Huerfano County.

I have found no information on this post office. From its rather remote location on the upper portion of Yellowstone Creek I suspect that it was a ranch post office supplying mail service to ranches in the area.

From Walsenburg drive north on Colorado Highway 69 about 15 miles to the location of Badito that has been previously discussed. Opposite the short road across the Huerfano River to Badito, Huerfano County Road 520 goes to the south from Colorado 69. Follow that road two and four-tenths miles to County Road 530 and turn left (west). This road goes cross-country to the Yellowstone Creek Valley and then along Yellowstone Creek to the southwest. At seven and three-tenths miles from Colorado 69 you will pass a small log church above the road. Continue on another two and seven-tenths miles to where you can see a ranch in the valley, south of the road. This ranch is at or near the location reported for the Yellowstone Creek Post Office.
